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



# PART V

# Report to the Governor—Location and Strength of Iowa Guard June 30, 1924—Recommendations—Changes in the Military Code—Appropriations

His Excellency, N. E. Kendall, Governor of Iowa.

My Dear Governor: I respectfully submit the following report of the details and operations of this office for the biennial period, July 1, 1922, to June 30, 1924.

### PROGRESS

The progress of the Iowa National Guard has been steady and has exceeded the expectations of the War Department to such an extent that no new organiations will be authorized for the next six months at least. The State of Iowa, as of June 30, 1924, was 13 per cent in excess of maintenance strength, which in itself is an indication of a wholesome and flourishing condition.

### FIRST LINE TROOPS

The National Guard of the United States is now part of the first line of defense for this country, and unquestionably, is one of our greatest institutions, solving for the States and the Nation, the perplexing problems of adequate military forces and a minimum taxation for national defense. It represents a great citizen army, beyond the control of any faction or group, which during peace time is fully under control of the sovereign states, for maintenance of law and order, and protection of life and property, when municipal powers fail, and with the regular army is ready for immediate field service whenever a national emergency demands such service.

# THE NATIONAL DEFENSE ACT

It is believed that the present National Defense Act requirements are the very least which the citizens of the States and Territories can ask or expect, consistent with maintaining an adequate and efficient national defense.

Based on a population of 110,000,000, the average cost of maintaining a National Guardsman is approximately 27 cents

to the Federal Government, and based on a population of 2,500,-000 in Iowa, the average cost of maintaining a National Guardsman is 11 cents to the people of this state, a total of 38 cents for each guardsman, while the cost of maintaining a regular army soldier is approximately \$2.00. Aside from the armed protection and security given the state, the National Guard is the medium of annually placing in circulation with the state, cash received from the Federal Government for armory drill, encampment pay, subsistence and transportation, pay of caretakers and helpers, rental and subsistence allowances for regular army instructors and sergeant instructors, and forage for animals, of approximately three-quarters of a million dollars.

The foregoing table shows a wide margin between war and peace strength and actual strength of all organizations on June 30, of this year.

The necessity for constant recruiting activities is apparent, and is in the main appreciated by organization commanders, there are some however, who do not realize the importance of this phase of our activities and in consequence some units are below the minimum strength required, and as a result unnecessary hardships follow, such as officers not receiving pay, and organizations losing certain allowances which are based on strength and drill attendance.

The average turn over in the Iowa Guard is approximately 42% each year, and this can only be met by the continual recruiting of new material. The protection of the citizens and taxpayers demand an adequate appropriation for the National Guard, and it is believed and urged that our present appropriation of \$265,000.00 be continued.

# COMPOSITION OF THE GUARD

Under the Federal and State laws, the National Guard shall consist of the regularly enlisted militia between the ages of eighteen and forty-five years, organized, armed and equipped as is provided by law, and of commissioned officers between the ages of twenty-one and sixty-four years.

This armament, with the necessary Quartermaster, Ordnance and other supplies on hand in State Arsenal, Camp Dodge, permits the Iowa Troops being ready at all times for such service as may be required of it, both in peace and war, for state service or for a national emergency.

#### PERSONNEL

The commissioned and enlisted personnel of the Iowa Guard has greatly improved in all sections of the State. Officers are required to qualify for their commissions, and must appear before an Examining Board. They are required to take either a written or oral examination, on subjects selected by the Board, as outlined in National Guard Regulations. Enlisted men are being carefully selected, as to their physical fitness, and their character.

The morale of the troops was never better and the esprit-decorps of all units is highly commendable.

During the present fiscal year, the National Guard of the U.S. has shown an abnormal increase, an increase beyond what was anticipated. The Militia Bureau had figured their estimates to the Director of Budget on a basis of 177,000 men, but to the surprise of all concerned, the Guard reached 191,000 men by October 1, 1924

# RECOMMENDATIONS

# STATE OWNED ARMORIES

I desire to repeat the recommendation made in my report covering the biennium 1921-1922, relating to legislature authorizing State owned armories. This office is now, as in the past, allowing each unit of the Guard an allowance to cover armory rent, heat, light water and janitor service. This allowance is fixed by an Armory Board, appointed by the Governor, and they recommend to him the amount each unit should be allowed to provide themselves with a building, which must come within the requirements, as to construction, size, storage, facilities for Government property, and rooms for drill, assembly, baths and toilets, as laid down by regulations published by the War Department.

These allowances amount to a large sum each year, and the State has nothing tangible to show for it. The same amount of money expended over a period of years for state owned armories would in the end be more economical and show a definite permanent return.

The States of New York, Pennsylavania, Illinois, Michigan, Wisconsin, Minnesota and others, now have State owned armories, and find they are the most economical and satisfactory method of housing their National Guard troops and property.

# CHANGES IN THE MILITARY CODE

It is recommended that all that part of Section 299, beginning with the words, "The Assessors," in the eighth line from the top and ending with the word "list" in the third line from the bottom, be repealed.

That the second sentence in Section 300 be repealed and the following enacted in lieu thereof:

"'In this chapter, the word 'soldier' shall include all persons enlisted in the guard, or in the militia when called into service; the words, 'warrant officer' shall include those persons so designated by law or regulation; the word 'officer' shall include all

persons holding a commission from the governor or other legally constituted authority; whenever the word 'company' is used in this chapter, it will be understood to apply with equal force to a troop, battery, or other unit or detachment similar to a company in organization or administration." In Section 301, that after the word 'governor' in the last line, the clause, "or other legally constituted authority," be added.

In Section 302, change the word "specified" in line two, to "required," and the first word "or" in the last line, to the word "and."

Section 304, be amended by adding after the word "guard" in the third line, "and the expenditure of guard appropriations in the state of Iowa."

That Section 308, be amended by striking out the word, "hereafter" in the first line, and changing the last word in line four to "and," and the word "or" in the ninth line to "and", and that the second and third sentences be stricken from the section.

That the word "shall" in the twelfth line of Section 309, be changed to "may".

That the word "specified" in the third line of Section 311, be changed to the word "required" and that following the word "governor" in the third line, be inserted "or War Department," and that the last word in line four be changed to the word "and".

That Section 1313-a1 be repealed.

That Section 328 be amended by inserting after the word "state" in thirteenth line "or" for which the state is accountable," and that the following be added to the section:

"The said notice may be either verbal or in writing, such notice deposited in the United States Mail addressed to the last known address of such member of the guard, shall be considered as the notice herein contemplated."

That Section 331 be repealed, and the following enacted in lieu thereof:

"Sec. 331. Marksmanship medals and Service badges.

The Adjutant General from the funds at his disposal shall procure and issue distinctive badges to the officers and men of the guard entitled thereto as follows:


- 1. Rifle and Pistol Marksmanship.
- 2. State Rifle Team.
- 3. Service Badges.

according to the designs and patterns thereof as may be determined upon by the adjutant general and kept on file at the office of the adjutant general. Members of the Guard who by order of the president serve in federal forces during a national emergency shall be entitled to count the period of such federal service toward the procurement of a service badge."

#### RECAPITULATION

Real Estate Buildings and Utilities. Miscellaneous Grand Total CAMP DODGE IMPROVEMENTS My report for the biennium ending June 30, 1922, covered on page 13, the History of Negotiations for purchase of buildings and

utilities erected and installed by the Federal Government on

State owned land during 1917 and 1918. The buildings were sold by auction, under date of Monday, October 9, 1922—Parker L. Crouch Auctioneer, Des Moines, Iowa. There was sold a total of 342 buildings of all descriptions, 534 Furnaces, 35 Ice Boxes, and a miscellaneous lot of kitchen ranges, sinks, hot water tanks and heaters, toilet bowls and flush tanks, etc.

The net receipts from the sale was \$69,350.00, which was deposited with the Treasurer of State under date of October 11, 1922, to be credited to the Permanent Improvement Fund of this office.

During the period covered by this report this office has constructed the following permanent buildings at Camp Dodge, for the use of the Guard :

50 Mess Halls and Kitchens, at a cost of

	168,430.00

These buildings were constructed upon the recommendation of a Board of Officers, and under the authority of the Governor, and were paid for out of the Permanent Improvement Fund and from unexpended balances remaining at the end of each fiscal year, of our appropriation for the support of the Guard.

Iowa now has the most complete permanent National Guard camp grounds in the United States, and the War Department has pronounced it the most adequate, economical, and complete plan of construction. They are recommending our plan, type of buildings and construction, be followed by all States.

Our plans for the future, should funds become available, include the construction of the following:

Recreation building for the men. Shelter sheds for cavalry animals. Hospital building. Camp headquarters building. Quartermaster office building.

This office has prevailed upon the Federal Government to authorize the construction at Government expense, 12 officers bath houses and latrines, and we now have estimates filed with the War Department for the construction of the Camp Headquarters Building and the Quartermaster Building (listed above) at Government expense. We have every reason to believe the War Department will authorize these two buildings, as they are necessary and essential to the administration work in connection with the training of the Guard.

Our regular force of employees, in addition to their normal duties in connection with the upkeep and maintenance of the reservation, have fenced the entire reservation with five foot woven wire; rebuilt rifle range road and covered same with shale and sand; graded and leveled parade ground and tent area; constructed interior telephone system for reservation; rearranged entire lighting and power system, reducing number of poles, transformers and amount of wire; and rebuilt all sewer openings and man holes.

As has been before stated, the old buildings and contents were sold, but this office retained the following improvements and utilities, which were constructed by the Federal Government and kept in constant use:

Electric pumping plant consisting of three 125 H.P. Crocker-Wheeler motors connected direct to three Allis-Chalmers centrifugal pumps, each drawn by a 20 H.P. General Electric motor, located in four sub-stations and wells.

Transformer Station, containing three 100 K. V. A. Pittsburg Transformer Co.'s Transformers, and one 10 K. V. A. General Electric Co. Transformer, all with lightning arresters, switches, meters, etc.

Concrete water storage tank, holding one million gallons.

Water mains throughout the entire camp.

Sewer system, with 30-inch main sewers, and smaller laterals to the various buildings.

Concrete paved roads throughout the camp.

Three office buildings at Brigade headquarters.

Two story Camp Hospital building.

Four frame warehouses, 60x168.

One motor repair shop-frame.

One frame 2 M barracks.

One unloading ramp.

Over one mile of storage and unloading railroad track.

Electric poles and wire.

During the past biennium, this office has repaired and painted all houses, barns and outhouses on the reservation, also reroofed, barns, water tanks and frame warehouses, and has raised sufficient corn, oats and hay to feed all animals used in the maintenance work on the reservation.

# PART IX

# Service Record Cards—World War—Iowa Men and Women Who Served in the World War

The securing of all records of Iowans who served in the World War, is a part of the functions of the War Roster Commission, consisting of the Governor and the Adjutant General. This work was conducted by the Commission under a bill passed by the 38th General Assembly. The 38th General Assembly appropriated \$20,000.00 to carry on the work, and the 39th General Assembly appropriated \$15,000.00 additional. It was contemplated these two appropriations would complete the work, but the magnitude of the task had been underestimated, and additional funds were asked for from the 40th General Assembly. This asking was refused, consequently, by July 1, 1924, the remainder of appropriations were expended and the office was closed as of that date. The status of the Commission and its accomplishments was, on July 1st, 1924, as follows:

Material for the first volume of the Roster has been prepared, and consists of roster of all National Guardsmen who saw service on the Mexican Border, 1916-1917, with a suitable history of the organizations, their service and about 200 photographs. This volume will also include the history of the Selective Service Law and its administration in Iowa, with maps and graphs.

Purchase of moving picture films, positive and negative, of Iowa troops who served on Mexican Border, 1916-1917, and the World War, 1917-1918, consisting in all of:

5,000 ft. Iowa Guardsmen on Mexican Border.

2,000 ft. Building of Camp Dodge.

5,000 ft. Formation 88th Division and scenes in France.

5,000 ft. Iowa Guardsmen in 34th Division at Camp Cody.

6,000 ft. 168th Infantry, 42nd Division (Rainbow) which includes good-bye review by Gov. W. L. Harding at Fair Grounds, trench warfare in France, decoration of Iowa officers by General Pershing, review on the Thine, home coming at New York, final review in Des Moines on return from France.

All films now in possession of the State Historical Department of Iowa. Since the Commission was organized and began to function, it has accumulated, corrected and filed, approximately one hundred thousand correct record cards of Iowa men and women who served in the Army, Navy and Marine Corps. These records continue to come in, from the War Department, and must be checked, corrected and filed.

The Retrenchment and Reform Committee, on August 1, 1924, authorized the employment of one clerk to have charge of the files, and answer correspondence and requests for soldier records in connection with the National Bonus.

No compilation has been attempted, but it is obvious that this work


should be continued and brought to its conclusion now, when information required is available and can be obtained at a minimum of expense. To renew the work some years hence, will prove a very expensive proposition, as has been demonstrated in the compilation of the Civil War and Spanish War Rosters.

With this thought in mind, I have asked, through the Director of the Budget the following for the next two years, which it is hoped will complete the Roster and have it ready for the printer:

Subject: Report on attendance at General Service Schools, Fort Leavenworth, Kansas.

To: The Adjutant General of Iowa, Des Moines, Iowa.

1. In accordance with orders your office I left Ottumwa March 14th and reached Fort Leavenworth March 15th, reporting immediately to the commandant of the General Service Schools, Brig. Gen. Harry A. Smith. I was immediately assigned to quarters 6-B Schofield Hall, consisting of two rooms on the third floor with bath used jointly with the occupant of the adjoining quarters. These were one-half story rooms and were very comfortable except in the extremely hot weather.

There were twenty officers detailed to the class, one of whom did not report, and of the nineteen reporting, eighteen were National Guard officers from seventeen different states and one Reserve Corps officer from New York whom came at his own expense. Upon arrival we were liberally supplied with text books, stationery and equipment for field work and map reading. It was necessary to purchase a small amount of equipment, including maps, but the total expense of these items required would not exceed \$10.00 for the whole course. Upon leaving, most of the text books were given to us and the remainder were turned in with no charge except 75 cents for the use of aeroplane mosaics. The classes started Monday morning, March 17th, and for the first week the duties were comparatively light. After that the required study was heavier and did not leave any time for outside engagements during the week. Classes were held five days a week, usually with three conferences in the morning and one map problem or map maneuver in the afternoon. As a rule, there were two conferences each day requiring preparation. The remainder of the periods were lectures or conferences that did not require special preparation. There were about 250 Regular Army officers in the regular class, who set a very good example in attention to duties and studious habits. I wish to take this opportunity of expressing my appreciation of the attitude towards special class of both the students in the regular class and of the instructors. They were all helpful and courteous and there was no indication of any desire to draw distinction

between the classes.

2. The instruction consisted chiefly of Tactics and Technique, Tactical Principles and Decisions, Technique of Artillery and Cavalry Operations. Map Reading, Field Engineering, Tables of Organization, Chemical Warfare, Air Service, Logistics, Methods of Training, Military Aid to Civil Authorities, Signal Communications, Military History, Equitation and other subjects were covered to a more limited degree. The operations

of the Division was the basis of studies but smaller units and the Corps and Army were considered. The instructor in charge of the class, Lt. Col. Louis J. Van Schaick, was admirably suited to the position and showed kindly and fatherly interest in the class and was uniformly helpful and considerate. The grading was based very largely on map problems and on nine general terrain exercises conducted in the field June 9th to 13th, inclusive.

3. Personally, I found the course very valuable, especially for the insight it gave into other branches of the service and aside from the direct information and knowledge gained, it inspires confidence and prepares one for further intelligent study.

4. I would recommend the course to all field officers desiring to improve their military education, but believe, as a rule, it should follow attendance at one of the line schools or at least students should have a preparation of at least one year's study of the "D" course. The acquaintances formed would be exceedingly valuable in case of another war within a few years. Training was especially for staff duties, the principal stress being placed on G-3 work, although the decisions required of a Commanding Officer and the other branches of general staff work were not ignored.

All officers of the Guard are required to attend and will arrange their departure from home station so as to report to the Adjutant General, State House, not later than 9:00 a.m., February 21, 1923, for the purpose of signing pay roll. Roll will be called at each meeting, those not present will be checked as absent for the day or half day as the case may be, and deductions made on pay roll accordingly.

Service uniform, without side arms, will be worn. Each officer will report with the following:

All officers of the guard will be furnished transportation from home station and return, and a per diem allowance of seven (7) dollars per day is allowed, which must cover sleeper, parlor car seat, hotel and meals,

The Quartermaster will issue the necessary transportation requests, and will prepare the pay rolls covering the actual school period, and allowing one (1) day from home station to Des Moines, and one day returning to home station.

The travel directed and the expense involved is necessary in the Military Service of the State.



# 1922 ANNUAL CAMP OF INSTRUCTION AND FIELD TRAINING

Camp Dodge, Iowa, August 14 to 28 Inclusive Camp Knox, Kentucky, August 6 to 20 Inclusive

Encampment Letter No. 1.

April 5, 1922.

From: The Adjutant General of Iowa. To: The U. S. P. & D. Officer, Iowa National Guard. Subject: Annual Encampment, 1922, Iowa National Guard.

1. The annual encampment of the Iowa National Guard will be held at Camp Dodge, from August 14th to 28th, inclusive, subject to authority from the War Department and the desires of the Governor of Iowa. The entire Guard will mobilize at Camp Dodge, with the exception of the Artillery units, these units will go into camp at Camp Knox, Kentucky.

2. It is contemplated that Officers and enlisted men of State Staff Corps and Departments, officers and enlisted men of Brigade Headquarters, all Regimental and Field Officers, Commanding Officers, and mess sergeants only of medical units, and mess sergeants and cooks of all other units, except service companies and troops, will be mobilized four days immediately preceding the dates of the camp. Officers and enlisted men of all service companies and troops, less bands, will be mobilized three days immediately preceding the camp dates, and will be retained one day immediately following the close of the camp.

3. Under the provisions of par. 557, N. G. R. you will prepare for the Governor's signature, requisitions for necessary funds to defray the cost of the camp. In this connection, your requisition will include and cover:

Brigade Headquarters and Headquarters Company.

2 Regiments of Infantry.

1 Regiment of Cavalry.

to and from Camp Dodge, Iowa.

Battalion Headquarters and Combat Train 155 mm. F. A.

to Camp Knox, Kentucky and return. Meals in kind will be furnished the troops while enroute to mobilization point at Camp Dodge, and return to home station, but it will be impracticable to furnish meals in kind for artillery units mobilizing at Camp Knox, Kentucky, consequently, you will therefore anticipate the maximum computed allowance in lieu of the necessary travel ration.

4. In addition to the above, you will cover in your general estimation, the following:

Preparation of Camp Grounds and buildings for Camp.

Preparation of Motor Transportation.

Hire of horses to mount officers and certain enlisted men.

Gasoline and oil for Motor Transportation.

Kerosene for lights on trucks.

Ice.

Coal for Cooking.

Forage for Hired Animals.

Forage for Cavalry.

Veterinary Supplies.

Transportation, and Forage for Private Mounts of Officers.

Water and Light.

Telephone Service.

Preparation of Range for Firing.

Garbage Disposal.

1. You are advised that the next annual encampment of the National Guard of Iowa, will be held, subject to the approval of the War Department, and the desires of the Governor, at Camp Dodge, Iowa, August 14th to 28th, inclusive, with the exception of the Field Artillery, the dates for which will be announced later, to Camp Knox, Kentucky.

2. The entire Guard will mobilize at Camp Dodge, with the exception of the Artillery units, which units will be sent to Camp Knox, Kentucky. Officers and enlisted men of the State Staff Corps and Departments, officers and enlisted men of Brigade Headquarters and Headquarters Company, all Regimental Field and Staff officers, the commanding officers and mess sergeants only of Medical Detachments, and all mess sergeants and cooks of all organizations, except Service Companies and Troops, will mobilize four days immediately preceding the Camp dates. Officers and enlisted men of Service Companies and Troops, less band, will be mobilized three days immediately preceding the Camp dates, and be retained one day immediately following close of Camp period.

3. It is requested that you kindly prepare a training schedule for the approval of the Corps Area Commander, and forward same to this office,

at your earliest convenience. It is desired that this schedule be prepared separately to cover Infantry, Cavalry, and Artillery.

4. In this connection, you are advised that this department desires that 8 hours instruction be given daily, and that 5 days of the camp be devoted to target practice. By Order of the Governor:

To: The Governor of Iowa.

Subject: Annual Camp of Instruction, 1922, Iowa National Guard.

1. This department is preparing the estimates covering Camp of the Iowa National Guard for this year, and it is also important that the dates of the Camp be indicated to the War Department. I am asking the Governor to advise me of his desires in this connection, recalling that he expressed himself last year, as particularly desirous of holding this year's Camp at such time as would co-ordinate with State Fair dates. There is much in favor of such a program, and I personally, can see the wonderful opportunity it would present, in giving the people of this state a chance to see the National Guard in action.

2. There are however, many serious obstacles in the way of accomplishing our desires:

First: The dates of the Camp must not extend beyond the time which would intertere with the opening of the school year, as many of the National Guard members are in schools and colleges.

Second: The War Department would not consent to any interference or interruption with the training schedule prepared for the troops during the 15 days allotted.

Third: If it is contemplated having the troops appear on the Fair Grounds, it would be necessary to hold them over an additional day, at no expense to the Federal Government. This expense, based on the attendance at Camp last year, would be approximately, eighteen thousand dollars, covering transportation from Camp Dodge to Fair Grounds and return, pay and subsistence, gasoline, oil, forage, etc., and would have to be defrayed by the State or the Fair Association.

3. I am informed that the first program day at the Fair will be August 25th, in which event, it would be possible, subject to approval of the War Department, to arrange the Camp dates as August 14th to 28th, inclusive, and hold Governor's Day and Review, on Saturday, August 26th, in this way gives everyone a chance to be at Camp for the big day.

4. Your reply will govern my recommendation to the War Department, in reference to Camp Dates, training schedule, etc.

2. In this connection, it is requested that an additional four (4) days be added to the period, to cover travel from home stations and return.

5. Requisition for funds covering this tour of duty is being prepared for the signature of the Governor, and will be forwarded immediately on completion.

Subject: Annual Encampment-Iowa National Guard.

1. The recommendation of this department to hold the annual field training Iowa National Guard at Camp Dodge, Iowa, August 14th to 28th inclusive, has been approved by the Military Bureau under date of April 11, 1922, provided funds therefor are made available. This authority applies only to State Staff Corps and Departments, 67th Infantry Brigade, and 113th Cavalry, Iowa National Guard.

2. It is suggested that you keep a special file on your desk, of all *Encampment Letters* from this office, as it is contemplated issuing all orders and instructions relative to the Camp by letter, it being more comprehensive, and permits more detail instructions.

3. Officers: All vacancies for Commissioned Officers must be filled before Camp period. There remains ample time to accomplish this before Camp, and also permit you to make careful selection. It is urged that this selection be made from the enlisted men of your organization,

who possess the necessary qualifications. In this connection it is desired to emphasize that every member of your organization should be encouraged to look forward to ultimate promotion to the grade he is qualified to hold.

4. Uniform and Equipment: All officers must provide themselves with complete arms, equipment, and clothing as prescribed by Uniform Regulations.

5. Appointment of Non-commissioned Officers: If all non-commissioned officers authorized your organization, have not been appointed by regimental order, you will without delay, submit a letter to your regimental commander, requesting appointment of each non-commissioned officer authorized for your unit. This will include sergeants and corporals only. First sergeants are appointed from sergeants by company order. Cooks, buglers, saddlers, and first class privates, are appointed by company order.

The appointment of each non-commissioned officer and specialist, such as cook, bugler, etc. will be noted on page 5 of the service record, in the space provided, indicating therein, the date of appointment, and quoting the paragraph, number, source and date of the order authorizing the appointment.

6. Attention is directed to Circular Letter No. 29, W. D. M. B. dated April 10, 1922, especially to pars. 4 and 5, which will absolutely govern attendance at camp.

7. Records: You will be required to bring the following records, office equipment and supplies.

Your morning report will show the number and grade of officers and enlisted men, under remarks, on right hand side of report. On last page of report under "Record of Events," will be shown the date and hour of departure from home station and arrival at camp.

8. Personal Equipment: In addition to equipment issued and required by regulations, each officer and enlisted man will bring:—Brush and comb, tooth brush and paste, hand and bath towels, toilet soap, small mirror, shaving set and bathing suit. The huge concrete swimming pool, 300x150 ft. will be available this year. It will be operated under rigid rules and regulations, and one of the rules which will be strictly enforced, is that all who use the pool, must have a bathing suit or trunks.

Subject: Estimates for funds Annual Camp 1922.

1. In reference to Encampment Letter No. 1, you are advised that the period August 14th to 28th, inclusive, is actual camp time. In making your estimates covering pay and subsistence, you should therefore, add two additional days covering one day travel to and one day travel from Camp Dodge, Iowa. The same procedure should be followed in reference to the Artillery units ordered to Camp Knox, Kentucky, except that four days additional should be added, allowing two days from home station to Camp, and two days returning to home station.

2. In addition to the trops indicated in *Encampment Letter No.* 1, the Militia Bureau advises that an advance and retained detachment to be utilized for the purpose of preparing and breaking camp may be sent to camp two days in advance of the regular camp and the retained detachment may be retained two days after the camp. These detachments should not exceed in number one officer below field rank, and 20 enlisted men. Therefore, estimates should be prepared covering the detachments referred to, in addition to the regular camp, and the four days camp of instruction, immediately preceding the regular annual camp.

3. The plan, as outlined in the last sentence of paragraph two, Encampment Letter No. 1, is altered, insofar as it refers to the units mentioned therein, being mobilized. In lieu thereof, those units referred to will be mobilized for the full four (4) days immediately preceding the regular camp period, allowing one day in addition to reach camp. The additional day to return to home station will be figured in addition to their regular camp period.

From: The Adjutant General of Iowa. To: All Officers, Iowa National Guard. Subject: Suggestions.

1. Pursuant to Encampment Letter No. 7, announcing receipt of authority and the dates for the Annual Camp and Field Training, Iowa National Guard, it is desired to emphasize to each individual officer that he has a duty to perform in connection therewith, beyond that of merely following rules and regulations. It is therefore suggested that each officer keep this Camp in mind, and inject his own individual efforts and personality into a campaign of missionary work at the home station. In addition, it is suggested that all Commanding Officers of organizations, assemble their officers at once, and devise a plan to present the matter of the camp to the various commercial organizations of the community, with a view toward obtaining their support and co-operation in approching employers of members of the National Guard on the subject of granting such employees the time covering Camp period without loss of pay, or at least agree to pay the difference between what they would earn in their employ, and what the man would receive from the Government during camp.

2. Select your most reliable non-commissioned officers, and include them in your conferences, have them sound out the men in reference to the attitude of parents and employers, and when it is evident some antagonism exists, make it a point to have an officer meet the employer, or parent as the case may be, and change their unfavorable attitude to a favorable one. Many times a misunderstanding exists, which can be entirely eliminated by personal contact, and proper presentation of facts. Keep before the men that the annual camp is the final analysis of their armory work, and that at camp they will be able, by contact with troops, from other parts of the state, to see with their own eyes, other men doing those same things they have been trained to do, and in this way draw a comparison, and profit accordingly.

3. Appoint one of your officers as publicity agent for your organization, and see that he keeps up a persistent campaign of publicity in your local papers. Make the material he submits, snappy and interesting, and on subjects which will attract and hold the attention of your home folks.

4. Your annual armory inspection has just been completed and the reports submitted to the War Department by the Inspectors, have been received by this department. You are all to be congratulated, and while there are irregularies and discrepancies, which must be corrected, the improvement and average showing made by the Guard of this State, is above the average and receives high praise from all administrative officers.

In view of the increased importance of the National Guard as a medium of National Defense, and inasmuch as the people of this Country are firm believers in *Citizen Soldiers*, and not professional soldiers, I take the liberty of again requesting and urging the active co-operation and support of your organization, to the end that this year's camp may be more successful than last.

The assistance which a commercial organization, with its numerous departments, is able to give to a proposition such as this, may be briefly stated:

(1) Obtain the support of every employer in your community, to the extent they will encourage their employees to join the Guard. Encourage these same employers to pay the men in their employ, who are National Guard men, for the Camp Period, or at least pay the difference between what they draw from the Government, and what they would ordinarily earn.

(2) Your organization can do more to correct any feeling of antagonism, which may exist in the minds of parents, or employers, than any other organization, if it will but make the effort.

I will not take up your time in detailing the advantages the young men of your community derive from membership in the National Guard, nor will I deal with the financial return derived by the community from state allowances, pay, and armory rents, etc., you already know, or should know those things, from personal contact and observation, but I do ask, and I do urge, that you make a special effort to co-operate with the commanding officer of your local National Guard unit, and help him at this time, as well as at other times.

May I suggest that you call in the officers of the organization located in your city, and have them give you their views on the matter, and extend to them your support of any constructive plan they may present.

Subject: Mobilization; General information and instructions.

1. The following is published for your information, and is final, provided the Militia Bureau does not withdraw the authority received by this department.

(a) Officers and enlisted men, State Staff Corps and Departments, Officers and enlisted men of 67th Infantry Brigade Headquarters and Headquarters Company, all Regimental and Field Officers, 67th Infantry Brigade and 113th Cavalry, Commanding Officers and one sergeant (to act as mess sergeant) of each medical unit, mess sergeants and cooks of all companies and troops, and Officers and enlisted men, less band, of all service companies and troops, will mobilize at Camp Dodge, four days immediately preceding the regular camp, for camp of instruction, one day additional will be allowed for travel to Camp Dodge,

An advance and retained detachment, to be utilized for the pur-(b) pose of perparing and breaking camp, will be sent to camp two days in advance, and be retained two days after close of camp. These detachments will not exceed in number, one officer below field rank, and 20 enlisted men, they will be ordered to duty by this department.

(c) The Field Artillery Units, Iowa National Guard will mobilize for annual camp at Camp Knox, Kentucky, August 6th to 20th, and in addition, four days will be allowed to cover travel to and from Camp Knox. These organizations will take only personal equipment, as all training equipment, quarters, cots, kitchen utensils, rations, etc., will be furnished at Camp Knox.

(d) The regular 15 day annual camp and field training for State Staff Corps and Departments, 67th Infantry Brigade and the 113th Cavalry, Iowa National Guard will be held at Camp Dodge, Iowa, during the period August 14th to 28th, inclusive, two days additional being allowed to cover travel to and from Camp Dodge, except those officers and enlisted men attending the camp of instruction immediately preceding the regular camp, who will be allowed one day additional to return to home station. The day allowed to cover travel to camp being covered in transportation to Camp of Instruction.

(e) Authority has been requested for the detail of 15 regular army officers, and 15 regular army sergeants, as instructors for Infantry, Cavalry, and Medical Units, and also in special arms of the Service.

(f) Important: The final Order designating Camp Commander, troops ordered to Camp, and dates of camp, will be issued by this department. Orders covering Departure from Home Station; Transportation, Travel Orders, Uniform to be worn, equipment to be carried by officers and men enroute, and all other necessary orders pertaining to the prompt and efficient handling and control of the troops of your command, will be issued from your headquarters.

Subject: Typhoid Inoculation and Vaccination for Smallpox.

1. You are directed to furnish this department at once, with the names of two (2) civilian doctors at your home station, who were in the Military Service during the World's War, and who in your judgment would be willing to give the Typhoid inoculation and vaccination for Smallpox, to the officers and men of your command. One of these doctors will be chosen upon the recommendation of the Chief Surgeon. *Please do not mention this to either of the men you recommend*, in order not to offend the one not chosen. *Be sure* to recommend those whose standing in the community is good and one who will use *tact and diplomacy* with the men.

2. It is desired that every man receive this treatment, but it is not desired that force be used in attaining the result, but it is believed it can be accomplished by the commanding officer and the doctor explaining fully to the men, the benefits of such treatment, and by getting your most reliable non-commissioned officers in the proper frame of mind beforehand. This treatment can be accomplished by having it given Saturday evening, or Sunday morning, and you may count it a regular drill.

3. Should there be a National Guard Medical Officer stationed at your home station, he will accomplish the treatments under the direction of the Chief Surgeon.

4. This department will furnish the necessary virus and serum, but the doctor will furnish the necessary needles, etc.

5. The Chief Surgeon has recommended that a fee of \$1.00 per man be allowed for complete treatment.

6. Attached hereto is a brief statement to be read to the men, which will disabuse their minds that any danger exists in taking the treatment, and also points out the benefits derived by taking advantage of the opportunity thus presented.

#### TO BE READ TO THE COMMAND

It has been proven without any question of doubt that vaccination for smallpox and inoculation for typhoid fever will practically prevent these two dread diseases, which have always taken such a heavy toll in all wars and all mobilization of troops previous to the World's War.

There were thousands of deaths from typhoid fever during the Spanish-American War, the plague stricken camp of Chickamaugua and Jacksonville are still vivid in the minds of those of us who were in the Spanish-American War.

Then came improved camp sanitation and typhoid inoculation with the result that during the period of the mobilization of the Regular Army, and the National Guard on the Mexican Border, 1911-16, there was not a single death from typhoid fever.

During the World's War with four million American troops engaged, there were only a few cases and practically no deaths from typhoid fever; this was not an accident in either case but was due to the fact that the men were immune from typhoid fever.

Young men are more liable to contract typhoid fever than middle-aged or old men and for that reason, every young man should have a typhoid inoculation which will render him immune from contracting the said disease.

There is no danger nor any bad effects resulting from typhoid inoculation, sometimes there is a slight headache or pain in back and legs, but this lasts for only a few hours, however it is better that no active exercise be indulged in for from twelve to eighteen hours; therefore the giving of the inoculation on Saturday evening or Sunday morning is desirable so that there need be no loss of time from work.

The conditions under which this award will be made are to be under such rules and regulations as may be promulgated from your department.

1. The following letter from the Chief, Militia Bureau, is published for your information:

Subject: Encampment Expense.

To: The Adjutant General of Iowa.

1. Owing to the limited amount of funds appropriated for National Guard encampments as passed by Congress, and now pending approval by the President, I have to advise you that it will be necessary to eliminate all four day schools, state competitions or rifle camps of instruction, and items of horse hire included in 15 day camp estimates for the fiscal year, 1923.

2. It is requested that this Bureau be advised by indorsement hereon, at the earliest practicable date, if any amount of funds for such was included in estimates submitted and if so what amount can be cancelled from the reservations made on the books of this Bureau.

3. It is requested that steps be taken to cancel any orders issued in connection with 4 day schools or any other obligations that may have been incurred in connection with such items, and the report submitted should show the amount that can be cancelled by items as transportation, bills of lading, pay, subsistance, travel rations, horse hire and incidentals.

4. The original estimate of the Militia Bureau for the appropriation bill for 1923 so far as the particular item "Expenses, camps of instruction" (from which all the above classes of expenditure are paid) is concerned, was \$12,000,000. The item as contained in the Budget estimates of the War Department was \$8,000,000. During the months succeeding the submission of the estimates, the National Guard developed to the extent that its present strength is approximately 155,000. In defending the estimates before Congressional Committees, this Bureau strongly urged that the appropriation be not less than \$9,500,000 for expenses of camps, which, under present and prospective conditions, would have provided for the requirements of the National Guard in this matter. It is believed that growth will be accelerated during the summer months and that the average strength during the encampment periods will reach at least 160,000. It is further believed that about ninety per cent of this strength will attend the encampments, i. e., about 145,000. The average cost per individual (officers and enlisted men) for the 15 day encampments for the fiscal year 1922, was \$56.26, and this amount will be increased by the new Army Pay Law. Multiplying this past average cost by the anticipated attendance of about 145,000, makes a total cost of \$8,157,000. The appropriation provided by Congress is \$8,100,000. If the estimated attendance of ninety per cent of the actual strength is fairly correct, it will be seen that the appropriation provided will be consumed by the expenses of 15 day encampments and leave no funds to provide for the expenses of sending rifle teams to the National Matches of 1922, for the holding of State rifle competitions, and for rifle camps of instruction. The elimination of the item of horse hire is necessary in view of the possible excess of 15 day camp expenses over the appropriation and because of the closeness of the anticipated expenses to the amount of funds provided. If, however, the actual attendance should be appreciably less than the above estimate of ninety per cent of the strength, the resulting savings in funds may permit of application of the resulting savings to the rifle camps of instruction, etc., but this cannot be determined until after the 15 day encampments are over. The Militia Bureau desires that preference shall be given to the 15 day encampments and will apply the funds with that end in view, giving all the States opportunity to participate in such encampments on an equal basis, and will apply any resulting savings in the fund to the other purposes which, for the present, must be held in abeyance.

5. The prompt return of this communication with the report called for in paragraph 3 above is requested.

## Encampment Letter No. 28.

Subject: Annual Encampment 1922—Preparations to be made.
To All organization Commanders, Iowa National Guard.
1. The same quarters occupied by the troops at Camp Dodge, last year, will be occupied this year, with the exception of the Cavalry units, which will occupy the buildings used by the Nebraska troops in

1921. All officers will be issued cots, but no other furniture for the rooms will be furnished. Officers will bring with them their bedding roll, and other furniture, such as camp chairs, mirrors, rugs, etc., for use in their rooms, as they desire, but keeping within the baggage allowance of 150 lbs.

2. Line officers will mess with their companies in the company barracks, and they will include as part of their baggage, such dishes, and table ware as will be necessary for their mess. In each regiment under the direction of the regimental commander, will be a regimental mess for the Field and Staff. This paragraph is subject to any change the regimental commander may order.

3. Companies will be assigned, one company to a barrack, except Battalion and Squadron headquarters companies and troops, and the regimental medical detachments. The organizations last mentioned will double up in barracks. Company barracks will be furnished with cots for each man. Don't neglect to bring your bed sacks, the cots are mighty uncomfortable without them. Each barrack contains a kitchen with coal cooking range, which eliminates the necessity for bringing your field ranges, unless the coal shortage forces the use of wood, in which event orders will be issued accordingly.

4. It will be necessary to disconnect every other row of bath houses, which will cause some little inconveniences, but in view of the other facilities provided it should be met cheerfully.

5. The huge swimming pool is completed, as is also the bathing pavilion, which will afford swimming as well as bathing facilities. This pool is 350 ft. long and 150 ft. wide, 9 ft. deep at one end and  $2\frac{1}{2}$  ft. deep at other end. Every man coming to camp should bring his *bathing suit*, otherwise he will not be permitted in the pool.

6. Cooks must bring plenty of dish cloths, scrubbing brushes, mops and brooms. No excuse will be considered for not keeping *clean and orderly kitchens, and mess halls.* Each organization will bring their own garbage cans, as none will be issued at Camp.

7. All garbage must be kept clean and free from tin cans, and glass, or any other material except purely kitchen leavings, otherwise the contractor who removes it will refuse to take it away, and the company commander will be required to dispose of it at his own expense.

8. Every effort is being made to make the camp a comfortable and pleasant place to live in, but the buildings have suffered considerable damage the past year from storms and other natural causes, and as they are to be wrecked immediately after camp, no attempt to improve them will be made. This is the last year you will occupy these buildings and it is hoped to have at least one regimental area completed by camp time next year.

Travel subsistence for enlisted men will not be allowed, but in lieu thereof, a full day ration will be issued on arrival at Camp. This will necessitate each man providing himself with a lunch when necessary. No allowance is authorized for expense incident to assembling men at Armory or their maintenance, other than from date of departure from home station to date of return thereto, both dates inclusive.

4. Each Regimental Commander will issue orders covering: Travel Uniform for Officers and men

Equipment to be carried by Officers and men

Train orders

Records to be taken

And such other orders they desire, to bring their organizations into camp with the least possible confusion.

5. It is desired that the following records and office supplies be brought to Camp:

Two steel filing cases

Typewriter

Field Desks containing: Pencils, typewriter paper, carbon paper, service records of enlisted men, enlistment papers of enlisted men, morning reports, and all training manuals issued to Companies and Troops.

A list in duplicate of Officers and men attending Camp.

A list in duplicate of Officers and men absent from Camp, with a statement as to cause of such absence.

The Company or troop field desk and typewriter should be carried in the passenger coach. The morning report will show the number and grade of Officers and men, on the left side of the report, and will give the names of Officers and men under, remarks, on the right side of the report. On last page of the report under "Record of Events," will be shown the date and hour of departure from the home station and arrival at Camp.

6. Each organization is entitled to transport 150 pounds of baggage for each ticket purchased by the Government. It is desired that the full amount of this baggage allowance be utilized in shipping heavy equipment to camp. Such equipment should be packed in appropriate bundles or crates, and should include raincoats, overcoats, cots, field ranges, machine guns with accessories, ammunition and such other equipment as in your judgment might be useful.

7. Due to the coal shortage, it is possible that sufficient coal cannot be obtained to supply the entire camp period, it is therefore necessary that all organizations bring their field ranges.

3. The morning report will show the number and grade of officers and men, on the left side of the report, and will give the name of officers and men under numbers, on the right side of the report. On last page of the report under "Record of Events" will be shown the date and hour of departure from home station and arrival at Camp.

4. Each organization is entitled to 150 pounds of baggage for each ticket purchased by the Government, and will consist of wearing apparel, bed rolls, packs and personal effects. Any other equipment, such as machine guns with accessories, field ranges, saddles, and ammunitions, or any other equipment other than that listed as checkable baggage. Each organization commander will make a list of all equipment not listed as checkable, showing its weight and description, in triplicate, one list to be left with R. R. Agent at starting point, one list deliver to Q. M. on arrival, and retain one list, and bills of lading will be made to cover.

5. Each organization should bring enough overcoats to provide protection for guard details. Subject to Regimental order to the contrary, each organization will bring the wool uniform.

All organizations will bring their field ranges, as some doubt exists in reference to obtaining sufficient coal to last the camp period.

6. Strict attention:

(a) No officer is entitled to pay who has not received Federal Recognition.

(b) Enlisted men must be bona-fide members of the organization with which they are paid, or must be attached thereto by competent authority.

(c) Should any organization have less than the minimum strength prescribed, the entire organization will be disqualified for pay.



### HEADQUARTERS CAMP DODGE

General Order No. 3 Camp Dodge, Iowa, Aug. 13, 1922.

1. Brigadier General Louis G. Lasher is hereby announced as Camp Executive.

2. The following instructions in regard to handling fires will govern for the period of this encampment.

Capt. Everett L. Pugsley, Inf., will act as Fire Marshal and the battalion and squadron adjutants as assistant fire marshals. In the absence of fire marshal and his assistants the officers of the day will act as fire marshals.

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Fire guards will be maintained at all times in the fire stations overlooking the camp by the regimental commanders in whose area the stations are situated.

Every unit commander will provide suitable fire protection for buildings occupied by their command. Several receptacles containing water should always be in readiness. Owing to the inflammable character of the camp extra precautions must be taken to guard against fire. Anyone discovering a fire will at once notify the guard in the quickest way possible. The alarm number on the telephone for a fire is 59. This number will be used at no time except in case of fire.

The sentinel on post who discovers the fire will:

(1) Give the prescribed alarm, firing three shots.

(2) At once proceed to the guard house and notify the commander of the guard.

The commander of the guard on learning of a fire will at once:

(1) Telephone the alarm to the fire station.

(2) Cause the bugler of the guard to sound fire-call repeatedly.

(3) Notify promptly the fire station, fire marshal, assistant fire marshal and the Commanding General.

All buglers will repeat the call.

All officers will at once acquaint themselves with the location of the fire station in this camp.

3. Provost and interior guard will be under supervision of a field officer of the day. He will receive his orders from the brigade commander.

The field officers of the day will be appointed by the regimental commanders from the regiment for the following periods:

133rd Infantry: August 14 to 18, inclusive.

168th Infantry: August 19 to 23, inclusive.

113th Cavalry: August 24 to 28, inclusive.

Commanding officers of the regiments will furnish these headquarters with list of the field officers of the day and their period of duty.

4. The Commanding Officers of the 133rd Infantry, 168th Infantry and 113th Cavalry will furnish guard for brigade posts as follows:

133rd Infantry: Post at each entrance to camp from north; and guard at Inter-Urban station.

168th Infantry: Post at entrance to driveway to pool. Post at entrance to general's quarters. Post at juncture of road entering camp and Des Moines Avenue.

113th Cavalry: Mounted guard patrolling main highway east of camp and unoccupied areas adjacent to camp.

1. The following rules and regulations recommended by the Chief Surgeon, for the use of the swimming pool will be observed by all members of this command:

(1) The pool will be open for the use of the troops during the following hours:

Daily-

10:00 to 11:30 a. m. 3:00 to 5:00 p. m. 6:30 to 9:30 p. m. Sunday-

8:00 to 9:30 a.m.

11:00 to 12:00 a.m.

2:00 to 5:30 p.m.

6:30 to 9:30 p.m.

(2) No one suffering from contagious skin or venereal diseases will be permitted in the pool.

(3) No one will be permitted in the pool without first having a shower bath and whose body is clean.

(4) Men may either dress or undress in the bath house or in their quarters, but in either case must take a shower at the bath house.

(5) No one will be permitted in the pool until an hour has elapsed after eating.

(6) No one, except bathers, will be permitted inside of the fences, except officers and men on duty.

(7) Life guards will be on duty during the hours the pool is open and will be obeyed by swimmers at all times while in and around the pool.

(8) No smoking will be allowed inside of the fence or within fifteen feet of the same in region of the bath house.

(9) In case of accident no swimmer will interfere in any way with the rescue work of the life guard, and will only assist when instructed.

(10) In no circumstances will anyone push or shove anyone into the pool.

(11) The bathers will provide themselves with proper bathing suit before permitted to enter the pool.

(12) The Chaplains of the regiments will be responsible for the maintainance of order and discipline and general management of the pool, and one will be on duty each day in rotation as follows: 168th Inf., 133rd Inf., and 113th Cav.

(13) Mr. D. A. Armbruster will be in charge of the life guards and have general supervision of the bath house.

(14) Care will be taken not to damage shrubbery and men will not walk on the grass inside of the fence except with bare feet.

(15) Medical inspection of the men using the pool will be made by and under the direction of the Chief Surgeon.

(16) The Field Officer of the Day will be responsible to see that there is a post maintained at the pool at all hours of the day and night when life guards are not on duty and no one will be permitted in the pool without proper authority.

The Annual Encampment of the 67th Infantry Brigade, composed of

the 133rd Infantry, 168th Infantry and the 113th Cavalry was held at Camp Dodge, Iowa, on August 14th to 28th inclusive. In accordance with G. O. No. 2, Hq. 67th Infantry Brigade, the 133rd Infantry and the 1st Squadron of the 113th Cavalry reported for range practice at the target range 1½ miles east of Camp Dodge on Tuesday, August 15th. On Wednesday, August 16th, the 168th Infantry and the 2nd Squadron of the 113th Cavalry reported for range practice. These organizations alternated range practice in this order throughout the encampment.

Troops moved out of camp at about 7:00 o'clock each morning, arriving at the target range about 7:20 A. M. All details were made in advance and the work of preparing the pit and organizing the firing line moved with precision. The most experienced officers and non-commissioned officers available were assigned to duty as instructors in sighting and aiming, position and trigger squeeze. With few exceptions, the men reported promptly, took the proper positions and used the correct sight.

The scores made were only fair, this is due to a combination of causes, first, inexperience of the man, second, faulty ammunition which reduces the scoring possibility by approximately six to fifteen per cent, third, worn or misused rifles. The foregoing present a negative scoring combination that tends to discourage even seasoned riflemen.

The noon meal was prepared in camp and delivered at the range by trucks. One hour's rest was taken at this time.

Sand bags, delivered at the 600 yard firing point by the Quartermaster Department were removed by some unknown party, this was not discovered in time to replenish the shortage prior to firing the record course. Fourteen targets were effected.

The pistol range was in constant operation, supervised by competent instructors. The majority of those armed with the pistol, Infantry and Cavalry, reported for this training.

The machine gun companies and the 37 m.m. organizations and automatic riflemen conducted firing in accordance with the schedule. The machine guns and automatic riflemen operated mostly on the 1000 inch range. At 4:00 P. M. on a number of days, the Infantry cleared the small arms range and the machine guns took up position 1000 yards, firing on target "C." The 37 m.m. guns took up position on the hill north of the old Fredrickson home and east of the Temple home, firing at targets placed on the machine gun butts. The firing was very accurate, the range was about 800 yards.

The extension of the camp water system to the target butts and the installation of two toilets adds greatly to the convenience, comfort and safety of those operating the targets.

The Brigade Commander and the Regimental Commanders were in constant touch with the progress of their respective organizations. The interest displayed by each is reflected by the keen rivalry that developed between the regiments.

The Commander-in-Chief and Staff and the Adjutant General were interested visitors.

On August 20th, a company team match between teams of four men each was held, this was won by Co. B, 133rd Infantry. On August 27th, a regimental team match was held between teams of 20 men each. This was won by the team from the 168th Infantry.

The Hon. N. E. Kendall Trophy Match brought out a field of enthusiastic entries. At the conclusion of the firing the interest was so intense it was necessary to refer the scores to a Board of Officers for decision. In my opinion there is no trophy or prize that has come into the hands of the Iowa National Guard or the Iowa Rifle Association that will furnish the stimulus to greater and sustained effort in rifle practice than will this trophy. The company commander who competes successfully for this trophy must develop his system of training with a view of interesting the recruit in rifle practice the moment he becomes a member of the organization.

This year's work showed marked improvement over last year's. It is believed that with another year's experience in this class of training, that sufficient instructors will have been developed, that it will be possible to give detailed instruction to each individual in every department of the work at all times. In my opinion the holding of rifle training in connection with the Annual Encampment is the most beneficial training policy inaugurated by the War Department in recent years, the latent possibilities being extremely valuable.

The interest at all times was markedly keen and the discipline was excellent.

Survey of the target range should be made with a view of increasing the capacity. Fifty targets, the present equipment, are not sufficient to meet the requirements at the annual encampment. Targets are now thirteen (13) feet on centers, conforming to the old 6x12 "C" target. It is believed that this spacing can be reduced to ten (10) perhaps (9) feet without interferring with operation. Target frames can be staggered, using alternate targets for long range firing. This spacing would provide ample room for firer and instructor, and add a fifteen (15) minute training period each day for 480 additional men at a nominal cost.

# REPORT OF THE CAMP OF INSTRUCTION-HELD DURING 1922

Headquarters 133rd Infantry, Iowa N. G. September 22, 1922, Des Moines, Iowa.

The Adjutant General of Iowa,

1. Pursuant to provisions of S. O. No. 127 dated A. G. O., Des Moines, Iowa, August 5, 1922, and encampment letters of instruction No. 14 dated A. G. O., Iowa, May 2, 1922, and No. 31 dated August 7, 1922, this regiment assembled at Camp Dodge, Iowa, August 13th and 14th, 1922, for field training. G. O. No. 1 and Bulletin No. 1, these headquarters, copies of which are hereto attached were issued and together with Camp Order No. 2 were received by all officers before their departure from home stations.

2. The regiment has been completely organized since the last period of field training and all units functioned properly. Strength of the regiment as reported for duty on the opening day of the Camp was 55 officers and 1,002 enlisted men, attached one chaplain, attached Medical Branch—4 officers and 30 enlisted men, total present in Camp, 60 officers and 1,032 enlisted men. This attendance is considered satisfactory, notwithstanding the fact that the number of absentees reached 219 enlisted men. Three officers were absent but in two cases the causes for such absence were unavoidable. The resignation of the third one has alreadybeen accepted.

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3. One officer and four enlisted men from the Service Company reported on August , 1922 and the Mess Sergeants and cooks of the various organizations reported as provided in S. O. No. 128, dated A. G. O., August 7, 1922. Through a misunderstanding of orders and instructions in encampment letters those from Co. B, Co. D and Regimental Headquarters Company arrived on August 10th. These men were cared for at their own expense. The advance detachments as reported were not large enough so that much preliminary work remained to be done when the troops arrived. Regimental Headquarters was established on August 12, 1922, and were prepared to receive supplies but lack of enlisted personnel prevented the delivery of them until further troops arrived.

4. Organizations of the regiment begun to arrive at 1:30 P. M., August 13th, 1922, and at 5:00 P. M. all organizations had arrived except Co. E, Webster City, which due to their late schedule of departure from home station did not arrive until 3:00 A. M. August 14, 1922. This organization did not receive its baggage until morning of the second day so that the training schedule was delayed for this company.

The same conditions in regard to uniforms and equipment present 5. at last year's field training were present again this year. Sizes are substituted in furnishing uniforms, with the result that there were a large number of enlisted men in misfit uniforms. No additional O D cotton uniforms have been furnished as recommended in my report of last year. The excessive heat during the period of the Camp of this year soaked the uniforms with perspiration, but nothing dry to change into was available except the heavy wool uniforms. The method of supplying shoes still remains unsatisfactory. An increasing number of enlisted men are forced to wear civilian shoes either because their size of shoe is not available or because those available have been worn by others until through wear and perspiration they have assumed such a shape that no one else can wear them. Repeated efforts have been made by the organization commanders of the regiment to secure the necessary clothing and equipment to completely outfit their organizations, Attached hereto are the articles short in each but without success. organization of the command based on allowances given in Circ. 169 W. D., June 23, 1921. The lack of special equipment for the Regimental Headquarters Company and the three Battalion Headquarters Companies interfered seriously with their training programme.

6. The training schedule was again satisfactory and it was carried out in full by all organizations of the regiment. The work of the Machine Gun Companies of the regiment was of a very high order and was considered to be the outstanding feature of the training period. This system of using schools and school troops was very profitable as the officers had the correct methods when the same exercises were worked out in their own commands the next drill day. The procedure of using alternate days for range practice was satisfactory to all of the command. Preliminary Training in rifle practice at home stations has not been thorough and greater effort must be made to prepare companies in this work before another period of field training.

7. The methods of purchasing and issuing the rations for the Camp were not satisfactory. It is not possible to subsist troops for such a short period on the ration savings or purchase plan. The delivery of the essentials of the ration, bread, meat, and potatoes was so uncertain that it was almost impossible to carry out a pre-arranged meal menus as required by existing subsistence regulations. Bread was frequently issued with the oven heat still evident whereas bread should have been at least 24 hours old. The delivery of ice for the first week of Camp was inadequate, of poor quality and made too late in the day. These conditions improved during the second week.

8. The condition of Company records has shown further improvement. The preparation of drill pay rolls has improved so much that all organizations of the command are receiving their drill pay within a reasonable time.

9. The intense heat during the second week of the Camp was detrimental to the best training, but notwithstanding, the general health of the command was excellent. One case of diphtheria developed in Co. G and the first series of cultures taken from the throats of the entire company disclosed three carriers of diphtheria. Rigid quarantine regulations were immediately enforced and no further cases developed. The prompt service of the Camp Surgeon in this case is commended. A physical inspection of every man in the regiment was made the first day of Camp with the result set ent i

of Camp with the result set out in a communication attached hereto. 10. The schools called for under paragraph 2, B, pages 12 and 13 of Camp G. O. No. 2 were all organized on the first day of Camp and reports on the results obtained from the regimental school Security and Information, Headquarters Companies, Automatic Rifle and Machine Gun schools also Brigade Howitzer school are attached hereto.

11. I would recommend the following for your consideration in arranging for future Camps for field training:

a. That the day of travel to Camp be another day of the week than Sunday. Many railroads do not operate Sunday trains which necessitates later departure from home stations and move special trains.

b. That an officer's school for field training with competent instructors be held from 30 to 60 days before the Camp period. This is all the more necessary since the training of the various organizations has progressed from the recruit class and close order drill stage to the point where the troops will be ready another year for some simple maneuvers.

c. That next year's field training schedule be prepared along the same lines as the one used this year with a progression in the maneuvers to include the regiment.

d. That the effort to secure additional O D cotton clothing be renewed so that each enlisted man may have two such uniforms.

e. That some other method for the issuing of shoes be tried out instead of the one now in use. With the elimination of the hob-nailed shoe the men would not object to purchase their shoes at a salvage price from year to year or when leaving the command, provided they have been worn through a field training period.

f. That an effort be made toward having the Service Company less band to report at least two days before the opening of the Camp and that they be retained an additional day at the close of Camp to complete the collection and turning over of government property. g. That the method of purchasing subsistence supplies as used this year be discontinued and that the P. & D. O. purchase the component articles of the ration to the extent of 70% of the ration and that the same be delivered to him at Camp Dodge on or before the opening day of Camp. A refrigerator car to be set on the side track with the fresh meat, butter and luncheon meat specialties necessary for noon lunches at the range for the entire Camp period. That the purchases from the remaining 30% value of the ration be confined to staple articles in green vegetables and fruits. This will insure sufficient volume of rations to satisy the men. Special meats, eggs, ice cream, etc., should be purchased by the companies from Company funds.

h. That animals be supplied future Camps for the Machine Gun Companies. Much good resulted from their use during this Camp.

A word must be said about the swimming pool which was open to the men for the first time this year. That it was a popular place and added much to the enjoyment of the Camp was proven without a doubt when it was estimated that fully two-thirds of the entire Camp visited it each day. The intense heat during the days only served to increase the appreciation of the diversion it offered for the evenings. That the construction of this pool is one of the best investments the state has ever made for its National Guard was evident.

That the construction of this pool is one of the best investments the State has ever made for its National Guard was evident.

General Order No. 1

Des Moines, Iowa, August 8, 1922.

1. In pursuance to S. O. 127 Par. 1 A. G. O., Iowa, dated August 5, 1922, and S. O. 126 Par. 4 A. G. O., Iowa, dated August 4, 1922, the officers and organizations of the 133d Infantry, I. N. G. will go into camp at Camp Dodge, Iowa, on August 13-29, 1922, inclusive.

2. Verbal instructions from the Adjutant General, Iowa, authorizes pay for the Field and Staff if they arrive in camp on August 13th. Field and Staff officers will therefore report to the Commanding Officer not later than midnight August 13th at Camp Dodge.

3. Various organizations of the regiment will leave their home stations and travel by the various routes designated in letter of instructions from the Q. M. General's Dept. W. D., and in letter of instructions from the A. G. O., Iowa. Troops which arrive over the Chicago, Northwestern R. R. will transfer from the Northwestern depot to the Inter-Urban R. R. station at Des Moines. Later instructions will be issued on handling baggage.

4. En route the senior officer on any train will be in command of all troops thereon, and such officer will be held strictly accountable for conduct of troops until they arrive and are reported to Regimental Commander at Camp Dodge. Guards will be maintained on all cars and enlisted men will not unnecessarily leave cars. 5. Company Commanders will not take to camp any man incapacitated for military duty.

6. Organization commanders will have baggage and commands at depot at least 30 minutes before scheduled departure of train. Train commanders will designate an officer who will have entire charge of the loading and unloading of baggage on their trains. Organization commanders will detail one Corporal and two Privates to report to the officer in charge of baggage on each train. None but baggage detail to travel in baggage cars.

7. Troops will travel in heavy marching equipment, rain coats strapped on outside of pack for easy removal in case of rain. Mosquito nets, bed sacks and a sufficient number of overcoats necessary for the guards, O. D. wool uniforms, extra clothing and athletic equipment will be carried in chests as baggage. Baggage to be limited to 150 pounds per officer and man. Records called for in Par. 7, circular letter Encampment No. 7, will be taken to camp.

8. Each company will be carefully inspected by the Company Commander before departure from home station, to see that there are no ball ammunition either in belts or on the men. Guard Cartridges will be brought to camp, and will be packed in the original containers. At the camp the ammunition needed for range practice will be issued at the firing point. A similar inspection will be made of all troops before leaving range. Company Commanders will be held strictly accountable for any accidents caused by the failure to comply with this order.

9. Upon arrival at Camp Dodge, organizations will detrain under the supervision of train commanders, and will be directed to quarters assigned them by guides. Company Commanders and Detachment Commanders will immediately thereafter report to regimental headquarters with Morning Reports, Ration Returns, Transportation requests and lists of those present and absent.

10. Lieut.-Col. Winfred H. Bailey is detailed as Instructor of the Guard and Summary Court Officer. Summary Court will convene as directed by Lieut. Colonel Bailey. Guard duty will be performed by Company detail. Co. G will furnish the guard August 13-14; Officer of the Day, Capt. Verne Myers; Commander of the Guard, Lieut. John Anderson.

11. Major Gordon C. Hollar will have full charge of Field Meet which will consist of military, athletic events. Programs have been forwarded for same.

12. Hours of service and training schedule have been designated in G. O. No. 2 Hqs. I. N. G. Encampment, which has been forwarded you direct from the A. G. O. Sanitary regulations will be published in subsequent orders.

13. A regimental exchange will be in operation on the arrival of troops in camp.

14. Your attention is directed to the instructions contained in Encampment letters No. 7, 28 and letter these headquarters under of June 20, 1922.

Bulletin No. 1.

1. It is not contemplated that officers traveling to and from annual encampment will travel in heavy marching order. Equipment usually carried in haversack can be carried in baggage. Officers in camp will mess as provided in Par. 2, Encampment letter No. 28, A. G. O., Iowa.

2. Regulations already published concerning troops en route are emphasized and particular care will be taken that there be no accidents. Canteens must be filled before troops entrain and care exercised in the use of water.

3. No provisions will be made in orders for travel rations for the entire day rations will be issued to Mess Sergt. on arrival at camp. It would be well for Company Commanders to provide a lunch for the noon hour the 13th.

4. Large ice boxes and two ranges, with hot water boilers are provided in each barrack, but no kitchen equipment of any description is available. Organization commanders will see that their entire kitchen equipment, including the field ranges, together with dish towels, suitable clothing for cooks to cook in, cleansing materials are brought to camp. Floors of the barracks are not in the best of condition and it will take considerable scrubbing material to put them in a sanitary condition.

5. Members of any organization who are proficient in band music will bring their instruments to camp and will be detailed to band for entire period.

6. A large barrack will be set aside for use of the Chaplain and Exchange. Evening entertainments with stunts by members of the regiment attending camp will be arranged and all who can entertain will come to camp prepared to do so. It is requested that each organization prepare a little playlet and vaudeville stunts for these entertainments. Chaplain Van Metre will have charge of the entertainments in the regiment.

7. Regiment will spend 5 full days on the range and noon day mess will be served on the range. Plans should be made by each organization for these meals. In connection with duty on rifle range organization commanders will include plenty of material for cleaning rifles. Attention is directed to the trophy presented by Governor N. E. Kendall, which will be awarded to the Company or troop making the highest per cent over the record course, as prescribed in Rifle Marksmanship, based on the total commissioned and enlisted strength of the organization, as shown on the records at the commencement of the camp will receive and

hold the trophy for one year. Let's take it.

8. It will not be necessary for any soldier to have sixty days' service before being permitted to attend camp. Men may be enlisted day previous to camp and be permitted to attend and draw pay for his services. Those organizations having a strength of 65 must bring 70 per cent of that strength in enlisted men; organizations with a strength of more than 65, must bring 70 per cent of their actual strength. Organizations whose strength, as provided in "Tables of Organization" is less than 65, must bring to camp 70 per cent of their strength authorized in "Tables of Organization."

9. All officers entitled to additional pay as longevity service as an officer must file the certificate necessary from the A. G. O. as prescribed in July 28th Encampment Letter, A. G. O., Iowa.

10. Organization commanders will each bring with them one roll of roofing paper and also enough wire screen to make the barracks fly tight. This can be taken care of from funds of Miscellaneous allowance. Roofs will have to be repaired and no funds are available for same.

11. Forward immediately upon receipt of this Bulletin RATION RE-TURN made out for 5 days August 13-17th TO THE ADJUTANT. DON'T DELAY.

To: Organization Commanders 133d Infantry.

The date having been set for the annual encampment this year at Camp Dodge, Iowa, the following helps are published for the information of the Command:

1. Officers must provide themselves with all arms, equipment and clothing as prescribed in Uniform Regulations, (A. R. 600-40 Sept. 27, 1921.)

2. The following records must be in Camp with your organization: Typewriter and typewriter paper, steel filing cabinets, carbon sheets, field desks (properly packed), letter heads, pencils, pen, ink, envelopes; Service Records for all enlisted men; enlistment papers for all enlisted men; Duty Roster, Sick Book, Morning Report Book, all Training Manuals that have been issued your organization; Pay Roll Sheets. In fact all your records that are used at your home station.

3. A list in triplicate (and to save your Company Clerk additional work make it six copies) of all officers and enlisted men present in camp must be made up and turned into the Adjutant's Office at the same time you report in your organization. Also a list in triplicate of all officers and enlisted men who are absent from Camp, with a statement as to cause of absence.

4. MORNING REPORTS shall be made up and turned into the Adjutant's Office at the time you report in your organization, and must be absolutely correct. Make them up on the train and not at your Armory before you leave home; check your men and then recheck them and then recheck your Morning Report. Give all present and absent on the report. On Remarks: Give every officer and enlisted man by name and state whether A. W. L. or A. W. O. L. or sick. On Record of Events: "Left (give your home station town) at 6 P. M., C. R. I. & P. R. R. for Camp Dodge, Iowa, arrived Camp Dodge, Iowa, 8 P. M. Weather, cloudyclear-rain; Day, hot-cool. 5. All organization Commanders are familiar with the conditions at Camp Dodge in regard to barracks, latrines, kitchens, etc. So start now and get your material ready for Camp, and prepare to keep everything in a first-class sanitary condition. Have brooms, mops, plenty of dish towels, fly paper. Mosquito netting so the cooks can eliminate the flies from the food; swatters. You all know the conditions of G. I. Cans last year as to covers, etc. Eliminate that trouble by having the covers tight. Let your mechanic get busy and make about three fly traps (easy to make).

6. First day in Camp, police your barracks and latrine thoroughly and have the men make up their bunks and be ready for inspection by the Brigade Commander at 6 P. M. sharp. No organization will be overlooked even though you arrive in camp at 5 p. m., you have one hour to do it in. Instruct your men to call attention for all officers who pass through your barracks or company street and instruct them to stand at attention when it is called. Last year the Brigade Commander was compelled to go around the end of a line who were washing their mess kits in order to inspect their barracks. No one called attention. Same barrack while Colonel Ross was ascending the stairs, one private yelled at him "Get out of the way!" and the private rushed by him and on out of doors. "Can you beat that for an Inspection?" Let's do it correct this year and get off on the right foot.

7. The swimming pool will be open. Everybody with a swimming suit.

8. The Canteen will be run as usual this year.

9. BIG FIELD MEET also. Programs later for this.

General Order No. 2.

# SANITARY ORDER

1. The Regimental Surgeon, Senior Medical Officer on duty with this regiment is the Sanitary Officer of the organization.

He will inspect the camp area of this command at least once daily, paying special attention to the cleanliness and sanitation of the barracks, sanitary condition of kitchens, dining room, protection of kitchen food from flies, cleanliness of the utensils used in the preparation, cooking and serving of food, personal cleanliness of cooks and kitchen police, condition of ice-box which will be cleaned daily and kept well iced. Prompt and efficient disposal of refuse.

When practicable, Battalion and Company Commanders will be present at inspection of their area.

All sanitary defects with proper recommendations for remedy of same will be reported to the Commanders who will take the necessary means within their authority to correct the defects, if such action is not possible or is impracticable they will report the condition to these head quarters.

#### 2. GENERAL POLICE.

Battalion Commanders and Company Commanders are responsible for the general police and cleanliness within the area occupied by their command. They will see that their respective areas are ready for sanitary inspection by 7:00 A. M. and will personally inspect all parts of such area once daily. They will take such measures as are necessary to insure effective sanitation within the company area. At the inspection special attention will be given to the condition of grounds, barracks, kitchens, food and latrines.

Bedding and clothing will be aired and sunned every Tuesday and Friday, being exposed to the sun for a least two hours.

Company Commanders will assure themselves by frequent inspections, that the sleeping quarters are kept well ventilated at night, cots will be placed so that there will be as great a distance as possible between them but never less than three feet.

#### 3. WATER SUPPLY.

The water supply is clean and wholesome, in case of receptacles for ice-water care must be taken to prevent contamination by keeping all such containers scrupulously clean and covered in such a manner as to prevent dripping. Such containers will be provided with spigots and individual cups will be used at all times. As long as ice is used from present sources, none will be placed in the drinking water.

#### 4. FOODS AND DRINK.

No food, drink or like articles will be sold in this camp area except at the authorized exchange, or by persons authorized by the Camp Commander to carry on such instructions.

Attention is called to the use of the following foods, the elimination of which will serve to prevent a variety of intestinal disorders.

A. Canned milk and fish opened the day before (milk and fish poisoning).

B. Hash of meats and vegetables prepared the night previous (ptomaine poisoning).

C. Excessive drinking of soft drinks (diarrhoea).

#### 5. KITCHENS.

Kitchens and dining rooms will be kept clean and free from flies, food will be protected from flies and any other contamination.

Cooking and eating utensils will be thoroughly cleaned daily after mess, using hot water and soap followed by rinsing in clean, boiling water.

Cooks and kitchen police will keep themselves scrupulously clean at all times. Grease traps will be provided.

### 6. GARBAGE DISPOSAL.

Garbage cans will be kept inside the kitchen and after being emptied will be thoroughly scrubbed out with hot water, soap or lye. No food will be thrown on the ground.

Garbage will be disposed of as follows: All liquid garbage to run into sewer, the residue and other solid material resulting from the mess will be placed in garbage cans and hauled away daily. No bones of any description will be placed in garbage but will be burned in the kitchen fires.

Tin cans, glass and other garbage as cannot be burned in the kitchen range will be separated from other garbage and hauled away daily. All tin cans placed in garbage must be opened at both ends.

Any company failing to comply with the above instructions will be refused the privilege of having garbage removed and will be required to remove and bury their own garbage. General waste including ashes and refuse accumulated by the police of grounds and barracks will be collected by the Service Company and removed. Under no circumstances will any such refuse be burned within the Regimental Area.

## 7. LATRINES.

Latrines and bath houses will be kept clean and orderly at all times. Stools and urinals will be cleaned morning and evening and at other times when needed.

Under no circumstances will newspaper or other paper except toilet paper be used in the toilets or stools.

Care will be taken to prevent the excessive use and waste of water.

# 8. PERSONAL HYGIENE.

Men will bathe frequently and wash their hands thoroughly before each meal and after using latrines.

The swimming pool will be open at hours as specified by orders.

NO MEN with VENEREAL DISEASE, skin disease or open places on the skin will be permitted to use the Swimming Pool.

COMMANDERS OF COMPANIES WILL NOTIFY VENEREAL CASES IN THEIR COMMAND IN PERSON AGAINST THE USE OF THE SWIMMING POOL.

The feet of every man should be inspected each evening.

# 9. PHYSICAL INSPECTION.

Physical inspection will be made of every man in the company within 48 hours after arrival in camp by medical officers of the Regiment for the purpose of examination of feet, personal cleanliness, presence of vermin and detection of infectious or contagious diseases, at which time all men in the command must be examined in the presence of the Company Commander.

The dates and results of these examinations will be reported to the Camp Surgeon.

A careful record of venereal disease, if any, will be made and a report of same will be made to the Company Commander.

10. Prophylaxis stations is established at the Regimental Infirmary and all men who expose themselves to the danger of contracting venereal disease by sexual intercourse will, immediately upon return to camp, report to the Regimental Infirmary of their organization for preventative treatment.

This order will be read once to each organization at retreat and a copy will be posted on the bulletin board of each company.

August 13—Troops arrived in Camp; Company H and Hqs. Co. 2d Bn. first to arrive at 1:30 P. M. Company E, Webster City, last to arrive at 3:30 A. M. Troops all arrived in good shape and baggage was handled promptly. Inspection of Camp Area by Brigade Commander at 6 P. M.

August 14—Almost the entire day being taken up by drill as per schedule.

August 15-The entire regiment was present firing on the rifle range.

Subject: Report of Instruction at Annual Encampment.

To: Colonel Lloyd D. Ross, Old Colony Building, Des Moines, Iowa.

1. The instruction given to Regimental and Battalion Headquarters Companies comprised Map Reading, use of Magnetic Compass, Scouting and Patrolling, Visual Signaling, Field Fortifications and Practical Demonstrations of the duties of members of a war strength Command Post in actual operation with an assumed enemy.

2. The Intelligence Platoon received instruction in Scouting and Patrolling and were later taken out on Terrain Exercises where each member of the Platoon was obliged to imagine himself as a member of a Patrol out to gain information of an assumed enemy. This instruc-

tion was well received.

3. The Communication Platoon was set in operation as a Command Post and the members of the Visual Section, Courier Section, Wire Section, Radio and Panel Section, and Message Center functioned in their respective duties.

4. The Pioneer Platoon of the Regimental Headquarters Company were instructed in the different types of Field Fortifications, Trench Drainage, and Use of Camouflage. 5. On Wednesday August 23, 1922, a Demonstration of an Infantry Contact Plane in Communication with Infantry was given to the entire Personnel of all Headquarters Companies. This demonstration was valuable as it gave the men and officers an idea of the methods employed when communicating between ground and plane.

6. Both Officers and men of all Headquarters companies seemed very pleased with the instruction given. The men were interested and asked many questions, which is always a good sign that the instruction is sinking in. Some effort should be made to get this instruction in print and pass same out to the officers of these companies. At the present time they are hampered for lack of material and without this material they have no inspiration to carry the work already begun forward. The writer is more than willing to prepare instruction as mentioned above and send it to Des Moines to be mimeographed and sent to the different Commanding Officers. The work of Lt. Donovan deserves special credit. His grasp of each situation was clear and the work performed by his company in setting up a Command post could not have been better done by regular troops.

1. In compliance with Par. (b) Page 12, G. O. No. 2, Hqrs. Iowa National Guard Encampment, 1922, the Regimental Machine Gun School was organized as ordered, and functioned on the dates specified, viz.: August 16-August 18-August 21 and August 23.

2. Organization:

Owing to the fact that the animals furnished were unbroken, it was necessary to spend a longer time than was otherwise necessary, to accustom these animals to harness. Therefor the first day was spent almost entirely in this work, and in instructing the personnel concerning the organization of the company at war strength. However this training was in a sense invaluable to the men, as they were given an opportunity to actually perform work that some of them had never seen before, and to gain an idea as to what the actual handling of animals meant.

3. Program:

The school periods, other than the first day, August 16th, were spent in actual drill of the company with animals, and a practice march. In addition to the time allotted, it was the privilege of the Machine Gun Companies to utilize the animals on three different days in marching to the machine gun range, and to appear as a war strength organization with animals in the Governor's Review.

4. Benefits:

It is the opinion of this officer that the school as organized was of great benefit to the men and officers, inasmuch as it gave them a chance

to actually see a war strength company, and gave both officers and men alike valuable training in things it is not possible to give in Armories. The interest taken in the work exceeded all expectations, and both officers and men are to be commended for the excellent showing made.

8th Day-Range firing with automatic rifle.

9th Day-Firing with automatic rifle.

4. I find that the lessons in security and information as taught in the various schools held during this tour of encampment has been very helpful to the officers and men of this battalion, they being lessons for good study to work on for Armory instruction this winter.

5. The general morale of the men of this battalion is good.

Camp Dodge, Iowa, August 28, 1922. Subject: Report on Rifle Companies, 1st Battalion, 133rd Inf., Iowa N. G. To: The Commanding Officer, 133rd Inf., Iowa N. G. 1. "A" Company. Strongest features, school of soldier, military courtesy, platoon drill. Weakest features, non-commissioned officers do not understand drill regulations, so consequently cannot instruct the men as to the proper movements in squad drill. Extended order by company very good for the amount of training the men have had. At first when on duty with this company there was a tendency of the men to lag on formations but after once being cautioned, by the instructor the company was never late for formation.

2. "B" Company. Strongest features, school of soldier, military courtesy, platoon drill, bayonet combat. Weakest features, non-commissioned officers with the exception of a few are not familiar enough with infantry drill regulations to instruct their men properly, on a problem conducted by this company they were fired upon and instead of deploying they merely squatted in the road, the men had no conception of extended order whatsoever.

3. "C" Company. Strongest features, school of soldier, military courtesy, platoon drill, bayonet combat. Weakest features, non-commissioned officers with the exception of one sergeant, this man stands head and shoulders over any non-commissioned officer in the battalion. The NCO do not have the knowledge of drill regulations that they should have and therefor could not instruct their men properly. The men of this company do not have any knowledge of extended order, in one problem the company was acting as a support the advance party was fired upon, the support instead of deploying squatted in the road.

4. Summing all up, these companies once they made a mistake and were corrected did not commit the same error twice, the non-commissioned officers were always ready to assist in any way that was possible. The officers are all hard workers and do the best that they are capable of. At first there was a tendency in all organizations to be late for formation but after the first day all outfits moved out on schedule.

Subject: Report on tour of field training. To: The Adjutant General of Iowa.

1. In compliance with orders and encampment letters from the Adjutant General of Iowa, the 113th Cav., Iowa N. G. went into camp at Camp Dodge, Iowa, on August 13, 1922, all troops arriving before 6 p. m. on that date. Mess sergeants and cooks had preceded the organizations into camp, and Captain Lambert, supply officer, made arrangements to draw provisions and forage so that all organizations had meals ready upon their arrival, and forage was available for the animals.

2. On Monday, August 14, the regular schedule was commenced and followed out practically as outlined during the entire tour of duty. The squadrons alternated upon the range as provided in the schedule, and only a very small number of cooks and mess sergeants were all, out of the entire regiment, that did not complete the prescribed course of rifle and pistol firing. The regiment did very good shooting, and placed 5 teams in the first 13 teams on the range. The range work was in charge of Capt. H. W. Sellers, 113th Cav., and the work was done in a satisfactory manner to the Regimental Commander, considering the fact that the organization is a new one, the records made by different organizations are considered to be most excellent.

3. Much valuable assistance was given in the training of the regiment by Lt. Col. Martin of the regular service, who is a most excellent instructor, and a valuable man for duty with N. G. troops. All organizations were given instruction in equitation and showed very marked improvement after a few days of work. Various problems were worked out by squadron, and one night problem was worked out by 1st Squadron, under command of Major Yenter. Instruction was given in advance guard duty in patrolling and various other things, and the school of the trooper, squad, platoon, and troop were taken up.

4. Practice march with full equipment was provided for each squadron. The 1st Squadron, leaving Camp Dodge on August 24, marched to the state fair ground, and the men were required to do individual cooking. The day was extremely warm, and many of the horses and men were feeling badly on their arrival into camp. No work was done the morning of August 25, as the men and animals were given an opportunity to rest. On the evening of August 25, a mounted program was put on at the state fair, after which the squadron, under the command of Major Yenter, made a night march into camp.

On August 26 the 2nd Squadron, under command of Major Merrick, made a practice march to the state fair grounds, going into camp on the ground occupied by 1st Squadron. The day being cool the trip was made in very good time, and without injury to any horses or men. A mounted program was put on in the evening of August 26, and on the morning of August 27 the squadron returned to Camp Dodge. The men on this march were required to do individual cooking. A warning order was issued in regard to the march the day before the 1st Squadron left camp, then a march order was issued and each squadron was required to do advance guard work, and to put out outposts on arriving at camp, and the squadron commanders were required to issue orders covering these matters. A copy of these were furnished to the senior instructor on duty with this organization.

5. Field officers of the regiment were required to solve certain problems submitted by our regular army officers, and the solutions in all cases were most satisfactory.

6. The band was mounted upon horses belonging to various troops, and made a very creditable showing whenever they turned out. The Regimental Commander has waited for seven years to see a mounted band at the head of the cavalry, and was more than pleased with the success obtained this year.

7. The officers, as a whole, while mostly inexperienced, gave close attention to duty, and performed their duties in a most satisfactory manner. There are a very few officers in the regiment whom it will be necessary to eliminate within a short time, and recommendations will be made later in regard to them.

The field officers are all men of experience, and performed excellent service during the entire camp.

8. The supply department, as conducted by Major Coe and his assistants, functioned in excellent shape. We had the best service that I have ever had at Camp Dodge, and you are to be congratulated upon this service.

The program did not work out to the entire satisfaction of my organization. It is recommended that next year a program for cavalry be prepared, which will only provide for drills in the morning, and the afternoon be devoted to schools, stables, incidentals and ceremonies. It is my opinion that more can be done for the benefit of the organization in this way.

9. I wish to take this opportunity of thanking Lt. Col. Cornell for the many valuable suggestions made during the tour of duty, and his willingness at all times to fix the program to suit the existing conditions.

10. I feel that this tour of duty was most valuable to the organization, and believe that with sixty days' training the regiment could take the field and give a most excellent account of itself.
11. I wish to thank the Commander-in-Chief through you for the many courtesies extended by him and for his great personal interest in

the N. G., and his willingness at all times to aid us in every way possible. You showed a great interest in the guard and the welfare of the various organizations which helped us wonderfully in making the camp a success. It was a pleasure to serve with and under you in this tour of duty, and I can assure you that your efforts in our behalf were appreciated by all the officers and men, and I wish to congratulate you upon the success of the tour of duty.

To: The Commanding Officer, 7th Corps Area, Omaha, Nebraska. The following report on the Field Training, August 13 to 29, 1922, inclusive, of the Iowa National Guard is submitted:

1. The Camp:

Camp was held at Camp Dodge, Iowa. The troops occupied the temporary buildings still remaining from the former National Army Cantonment. A detachment of one officer and twenty (20) enlisted men were sent to camp some days previous to the arrival of troops to prepare the quarters. One (1) Mess Sergeant and two (2) Cooks from each organization preceded their organization one (1) day to draw rations and prepare a meal before the arrival of the organization.

2. Commanding General:

The Camp was commanded by Brigadier General Mathew A. Tinley, Iowa N. G.

3. Overhead Organization:

(a) Supply:

All activities pertaining to supply, finance and transportation were under Major Howard D. Coe, Q. M. C., Iowa N. G., U. S. P. & D. O., who was assisted by one (1) captain and one (1) 1st Lieutenant, Q. M. C., Iowa N. G., The efficient manner in which this was handled reflects credit on Major Coe and his assistants.

(b) Medical.

A Field Hospital was established by Lt. Col. Wilbur S. Conkling, M. C., Iowa N. G., which was of great value to the Camp. Col. Conkling also had charge of the sanitation of the camp, and is entitled to special mention on account of the efficient manner in which he performed his duties. The newly organized Ambulance Co., functioned efficiently.

4. Transportation:

(a) Motor Vehicles:

The following motor vehicles issued to the State by the Government were used:

29 Trucks.

19 Motorcycles with side cars. 1 Dodge Repair Truck.

(b) Animal drawn vehicles:

9 Ambulances.

6. Target Range:

Target Practice was held for all Troops including Machine Gun and Machine Rifle. Infantry Regiments alternated on their portion of the range, while the Cavalry alternated Squadrons on their section.

7. Instruction:

There was a shortage of Instructors in both the Infantry and Cavalry Regiments, the Officers and Non-Commissioned Officers on duty with the Iowa N. G., not being sufficient to obtain the best results in Camp. Lt. Col. I. S. Martin, Cavalry, detailed with the Cavalry Regiment, rendered very efficient service.

The detail that gave instruction in Chemical Warfare service were of great value to those organizations.

The Terrain Team (Lt. Colonels George W. Harris and Charles W. Tillotson) from Fort Leavenworth did excellent work and were of material benefit to the Officers of the Camp.

8. Training Program:

With the exception of a few minor changes the Training Program was closely followed.

9. General Police and Sanitation:

The general police and sanitation throughout the camp was "Very Good," due to the special efforts of the regimental Commanders and the Chief Surgeon.

10. Discipline and Morale:

The discipline throughout the camp was "Excellent" and the Morale was high.

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Memorandum:

Pursuant to Memorandum issued from Brigade Headquarters, Camp Dodge, Iowa, August 16, 1922—Captain Maxwell A. O'Brien, Troop "F" 113th Cavalry, Iowa National Guard, and 1st Lieut. Philip J. Crail, Troop "D" 113th Cavalry, Iowa National Guard; submit the following report:

The above named officers spent most of the time allotted to observations of the methods used by the officers and the actions of the men, and the condition and training of the horses, and taking into consideration the fact that the regiment is only one year old, the men practically all recruits, it is believed that the officers and organizations have a good basic understanding of what is expected of them, as officers and men.

We found the morale of the regiment, particularly that of the second squadron, to be excellent and the spirit of co-operation existing between the officers and men was of the best.

'In a spirit of constructive criticism; your observers would suggest that the officers use more hand signals, especially for the minor commands, thereby doing away with considerable noise and confusion, that was

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#### noticeable at various times.

We further suggest that more of the fundamental principles of equitation be taught both officers and men.

A number of the farriers and stable sergeants did not know their prescribed duties and required the assistance of the veterinarian for minor injuries and ailments that they should have been able to care for. That on marches participated in by this regiment the head of the

column did not observe the regulation gaits prescribed, thereby causing confusion and unnecessary fatigue on the end of the column.

Subject: Annual Encampment, 1922.

1. The following report concerns the Federal Encampment, held at Camp Knox, Ky., from August 6 to 20, 1922.

2. The trip was made in Standard Pullman Sleepers, leaving Davenport at one o'clock, p. m., August 4th over the C., B. & Q. R. R., from Chicago to Louisville over the Monon, and from Louisville to Camp Knox over the I. C.

3. The fifteen days at Camp Knox were very successful, considering the amount of wheeled and motor equipment available. The Iowa Artillery were supplied with 18—5-ton Holt tractors. After the second day of driving instruction it was found necessary to discard six of the tractors, as they were badly run down and it was not deemed advisable to use the tractor drivers for repairing the tractors. It was thought that the time should be devoted to the more important work of instruction, therefore, on days of firing, we were only using one platoon of each Battery in our firing work as the tractors, when taken out, would cause considerable confusion and unnecessary work for the mechanics and drivers, thereby delaying the organization in getting into position.

4. The Headquarters Detachment and Combat Train was not given the proper instruction, as no motor trucks or motor cycles were available for instruction purposes.

5. The return trip was made over the I. C.—Big Four—and C., M. & St. P. R. R., passing through Louisville and Chicago. The service of all lines on which we travelled was good, but wish to mention especially the courtesy and service of the Big Four, which was excellent, and it is recommended that, if the Iowa Artillery is ordered to Camp Knox next year, they be routed from Davenport to Chicago over the C., B. & Q. R. R.—from Chicago to Louisville over the Big Four, and from Louisville to Camp Knox over the I. C. The above named roads gave the best service on this year's and last year's trips.

4. For your use, an additional copy of instructions for the preparation of estimates is inclosed, in accordance with which you will please prepare your estimates.

Corps and Departments; officers and enlisted men of the 67th Infantry Brigade Headquarters, and Headquarters Company; all Regimental and Field officers Infantry and Cavalry; Commanding Officers and mess sergeants of all Infantry and Cavalry medical units; all officers and enlisted men 186th Ambulance Company; mess sergeants and cooks of all other Infantry and Cavalry units, except Service Companies and Troops, will mobilize at Camp Dodge four days immediately preceding the date for camp. 1. Attached hereto is correspondence relative to estimate for funds for annual camp of Iowa Field Artillery, and your attention is invited to the first indorsement of the O. I. C. N. G. A., 7th Corps Area, sub paragraph (a).

2. The National Defense Act provides that organizations of the National Guard shall participate in encampments, maneuvers, etc., at least 15 days in training each year. A period of 15 days actual training is none too long, and if the Chief, M. B. rules that the days of travel from home station and return be deducted from the training period, it will eliminate at least three days from actual training time. This deduction as follows:

(1) one day from home station to camp

(1) one day setting up camp

(1) one day breaking camp and entraining

This would apply to troops going into camp at Camp Dodge. The Artillery troops going into camp at Camp Knox, would require at least two days each way for travel.

3. Authority was granted last year for the additional travel days. It

is therefore, requested that similar authority be granted for the F. Y. 1924 encampment, as follows: Troops to Camp Dodge, Iowa 2 days travel from and to home station 15 days actual training in camp Troops to Camp Knox, Ky. 4 days travel from home station and return 15 days actual training in camp

Subject: Bill of Fare for 100 men for one week, at annual camps To: All Organization Commanders, Iowa National Guard

1. The menu submitted here below has been carefully prepared with a view of furnishing Mess Officers and Mess Sergeants with a guide to what should constitute a balanced ration for men under training conditions.

2. An examination will show that the food provided for each day contains not only the necessary number of "calories" for the work involved, but also a sufficient quantity of the three necessary food factors which may be necessary to maintain good health under training conditions.

3. In figuring out the cost of the ration on this menu, it is taken that the Army Ration would cost about thirty cents. But with an allowance of fresh fruit, and cereal for breakfast—a salad of some raw vegetable like tomatoes, cucumbers, onions, lettuce or cabbage—a pint of fresh milk or buttermilk for each person per day, added will bring the cost of the ration to approximately 45c per dáy in any training camp within the continental limits of the United States.

4. It is not intended that the bill of fare should be blindly followed for the articles of each meal. It will be found that quantities will vary according to the appetites of the members of the mess and the local markets. In some instances a liberal allowance of milk and sugar has been provided over and above what would be used for the particular meal, but as a rule a pint of milk per day has been provided for each person, which is to be used in some form. The same thing may be said of fruits, cereals and fresh vegetables. It will be found there is a liberal allowance of money to provide for seasonings, condiments, and spices used, although these articles have not been estimated in each case.

1. Training Memorandum No. 1, these headquarters, will be issued in a few days and will answer part of the questions above.

2. Questions asked in paragraph 1 of basic letter are answered as follows:

(a) Lieutenant Colonel W. A. Cornell, Cavalry, will, after consulting with you and the higher commanders interested, assume the responsibility for preparing the programs of instruction covering the encampment period. In this work he will be at liberty to call upon the Infantry officers to prepare the Infantry part of the program. He and Captain Branson should prepare 'the Cavalry part. There being no Artillery officer on duty, Colonel Cornell will probably call upon the Major of the

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Artillery battalion to submit a program. Lieutenant Colonel Jay R. Shook, Medical Corps, Kansas City, Missouri, being detailed as Instructor for all Medical units, in the Corps

Area, should be called upon to prepare the Medical program. These programs will then be submitted to these headquarters for approval.

When programs have been approved detailed schedules should be made out by responsible commanders. See the distinction made between a program and a schedule in paragraph 55, Training Regulations, 10-5, War Department, 1921.

If you prefer to do it, you may submit your schedules of instruction for approval without previously submitting a program. The program will be evident from the schedule.

3. It is expected that the officers who will come from Fort Leavenworth to conduct terrain exercises in the Organized Reserve Camps, July 16 to 30, will be available to prepare and conduct terrain exercises for National Guard camps in August.

Your camp will be provided for as fully as possible under the circumstances.

2. In this connection you are advised that letter from Hq. 7th Corps Area, dated Mar. 30, 1923, informs that the Militia Bureau has ruled that the 15 day camp shall include the time necessary for travel to and from Camp, about 24 hours of travel being involved.

3. In view of the ruling quoted, you will, in preparing the training schedules, take into consideration the following facts, so as to permit the program being started the second day after mobilization at camp, and ending next to last day of camp. The first day of the training period will be consumed by travel to camp. The last day of the training period will be consumed by travel to home station. The second day of the training period will be consumed in making camp, and coordinating the camp activities.

This will leave but 12 days for actual training from which one day will be devoted to Governor's Day. Actually 11 days only can be devoted to training, five of which will be on the rifle range.

It is further desired that the schedule and program be so arranged that the first few days provide a minimum of exertion, as the personnel are not in physical condition to receive the maximum. The work should be progressive in its relation to the physical strain on the men.

In the case of the Artillery units to Camp Knox, Kentucky,—two days to Camp Knox and two days returning to home station should be allowed, and the schedule and program be confined to 11 days' training.

4. It is a self evident fact that the National Guard of this and possibly other states, will go into camp this year, under very serious difficulties, and it is desired that every effort be made by all concerned, to meet these difficulties and give the troops every benefit possible.

Training Circular No. 1, Militia Bureau, January 29, 1923. Training Regulations, 10-5, W. D., 1921.

1. Training Circular No. 1, Militia Bureau January 29, 1923, states the objects in view and the policy to be followed in field training of the National Guard.

2. The Chief of the Militia Bureau has stated, in acting on estimates, that for the fiscal year 1924 no schools of instruction will be authorized other than those made a part of the regular encampment periods; also that the period of training will be limited to fifteen days, which must include necessary time consumed in travel.

3. The available instructional period will be divided so that the proper proportions will be allotted for:

(a) Individual training

- (b) Tactical training of small units
- (c) Target practice, for those units which do not have facilities for target practice at home stations
- (d) Tactical training of field officers by means of terrain exercises and tactical walks or rides
- (e) Tactical training of units larger than a company.

In the division of time the state of armory instruction and the instructional needs of organizations and individuals must govern.

4. Programs for battalions and higher units should provide for such tests and inspections as will permit the commander to judge the proficiency attained.

Individuals whose instruction is less advanced than others of their organization should be given separate and intensive instruction in order that progress of the organization may not be delayed.

5. Under the authority contained in Par. 459, National Guard Regulations, 1922, the senior Regular Army Instructor on duty with the National Guard in the several states, will, in consultation with the state authorities and the higher commanders, prepare the necessary programs of instruction for the encampment. In this he will be assisted by the other Regular Army officers on duty in the state.
Detailed schedules of instruction will be prepared by the responsible commanders in accordance with the approved program of instruction.
6. Standards of proficiency will be as set forth:
(a) For Infantry: War Department Doc. 844.

- (b) For Cavalry: Cavalry Memo. No. 3, March 3, 1921.
- (c) For Field Artillery: Field Artillery Memo. No. 7, W. D., March 11, 1921.

7. The senior Regular Army officer on duty in each camp will make the necessary assignments of officers for the field inspection required by Par. 462, National Guard Regulations, 1922.

8. Such Regular Army officers and non-commissioned officers as are or may be placed at the disposal of the Corps Area Commander for the purpose will be ordered to duty at National Guard encampments.

9. Organizations proceeding to camp other than their own state camp, will be informed of the facilities and equipment available to them at such camp. They will take with them the additional equipment required for efficiently carrying out the prescribed programs of instruction.

Requisitions for artillery ammunition should request delivery at the point where practice is to be held.

10. When a National Guard organization proceeds to a camp other than its own, if possible, a small advance detachment, including a supply officer, should precede the organization, for the purpose of locating the assigned camp area, drawing available equipment, etc. Upon termination of the encampment, the camp area should be thoroughly policed and. if possible, a small detail should be left behind to turn in the property.

Subject: Loss of property at encampments, armories, etc. To: All Officers, Iowa National Guard.

The following is extracted from Militia Bureau Circular Letter No. 1. 38, now in the hands of the printer.

These extracts are for the purpose of giving advance notice of 2.certain provisions of C. L. 38, which will govern surveys of property lost or stolen at Camp. The surveying officer has no choice in the matter, and must make his report on the evidence submitted.

3. The fact that a pistol was left in a tent while the soldier to whom it was charged, left the tent, and who upon his return found the pistol missing, is not sufficient to relieve the state from responsibility or-a soldier placed his revolver, belt and holster in the tent while shaving, he saw an arm reach under the tent and remove the articles. An alarm was given at once and a search made, without result. This evidence is not sufficient to relieve the state from responsibility.

4. In order to prevent future losses of pistols and revolvers, under circumstances such as has been quoted, or for any other like reason, it is directed that hereafter during encampments, revolvers, pistols, field glasses and other similar articles, must be kept securely locked in chests or boxes, at all times when not actually in use on guard duty, at drill, or other authorized military duty; that the number of pistols and revolvers taken to camp be limited to the minimum actually required, and that each organization take to camp a suitable container, provided with proper locks, for the storage of these articles when not in use. This box or chest will be kept where it will be at all times under guard.

5. All small arms and field glasses, etc., at the armory, when not in use, will be securely locked up in a safe place.

6. Reports of survey covering pistols, revolvers, or other articles of similar value, lost or stolen from future encampments, or from armories, will definitely indicate whether or not the precautions mentioned have been complied with.

7. Failure to comply, will throw the responsibility and accountability on the shoulders of the organization commander, and he will be held under his bond.

2. You will note column one (1) gives the number of drills for which pay can be claimed in any one year.

Column two (2) shows the monthly base pay.

Columns three (3), four (4), and five (5), show pay for one (1) drill; for one (1) year, and the total pay a commanding officer will draw by adding the \$240.00 per year.

Columns six (6), seven (7), eight (8) and nine (9), show the maximum commutation for quarters and subsistence, with and without dependents per month, and columns ten (10) and eleven (11) the amount per day.

Columns twelve (12), and thirteen (13), show the total amount possible to receive for camp period, and columns fourteen (14), fifteen (15), sixteen (16) and seventeen (17), show the total amount possible to receive in one year.

Subject: Personal property of patients in Camp Hospital.

To: Lt. Col. W. S. Conkling, Chief Surgeon, Iowa N. G.

1. The experiences of the past two years have emphasized the necessity for a more definite method of protecting the property of soldiers sent to the Camp Hospital for treatment during annual camp period.

2. Hereafter when a patient is received at the Camp Hospital, the officer in charged will cause a check to be made of all property belonging to the patient, this property will be put in a bundle or in a barrack bag, with the patient's name, organization, and contents on a tag, and the bundle or bag, held for him until his discharge, when it will be delivered to him and his receipt taken, or receipt from the responsible officer of the patient's organization.

3. In the past, when a patient was delivered to the hospital, his blankets, etc., were given to the driver of the ambulance, to be returned to his organization, with the result that surveys are being asked for property, which it is claimed was not returned.

4. It is desired that you bear this in mind when preparing your orders for the administration of the Camp Hospital.

Subject: Changes in National Guard Regulations: Affecting Pay of Officers

To: All Officers, Iowa National Guard

1. Your careful study of Change No. 3, N. G. R. 1922, is directed. These changes seriously affect the pay of all officers and the requirements indicated, must be met by all officers, to protect their pay status.

2. Your particular attention is directed to page 2 paragraphs (a) and (1), and particularly to page 3 under heading "Failure to Maintain Strength," which reads:

(a) "The officers belonging to a unit of the National Guard, are not entitled to Federal pay for Armory Drills or for Field duty, unless that unit complies with the requirements as to minimum strength laid down in paragraph 110 of these regulations."

This means that no officer will be entitled to Federal Pay, unless his unit is maintained at Minimum Strength. Furthermore the Finance Officer will govern himself strictly by the provisions of these changes, and he will make payment on all rolls submitted for the period since March 22, 1923, under these regulations.

3. Every Officer must protect himself, and the only possible way to do it, is to get behind his organization and boost it up to the required strength, and keep it there.

Subject: Preparation of Train Schedules.

To: All Organization Commanders, Iowa National Guard.

1. The train schedules for the coming encampment are now under course of preparation. In order that arrangements can be made for railroad equipment, you are instructed to notify this office at once the approximate, maximum number of men you expect to bring to camp this year. This does not mean your present or authorized strength, but the strength you expect to bring to camp.

2. With reference to impedimenta to be brought, only articles of clothing and bedding are checkable at the rate of 150 lb. per man, therefore all other equipment, such as ammunition, rifles, pistols or any other equipment which may be in boxes or bales, other than bedding or clothing, G. I. cans, brooms, shovels, rakes, ranges, machine guns and their parts, machine gun carts and harness or horse equipment, etc., are not checkable, and must be covered by government B/L. Bearing this in mind, you will give an estimated rate of impedimenta, so that space in baggage car can be arranged for.

3. In previous years, some organizations have brought pianos and other articles not required for camp use, which cannot be covered by government B/L, and must not be brought into camp. Any unauthorized articles will be charged back to the organization at the prevailing freight rate.

4. You will reply immediately by filling out the questionnaire, cut off sign and return at once.

Subject: Rifle and Pistol Practice during Annual Camps

To: All Officers, Iowa National Guard

1. To avoid delay, while on the range, during the practice period at Camp, the following suggestions have been made, and are published for the information and guidance of all concerned.

(a) The details have been in the habit of reporting on the range, late. In view of the limited number of hours we have to spend on the range, lateness is inexcusable.

(b) The past two years' experiences have demonstrated that too much detail work has been left to the last minute. To correct this condition, a detail should be despatched to the range immediately after the day's firing is over, or after supper, if necessary, to prepare the range for the next day's firing.

The pit detail, telephone men, and all officers and men connected with the operation of the range, should report for duty, early enough to have the machinery in readiness by the time the troops report for firing, this should include a supply of ammunition being dumped at firing line.

(c) It must be made mandatory that the range, butts and pits and pit line be thoroughly policed after each day's firing, by the organization using the range that day.

(d) Rifles should be inspected at retreat each day, to insure that they are properly cleaned.

(e) Targets should be allocated to each organization the night before they begin firing. Every organization commander knows, (within a man or two), the number of men he will have available to fire the next day.

(f) Iced drinks should not be allowed sold on the range by the exchange. This is not to be construed as prohibiting iced lemonade, tea, etc., at the regular lunch hour, but the promiscuous use of iced drinks on the range was undoubtedly the cause of much of the heat prostrations in 1922.

2. Consideration of the suggestions contained herein will insure a smoothly working program, and save much valuable time.

3. These suggestions come from close students of range work, and are the result of years of observation and practice. By Order of the Governor:

1. The following letter from Hq. 7th Corps Area, is published for your information and guidance.

Subject: Chemical Warfare instruction for National Guard Camps. To: The Adjutants General of all States in the Seventh Corps Area.

1. Training programs for all branches of the National Guard for the 15-day camps will include the following program for Chemical Warfare protection:

- a. 1st period of one half hour. This period will include practical instruction in the use of the gas mask.
- b. 2nd period of one half hour. This period will include a short explanation of the use of smoke and tear gas.
- c. 3rd period of one hour. This period will include a demonstration of the actual use of smoke and tear gas by a practical exercise with troops.

2. This instruction will be given by the Corps Area Chemical Warfare Officer, if practicable, or by a qualified instructor on duty at the camp. Chemical Warfare officers for regiments and battalions, and one noncommissioned officer for each regiment, battalion and company should be appointed before the opening of camp. These men should be capable of giving Chemical Warfare instruction.

3. Shipments of chemical ammunition have been made to the various organizations. This ammunition should be available for use in the demonstration of the use of smoke and tear gas.

4. Where training programs have been approved it will not be necessary to submit revised programs to these headquarters.

2. The Trophy shall be known as the Governor N. E. Kendall Trophy, and shall be competed for annually.

3. Who shall compete:—All organizations of the Iowa National Guard armed or partially armed with the service rifle.

4. Where fired:—This competition shall be held during the annual encampment, and on such days as provided in orders for the firing of the record course as prescribed by rifle marksmanship for record (Special Course "C").

5. Computation of Scores:—All scores made in firing the record course shall be computed, by organization commanders, at the end of the prescribed firing period, as follows:

All scores fired for record in each organization, whether or not the entire course has been completed by each individual, shall be added and the total shall be divided by the strength of the organization commissioned and enlisted present on first day of encampment, as shown by the morning report. The organization having the highest average so computed, shall be declared the winner and shall hold the Trophy for a period of one year. Bands of Service Companies or Troops shall not be included in computing the strength of the organization.

Promptly upon completion of firing, organization commanders will compute scores as above described and turn over to their respective regimental range officer.

6. Awarding of Trophy:—The respective regimental range officers after receiving reports of their organizations, shall convene at the call of the senior officer and they shall after checking reports, refer their report to the Kendall Board, who will make final announcement.

Subject: Changes in National Guard Regulations, Enlisted Strength. To: All Organization Commanders, Iowa National Guard.

1. Particular attention of all organization commanders is called to paragraphs 110, 111, and 932 National Guard Regulations. Paragraphs 110 and 111 were amended by change No. 3, N. G. R. Militia Bureau, March 22, 1923, paragraph 932 by change No. 4, Militia Bureau, June 13, 1923. These changes should be studied carefully as they affect the federal pay of organization officers.

2. Par. 110, as amended shows the minimum strength to be maintained by organizations in order that the officers will be entitled to pay, i. e. a rifle company organized and federally recognized with enlisted strength of fifty, must at the end of six months have 65 men, after that has been accomplished, a variation of ten per cent is allowed, therefore, as interpreted by this office, officers of a rifle company will be entitled to pay if there is 59 enlisted men in the organization. The same rule applies to other units in proportion to their authorized minimum strength.

3. Par. 932, sub-par. a-2 reads "National Guard units which cannot comply with the requirements laid down in sub-paragraphs (1), (a) and (b) above will not be sent to field training camps."

4. Organization Commanders whose units are under strength, or in danger of becoming so, before camp, should institute a vigorous recruiting campaign and keep it up until the last day before the date set for camp in order to bring their enlisted strength at least up to the required minimum.

The minimum strength for a rifle company to be eligible for camp 5. is, 2 officers and 60% of 59 (minimum strength) 36 enlisted men, if however, the strength of the organization is over the minimum say 71 men, 60% of 71 or 43 enlisted men must be taken to Camp.

To: All Organization Commanders, Iowa National Guard.

1. Each organization ordered to Camp Dodge for Annual Encampment, will provide itself with a box, approximately 36x28x30, made of not less than 1 in. lumber, well braced on sides and bottom, with hinged cover, to be used as an ice box. On arrival in camp a pit will be dug of sufficient depth to sink the box to within two inches of its top. The box may be used as a packing box for miscellaneous articles, while en route to Camp and return to home station.

2. The construction of the permanent latrines, kitchens and mess halls is well under way, but lack of time and funds will not permit all the kitchens and mess halls being completed, in consequence some of the companies and troops will necessarily be obliged to use this type of cold storage for their perishable supplies. It is, however, contemplated that all the concrete floors will be completed, with sewer and water connections, and an effort will be made to provide regular cooking ranges, sinks and tables on the floor but covered with kitchen fly and paulin which you will bring with you.

3. The detail covering the ice or mess box must be attended to at once.

3. It is desired to supplement the above letters with the following advice.

(a) No Organization will be excused from camp without special authority from the Secretary of War.

Note: (An organization coming to camp under strength, will do so with the understanding that the officers will not receive pay for the camp period. For an organization to be excused from camp, sufficient notice must be given this Department to obtain the necessary authority from the Secretary of War, this notice must be submitted through channels.)

(b) Transportation Requests will be furnished the Company and Troop Commanders by this department. They will be exchanged by him for railroad tickets. Additional instructions relative to this subject will be attached to the requests when forwarded to you.

- (c) Travel Subsistence for enlisted men will not be allowed, but in lieu thereof, a full day's ration will be issued on arrival at camp. This will necessitate each man providing himself with a lunch for the period of travel. No allowance is authorized for expense incident to assembling men at Armory or for their maintenance, other than from date of departure from home station to date of return thereto, both dates inclusive.
- (d) The following records and office supplies will be brought to camp:

M. on arrival at Camp, and one list will be retained in your files.
- (h) Each organization will bring their field range, and equipment, also the following:

It is not understood why the instruction, verbally given to all officers while in attendance at the School of Instruction last February, has not been taken advantage of as you were told at that time that any unserviceable property should be listed and disposition asked for as soon as possible as well as any surplus property that you might have on hand, both of these to be done prior to camp, so that your organizations would come into camp completely outfitted insofar as it was possible to do so and eliminate the extra work of exchange and taking in of worn out and unserviceable property during the camp, and every minute of time could be used for other purposes.

3. This report must be surrendered at once as it is necessary that the Quartermaster check the number of men travelling on each transportation request immediately upon their arrival.

4. After the word "Station" you should enter the home station of your organization. For example, "Des Moines, Iowa." After the word

"Organization" show the unit and the regiment; for example "Co. A. 168th Inf." After the words "Transportation Request No." show the number of your request which is printed in red in the upper right hand corner of the request; for example "WQ3782920." This information must be secured before you surrender the transportation request to the agent. Under the words "Number of Officers and Men" enter the number of officers and number of enlisted men travelling on the request. After the words "Total number of persons transported" enter the total, including officers and enlisted men.

Subject: Construction of tent camp for the housing of National Guard at Annual Encampment.

To: Commanding Officers of Service Companies and Service Troops, Separate Companies and Detachments.

1. In order to facilitate the erection of the tentage, by the Service Companies and Service Troops, the following work has already been done by the Quartermaster and instructions are herein given which will govern the subject.

2. Beginning on the North the 133d Infantry will occupy the 1st area, the central or 2d area south will be occupied by the 186th Ambulance Company and the 168th Infantry, the 3d or south area will be occupied by the 113th Cavalry.

3. Company and Troop streets have been designated by three (3) stakes driven from east to west, the first stake being driven seventy-six (76) feet west of each kitchen foundation and this first stake designates the northeast corner of each tent proper (not line of guy ropes) each succeeding stake will designate the north side of the row of tents proper.

4. All tents erected in Company or Troop streets will be 16'x16' Pyramidal with the front facing the north. The first tent will be occupied as Company or Troop Office and as quarters for the 1st Sergeant and Clerk, the second as Supply and as quarters for the Supply and Mess Sergeants, the remainder will be occupied as quarters for the remainder of the Company or Troop.

5. All tentage erected in Company or Troop Streets will be so erected as to provide an eighteen (18) inch pathway between the tents, measuring between the guy rope pins.

6. The first row of stakes east of Des Moines Avenue and opposite Company or Troop Streets will designate the line of tents to be occupied the Line officers, each state marking the front and center of each tent. All tentage erected on this line will be 9'x9' wall with flies placed over them, and with the fronts facing the west.

7. The second row of stakes east, as before described, will designate the line of tents to be occupied by the Field Officers and for assembly purposes, each stake marking the front and center of each tent. (Attached Regular Army Instructors will occupy tents on the left of this line.)

The tents on this line will be 9'x9' and storage tents with flies placed over them and with fronts facing west.

Class of tents to be erected on this line will be given on stake designating location of same.

8. The third row of stakes east as before described will designate the line of tents to be occupied by the Regimental Messes, the tents on this line will be occupied as Dining Tent and Kitchens and as quarters for the cooks and the Regimental Messes. Tentage will be 9'x9' and Storage tents and erected with fronts facing west. Kitchens will be erected directly in rear of the Dining Tent.

9. The fourth row of stakes east as before described will designate the line of tents to be occupied as Latrines for the Field and Line Officers, these tents will be 16'x16' Pyramidal with the fronts facing north for the 133d Infantry, and south for the 186 Ambulance Company. 168th Infantry and the 113th Cavalry.

10. Kitchen flies will be erected by each organization of line troops and will be erected over foundations already constructed, said flies erected with ridge pole running north and south.

11. Large pins will be used for all guy ropes and will be driven in such manner as will cause them to lean toward the tent, small pins will be used for all walls and will be driven perpendicular.

12. As soon as erection of tentage is completed in each Regiment, all designating stakes will be collected and turned in to the Quartermaster for future uses.

1. All organizations which bring impedimenta with them to Camp Dodge this year will be required by the Railroad Company to list all boxes, bundles, bales or packages, showing the weights and contents of each.

2. You will, therefore, arrange to make three copies of such a list, enumerating the articles, for example:

- 1 bundle rakes, 10 lbs.
- 1 bundle brooms and showels, 15 lbs.

1 box ammunition, 90 lbs.

1 box rifles, 150 lbs.

1 G. I. Can with contents, 60 lbs.

1 field range complete, 200 lbs.

and any other articles or boxes that you may have must be listed and the weights shown in this manner, bearing in mind that clothing, such as your wool clothing which you may bring into camp with you, your bedding, etc. is checkable property and should not be listed. These three lists should be signed by you and the agent, one list to be kept on file by the agent, one list to be kept by you and the original list to be delivered to the Quartermaster at Camp Dodge immediately upon arrival.

3. As soon as you arrive in camp, government bills of lading to cover the articles brought in with you will be prepared and forwarded to your agent for his signature and record, to cover all non-checkable articles that are transported by the carrier.

4. If desired you may deliver one copy of this memorandum to the agent for his authority, to be retained by him until such time as he receives back his bill of lading for signature and file.

5. This is esesntial and must be adhered to.

Subject: Report on Iowa National Guard Encampment, 1923.

To: Hon. N. E. Kendall, Governor of the State of Iowa, Des Moines, Iowa. 1. Advance parties arriving August 3, 1923, had tents up and camp in readiness for arrival of troops on August 7, 1923. Command of camp was assumed by the undersigned on August 7, 1923; and provost and interior guard established under supervision of Field Officer of the Day selected by regimental commanders as follows:

August 1, 1923

133rd Infantry: Post at entrance to camp from north and guard at Inter-Urban station. Guard of three men at arsenal.

- 168th Infantry: Post at entrance to driveway to pool and covering entrance to General's quarters. Post at juncture of road entering camp and Des Moines avenue. And post at entrance to camp on Merle Hay road.
- 113th Cavalry: Mounted guard patrolling main highway east of camp and unoccupied areas adjacent to camp.

2. Schedule of training was promptly and faithfully carried out, and delayed one day by the observation of August 8, 1923, official day of mourning for the death of Warren G. Harding, President of the United States; which was fitly observed by a complete halt in training activities with exception of camp memorial formation at 3:00 p. m., with proper program and one minute of silent meditation.

3. In addition to regimental schools in communications, infantry, automatic rifle, machine gun, bugling, mess sergeants, supply sergeants, mechanics, administration, pioneer, intelligence, gas, etc.; the following instruction was given under or consolidatd for the entire camp:

Howitzer school under supervision of Capt. Earl Downing, 168th Infantry, covering a period of over 30 hours, and two days on the range; with instruction from organization of a howitzer company, nomemclature of the 37 m/m gun and stokes mortar, selection of implacements, use of instruments for direct fire, drill of company in attack, use of howitzer company as protection on march, and instruction on the range.

Signal and communication school in charge of Lt. Herbert E. Duquette, 168th Inf., in conformity with visits of regular army communication platoons for a period of 15 hours and 30 minutes on August 9, 11 and 13, were held for the benefit of the entire command. Equipment of all organizations was used and set up making complete organization of communications from battalion, regimental and with brigade headquarters. In this work, complete telephone communications was permanently during the camp established with camp headquarters and the various units of the command.

Intelligence platoons of each regiment and headquarters company, 67th Infantry Brigade, was assembled under supervision of Lt. Donald F. Huntoon, Brigade Intelligence Officer; and in addition to a series of lectures, a plan of study and work was outlined for these sections in their home stations. And a plan for maps to be made of the town at the various home stations was formulated, to be furnished all headquarters and the Adjutant General's office.

Instruction in chemical warfare under Captain Joseph Yuditsky, 14th Cav., with assistance of one company from the 168th Inf., was given a detail of 1 officer, 2 non-commissioned officers and 2 privates from each company and troop, consisting of following instruction:

- One-half hour, practical instruction in use of gas mask.\* a.
- One-half hour, short explanation of use of smoke and tear gas. b,
- One-half hour demonstration of actual use of smoke and tear gas С. by a practical exercise with troops.

4. Sanitation of camp was very good; considerable pride prevailed as to company's streets; garbage was well handled; kitchens in every instance were in excellent conditions. Latrines, although attention of unsanitary condition being called numerous times to regimental and even organizations commanders, were not properly cared for.

5. Despite strict regulations of use of automobiles, two accidents occurred during the encampment. Ambulance No. 75323, Med. Detch., 113th Cav., collided August 15, 1923, in the camp with car driven by Mrs. Jean McCarmon of Perry, Iowa; and FWD truck, QMC, damaged Ford belonging to Reuben A. Anderson on August 11, 1923, at the entrance to camp on the Merle Hay road.

6. Excellent training on the range was participated in by all organizations; and some excellent records were made.

7. Governor's Review on August 18, 1923, was held at 1:30 p.m., according to schedule of training. The Governor and staff arrived in camp at 10:00 a.m. All organizations of camp (except motorized transportation, condition of ground not permitting it on the field) passed Governor N. E. Kendall in review with excellent lines. State legislative and congressional members were especially inyited to attend camp this day; and the camp was honored with the presence of Senator A. B. Cummins, Congressman Ramseyer, Congressman Dowell, Mayor Carl M. Garver, and many other visitors from home of the different organizations who messed with the officers and various units from their homes. Much interest on the part of the citizens of the state was shown in the camp.

8. Every effort for the welfare and comfort of the members of the camp was provided. Instruction in swimming and diving at the camp pool was given all who desired to attend each evening at 6:30 to 7:30. Mail service from Des Moines was established and deliveries to each regiment and separate organization was made twice daily. Calls for city telephone and telegraph service were attentively cared for through camp headquarters and the Y. M. C. A. Each regiment had entertainment platform equipped with electric lights, and each evening wrestling, athletic events, music and other entertainment was furnished the members in camp. In the afternoon on Sunday, August 12 and 19 a horse show and program was given by the 113th Cavalry. The "Camp Dodger" was established, and received hearty support of all organizations making it a permanent institution.

9. Military Visitors:

- Maj. Gen. Duncan, C. G., 7th Corps Area, accompanied by Col. Harry A. Eaton, General Staff, arrived at 9:00 a. m., August 14, 1923, and made inspection of camp, at his request without any ceremonies or formations, working at its normal schedule.
- Col. Frank Halstead, officer in charge National Guard Affairs, 7th Corps Area, visited camp August 16, 1923.
- Maj. Rolland W. Case, Ordnance Officer and Armament Foreman Herman E. Aulmann visited camp August 15, 1923, for inspection of ordnance material.

(c) GENERAL ACCOMPLISHMENTS OF TRAINING:

In view of the fact that only seven (7) days were available for actual instruction and range practice the general accomplishments did not attain what might be desired. The results obtained are as a whole encouraging, and there is no doubt that all who attended have been considerably advanced in most of the subjects covered during the camp. Sound progress was made by the communication units of the Headquarters companies. The progress made by all machine gun companies, in machine gun training including range firing, was especially satisfactory. It is believed that a great deal of benefit was derived from the tactical instruction and demonstration in basis combat principles.

(d) FEATURES OF TRAINING WHICH WERE NOT SATISFAC-TORY:

The lack of competent instructors greatly handicapped the training of the pioneer units of the Headquarters companies in their specialties. Approximately 20% of the enlisted men who fired the record course both with the rifle and pistol received practically no preparatory instruction. Inclement weather and limitation of time were instrumental for this deficiency. The condition of small arms and auxiliary weapons, insofar as care and preservation are concerned, were not what could be reasonably expected. Responsible officers did not cause the metal fouling to be removed in due time from all fire arms under their charge nor did they properly supervise the use of the correct process for removal of same.

(e) CHANGE IN POLICY OF INSTRUCTION:

It is recommended that for future encampment at least four (4) regular army officers per regiment and one (1) competent sergeant per company be detailed and, if practicable, that such force be assembled four (4) days prior to the encampment for a course of instruction and co-ordination under charge of the senior officer permanently assigned to each regiment.

(c) General Accomplishments of Training:

In general, accomplishments were not what might be desired due to the reduced number of training days, only a total of 9 days being available for range practice and actual instruction. As an instance, the benefits of the camp from a disciplinary standpoint were not specially marked when compared with past camps which afforded more training days.

In tactical instruction decided progress was made, at least as to elucidating and impressing basic combat principles. Demonstrations and simple combat exercises were employed in this connection, involved and extensive maneuvers being impracticable by reason of limited time

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and extensive maneuvers being implacticable by reason of inclusion and terrain.

More satisfactory results would have been evident from rifle practice had not rain prevented completion of record course by some 60 per cent of the men. Firing done was productive of excellent results considering limited time available and inadequate preparatory instruction. Progress was most marked in the specialist training of the headquarters companies.

It may be asserted that at least satisfactory progress was made in

the principal features of training, and this without suppressing the interest and desire of the men for National Guard service.

(d) Features of Training Not Satisfactory—Importance of thorough police of tents and company areas in general, neatness and uniformity in arrangement of equipment in tents, not fully realized by a large number of company officers. Similar comment may be applied in respect to care and cleaning of small arms.

(e) Changes in Instruction Policies—No changes in announced policies of Militia Bureau and Corps Area Headquarters, in regard to armory and field training, are recommended.

(i) Terrain Exercises by Graduates of General Service Schools—Field and staff officers participated in 4 terrain exercises conducted by general service school graduates. Judging from the keen interest in tactics, the study and discussion, which these exercises gave rise to among the students, this work was of very high value. It was impracticable to measure satisfactorily the degree of success of this form of instruction by application of the knowledge gained to exercises for junior officers, and with troops. This for the reason that only two short exercises involving units greater than a war strength company were engaged in by the regiment.

Recommend the continuance of this form of instruction along present lines, but that, if funds will permit, they be held immediately before the field training period prescribed for the troops. This would leave officers available to direct and closely supervise the work of their organizations.

(j) Location and Date of Next Year's Camp—Recommend no change in location, and no material change in dates of camp for next year. It is believed that the permanent camp facilities being installed at Camp Dodge will prove more of an attraction to present and prospective members of the National Guard than a camp not so favorably equipped. Further, if the advance preparation of camp be extended to company streets and drill grounds, it should mean relatively little loss from instruction periods.

The death in San Francisco last Thursday of our beloved Commanderin-Chief removes from us a man whose life may well be taken as an example by all Americans. A boy, born in a simple home, he rose to the highest office in the world, leaving behind him a life story, in which, written in rubrics, is a lesson in plain Americanism, honor, integrity, fair dealing and love of Country. In gathering Friday to pay honor to his memory we gather to pay honor to that that is best in Americanism.

In response to the President's proclamation, all work will be dispensed with on the official day of mourning, with the exception of the necessary guard and fatigue and the camp memorial formation hereinafter provided for. No one will be excused from this formation with the bare exception of the most necessary details.

Regulations governing swimming pool.

The pool will be open from 10:30 to 11:30 a. m., from 2:00 to 5:00 p. m., and from 7:00 to 9:00 p. m.

To minimize danger of contamination of the pool water and consequent infections, upon the recommendation of Lt. Col. Wilbur S. Conkling, C. S., the following rules will govern the use of the pool during the period of this encampment:

All persons shall take a thorough shower bath, preferably with warm water and soap, before being permitted to use the pool. Anyone who neglects to take proper shower bath shall be sent back to the shower bath room and required to take such bath before being admitted to the pool. If the body is soiled subsequent to taking of bath as by walking or lying in the gravel about the pool, another shower bath shall be required.

The use of the pool shall be forbidden to all persons who are suffering from colds, sore throat, skin infections, or who show evidence of old sores, inflamed eyes or other conditions which may be caused by bacterial infection which could be transmitted to other persons.

A properly instructed person shall be stationed in the shower bath room and shall inspect all bathers, requiring each person to display so much of his body as may be necessary to enable the inspector to determine the presence or absence of skin infections.

Spitting and blowing the nose into the pool water shall not be permitted.

Roughness, ducking of other swimmers, or other objectionable conduct shall not be permitted.

All rescue work shall be left entirely to the life guard personnel. Swimmers shall not interfere with the life guards in the performance of their duty by making an effort to reach the person in danger. The military guard shall assist the life guards in keeping order at such times. These regulations shall be enforced by the life guards on duty, assisted if necessary by the military personnel on duty. Violation of the rules shall be punished by exclusion from the pool for the remainder of the bathing period in which the violation occurs, and in such as merits it the exclusion shall be for a longer period. 1. In compliance with paragraph 3, Training Memorandum No. 2, Headquarters Seventh Corps Area, 1923, following report is hereby submitted:

- (3) a. Report of field inspection required by par. 462, National Guard Regulations, 1922. Submitted by First Lieut. John J. Turner, F. A. (DOL), Aberdeen, South Dakota.
  - b. Owing to insufficient time preliminary course only was fired with revolver, each man being given sufficient personal instruction to insure successful completion of course on home target ranges. Instruction was given in use of machine gun and each man fired few rounds for practice only, time too limited to permit of further instruction.

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c. Service Practice: Total rounds fired 646.

Divided as follows: 374 Shrapnel 155 mm

272 Shell, Mk.-155 mm

Problems fired	31
Solved	13
Unsolved	18

Firing consisted of Percussion Precision, Percussion Bracket, open warfare, map firing, and airplane problems. The last night on the range the battalion occupied a new position, laid pieces topographically and fired two concentrations after computing data from map after dark. Successful airplane problem was fired on last day with aid of radio set SCR 109 loaned to unit by 3rd Field Artillery, Lt. Col. Hopkins, commanding.

- d. More actual firing could have been accomplished by camping at gun positions, saving time lost by going to and from barrack area.
- e. Recommend more stress on tactical employment of Artillery with outdoor work wherever possible during home training and a more complete equipment issued at camps in way of authorized motor vehicles to enable proper functioning of details.

Subject: Iowa State Rifle Team, Selection and National Match Tour of

Duty, 1922.

On August 29th, the last day of the annual encampment, a detail of eighteen men who had shown special proficiency with the rifle during the encampment, were assembled at the target range for further training. The course was fired three times. Partial elimination was made on August 30th and final elimination on August 31st. After selection of team and publication of the order, it was necessary to excuse Pvt. Geo. R. Scott, Co. "I," 133rd Inf., and fill the vacancy with Pvt. William F. Coultas, Troop "A," 113th Cav.

Pursuant to S. O. No. 136, A. G. O., August 31, 1922, the team left Des Moines at 9:30 p. m. via the C. R. I. & P., arriving at Camp Perry, Ohio, at 7:00 p. m., Sept. 1st, 1922. The following composed the team. Major Fred S. Hird, Ord. Dept. Des Moines, Iowa. Team Captain

Upon arrival at Camp Perry, the team drew thirteen new rifles with which to continue training and compete in the matches. Special National Match Ammunition with 172 gr. bullets was used. Bullets were coated with gilding metal which eliminated all metal fouling. The entire team participated in the training and instruction afforded in the small arms firing school which was a decided success. At the completon of this training, certificate of proficiency as marksmen and small arms instructors was issued to the entire team.

During the period Sept. 12th to Sept. 20th, the team competed in the numerous matches of the National Rifle Association. A number of prizes were won in these matches, the most outstanding being Gregory's 99x100 in the Wimbledon Match, 20 shots at 1000 yards, service sights, this netted forth place and later Gregory and Cummings' 50x50 in the 300 yard rapid fire contest.

I had the honor of being selected Team Captain of the National Guard, United Service Team by a committee of team Captains. The National Guard Team won third place. Gregory was a shooting member of the team.

It is interesting to note the uniformity in the shooting of the first eight men, also to note that the entire team qualified as expert riflemen. Firing shots on the wrong target and clip trouble in rapid fire contributed to the slump of a number of tail enders.

The team finished in fifteenth place. This entitles each man to the National Match Class B medal. At one stage of the contest the team occupied ninth place. It is believed that this showing is satisfactory to all when consideration is taken of the fact that this is every man's first National Match experience, with one exception, Gregory.

In all my experience with military rifle teams I have never had the honor of serving with a group of men who were more interested in their work or more painstaking and persevering in their efforts than was this team. They were at all times a credit to the state they represented. The discipline was excellent.

The team left Camp Perry at 9:00 p. m., Sept. 28th, arriving at their home stations the following day.

Special mention is due Col. M. C. Mumma, Executive Officer, and his efficient and courteous corps of assistants, for the excellent manner in which the matches were conducted. It is generally believed the 1922 National Matches mark the peak of National Match progress.

Recommendation is made that each member of the team be presented with the distinctive Iowa State Team Medal.


"A number of the National Guard team members were new men with probably less instruction than any of the other competitors, some never having fired at a thousand yards. Those members taking the systematic course of instruction given by the Small Arms Firing School were, undoubtedly, greatly benefited thereby. The excellent general results obtained by the National Guard at this year's matches will, no doubt, increase interest in target practice in the different states." "The enthusiastic interest displayed by and the excellent co-operation of the National Guard team captains during the matches are to be commended. All National Guard competitors seemed to take a proper interest in the work at hand and to apply themselves conscientiously. The knowledge gained and interest aroused by this year's matches will, undoubtedly, do much to make the National Guard a bigger factor at future matches."

### UNFAVORABLE

Several teams had no agents appointed for their United States Property and Disbursing Officers are suggested in Militia Bureau Circular Letter No. 54, current series, and, in several cases, those appointed had not familiarized themselves regarding pay and transportation. Several team captains were not familiar with the provisions of the Militia Bureau Circular Letter governing the attendance of the National Guard at the matches and several states sent teams without notifying the Militia Bureau or without submitting estimates covering authorized expenses as indicated in the above-cited, circular letter. This would appear to indicate neglect on the part of some of the state authorities regarding the provisions of Militia Bureau Circular Letters and regarding the distribution of the necessary information to the proper persons."

#### FINDINGS:

The Board finds that pursuant to a letter from the Governor of Iowa, (N. E. Kendall), to General Louis G. Lasher dated June 28, 1922, that a sum of One Hundred Dollars, (\$100.00), was posted by the Governor to be used in the procurement of a suitable trophy to be awarded to the company or troop which would make the highest record on the rifle range during the 1922 encampment period. That in compliance with the Governor's desire, General Lasher published to the National Guard of the State, in Encampment Letter No. 24, dated July 3, 1922, the information contained in the Governor's letter, and also, in the same encampment letter, the rules governing the award of the trophy, to-wit: "The Company or Troop making the highest per cent over the record course, as prescribed in Rifle Marksmanship, based on the total commissioned and enlisted strength of the organization as shown on the records at the commencement of the camp, will receive and hold the trophy for one testants to comply with the rules governing record firing as prescribed in both Encampment Letter No. 24, July 3, 1922, and in Chapter 3, Rifle Marksmanship, War Department Document No. 1021, and unavoidable circumstances such as the failure of the 133rd Infantry to complete its record firing on account of the terrific heat experienced, and the number of prostrations, on the rifle range on August 24, 1922, and also due to minor discrepancies and irregularities, that it is impossible to decide who should be awarded the trophy and at the same time feel that the award was made in absolute fairness to all and that the winner won it without a shade of doubt.

### RECOMMENDATIONS:

The Board recommends that the trophy be not awarded for this year. The Board further recommends that a Board of Officers, consisting of not less than three members, be appointed to draft specific rules and regulations for the future conduct of the Governor N. E. Kendall Trophy Match. These rules not to be at variance with those prescribed in Rifleman Marksmanship, (War Department Document No. 1021).





F. Practice Firing-Unlimited Practice firing may be had prior to firing for record.

G. A score once begun in any position will be completed for that position without other sighting shots than those which preceded the score.

J. Coaching-Will be allowed. Coach to be designated by organization commander.

K. Time Limit-A time limit of one minute per shot will be allowed for all scores. L. Target—All record targets will be marked as Official Targets and will be furnished from this office. No other firing than that for record will be done on these targets. Each competitor will fire the prescribed number of shots constituting his sighting shots and record score in any one position on the same target.

M. Time of Firing-To be determined by the organization commander.

N. Supervision of Firing—All record firing must be done under the supervision of a commissioned officer. As soon as a score is completed, the supervising officer will determine the score and enter same in ink on the target, cause the target to be signed by the competitor, sign the target himself and give it to the organization commander.

O. Time of Completion of Match-All organizations must have completed all their firing prescribed above before May, 1924.

P. Reports—Each organization commander will not later than Sunday of each week mail to the Adjutant General the completed, certified targets of his 10 men team. Bulletins announcing the standing of organizations will be issued from this office from time to time.

Q. Prizes—To the company whose team makes the highest aggregate score will be awarded the Class "A" Trophy, which is emblematic of the Gallery Championship of the Iowa National Guard. Three other Trophies, namely Class "B," "C" & "D" will be awarded in the order named to the companies whose teams have the next three high scores. These trophies will be suitably engraved and deposited with the organization winning them for a period of one year, at the end of which time they will be returned to this office.

R. Special Prize—In addition to the Class "A" Trophy, General Louis G. Lasher, The Adjutant General, will present to the organization having the highest aggregate score, a new model Springfield Caliber 22 Rifle, which will become the property of such winning organization.

S. To be eligible to compete for trophies and special prize each organization will select a team of 5 men who will fire the same score as prescribed in "C" of this order, firing to be done during the week commencing May 12. Targets to be handled and disposed of in same manner as prescribed in this order.

Any organization showing less than 60% of their enlisted strength having fired the prescribed course will not be allowed to participate in the final competition for trophies and special prize.

2. During the period of competition organizations will be visited by Major FRED S. HIRD, Inspector of Small Arms Practice, who will give such instructions and assistance as he deems necessary. Major Hird will notify organization Commanders in ample time of any proposed visits.

Officers will be paid the pay of their grade, plus subsistence allowances during the period authorized, by the U. S. P. & D. Officer from Federal Funds.

Enlisted men will be paid the pay of their grade during the period authorized, by the U. S. P. & D. Officer from Federal Funds.

Service uniforms without side arms, will be worn by all Officers, except as may be hereinafter ordered.

Service uniforms without arms or equipment will be worn by all enlisted men, except as may be hereinafter ordered.

A consolidated mess will be maintained under the supervision of the Camp Quartermaster. All National Guard Officers will be charged at the rate of one dollar (\$1.00) per day. All Reserve Officers and Civilians participating in the School will be charged one dollar and twenty-five cents (\$1.25) per day.

Tents and cots will be provided for the entire personnel. Sufficient tents will be provided to permit four occupants to each tent.

All officers will provide themselves with the following:

- a. Shooting Coat or Jumper, Padded both Elbow and Shoulder.
- b. Shoes with heavy soles, preferably Russet Service Shoes.
- c. Rifle, as nearly perfect as possible, i. e., smooth working bolt, tight sights, etc.
- d. Pistol.
- e. Cartridge Belt.
- f. Cleaning Rods for both rifle and pistol.
- g. Screw driver, both rifle and pistol.
- h. Micrometer (if available).
- i. Field Glasses.
- j. Front sight cover.
- k. Gun cover.
- l. Gun rest.
- m. Pencils and note book.

The Camp Quartermaster will furnish the following:

Patches cut for cleaning.

Score books.

Rifles-Cartridge belts, etc., for officers of units not armed with rifle. Ammunition for all weapons.

The Commanding Officer of the Howitzer Company, 168th Infantry, will bring one (1) Howitzer and Trench Mortar.

The Commanding Officer of the Howitzer Company, 133rd Infantry, will bring one (1) Howitzer and Trench Mortar.

The Commanding Officer of Company "D," 168th Infantry, will bring his full complement of Machine Guns.

Any officer or enlisted man herein ordered to duty, who desires to be relieved, must submit at once his request and reasons therefor.

Troop "B" and "C" 113th Cavalry, will, at no expense to the Federal or State Governments, have 15 horses from each Troop and horse equipment forage and caretakers, at Camp Dodge, rifle range, not later than 4 P. M., June 9, 1924. Each Troop will leave sufficient caretakers on duty at home stations to properly care for animals and property left.

The U. S. P. & D. Officer will, under the authority contained in letter M. B. 354-1 Iowa-8, dated May 5, 1924, furnish the necessary transportation.
