




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#### LETTER OF TRANSMITTAL

STATE OF IOWA, OFFICE OF THE ADJUTANT GENERAL, DES MOINES, AUG. 1, 1929

To HIS EXCELLENCY, JOHN HAMMILL, Commander-in-Chief, State House, Des Moines, Iowa. Sir: In accordance with the provisions of paragraph 446, Chapter 28, Code of 1927, the following biennial report for the period July 1, 1926, to June 30, 1928, is respectfully submitted:

During the period covered by this report the National Guard of Iowa has reached a high state of efficiency, and its development has made excellent progress. Each year, the training has materially improved in a logical and progressive manner. The community interest, in practically all the units of the National Guard, is marked, and the Chambers of Commerce in the cities of Iowa where units are stationed have been very helpful.

The equipment issued to the Guard by the Federal Government is usually good, and I have been informed that the new uniforms will be issued to the National Guard on or about January 1, 1930. The ordnance is excellent, and since the Federal Government has permitted the use of caretakers in the form of motor mechanics, this equipment has at all times been ready for immediate use.

By virtue of the National Defense Act, and Militia Bureau Regulations, the Adjutant General of Iowa, under the direction of the Governor, is required to execute the approved policies of the War Department, as well as the laws of Iowa, insofar as applicable to the National Guard. In addition, records of Civil War Veterans, Veterans of the Spanish-American War, and World War Veterans, are kept in the Office of the Adjutant General, and we are daily called upon for certified copies of these records, these calls coming from all over the United States. A complete record of all federal property issued to the National Guard, as well as a record of all state funds allotted to the National Guard, is also kept in this office. The Federal Government has turned over to the National Guard of Iowa approximately \$1,950,000 worth of property, and in addition to the property turned over disburses to the National Guard of Iowa nearly \$600,000.00 a year. All members of the National Guard are now paid by the Federal Government for armory drills, and the Field Training of all units is paid for by the Federal Government. 019586

#### CAMP DODGE

The Iowa National Guard has in Camp Dodge one of the finest and most completely equipped camps in the United States. The State of Iowa is largely responsible for this excellent camp and with the exception of a camp hospital, and a brigade headquarters, the camp is most excellently equipped.

#### OTHER FUNDS

The Federal Government has returned to the National Guard funds taken from Iowa units at the close of the World War, and these funds have in each instance been turned over to the State Advisory Board by the units entitled to receive them. Some \$27,-000.00 was returned, and the Advisory Board will in all probability expend these funds in permanent, or semi-permanent, improvements for Camp Dodge, and for benefit to the entire National Guard.

#### INSPECTIONS

Annual armory inspections are made by detailed officers of the United States Army, and the results of these inspections have been most gratifying.

#### ARMORIES

There are no state-owned armories in Iowa. Each city and town where a unit of the National Guard is stationed is required to furnish a suitable armory for military purposes, and in many of the cities and towns of Iowa, excellent armories have been constructed for practically the exclusive use of the organizations.

#### ARMORY DRILL

Armory drill attendance has shown a steady increase during the past year, which is indicative of an excellent personnel and a general healthy state of affairs. Organizations assemble each week on regular schedule and programs are prepared by division, regimental and battalion commanders. Under the United States laws, officers and enlisted men are allowed a day's pay for each weekly drill attendance and such pay has to a great extent stimulated attendance at drill.

#### CONCLUSION

In conclusion, I wish to express to the officers and enlisted men of the Iowa National Guard, my appreciation of their services, and to the officers and non-commissioned officers of the Regular Army who have through their hearty cooperation and their professional fitness assisted in bringing the Iowa National Guard to its present high state of efficiency. I also desire to thank you for your cooperation in things that pertain to the efficiency of the National Guard, and to assure you that such cooperation is appreciated by the entire Guard personnel.

### TRAINING OF THE IOWA NATIONAL GUARD

The Training Mission of the Iowa National Guard Units is to maintain that stage of combat training which will enable each Unit to be prepared at all times for use by the State or Federal Government for the suppression of domestic disturbances or insurrections, and by the Federal Government, in case of National emergency, for active field service.

The Training Year extends from the close of the Field Training period of one year to the close of the Field Training period of the next year. The Training Year is divided into *a* Armory Training Period, and *b* Field Training Period.

#### ARMORY TRAINING PERIOD

Armory Training, is, in general, that training which can be conducted satisfactorily in the Armories of the Units at their home stations. This consists of training in discipline, use and care of arms, material and equipment, leadership, responsibility of Commanders, protective measures against chemical warfare, and target practice.

The Armory Training is accomplished by following programs and schedules prepared beforehand by higher commanders. Training inspections are made from time to time by higher commanders to observe the progress being made and to determine whether or not the prescribed programs and schedules are being followed.

#### FIELD TRAINING PERIOD

Field Training consists of the application to practical exercises in the Field of such theoretical and practical knowledge as has been gained during the Armory Training Period. The Field Training for the Iowa National Guard Units is held for a 15-day period, each year, generally in the month of August, at Camp Dodge, Iowa, with the exception of the Artillery Regiment. Due to the fact that no Artillery Range is available in the State of Iowa, the 185th Field Artillery Regiment conducts its Field Training Period for 15 days at Camp McCoy, Sparta, Wisconsin. All expenses incident to the Field Training Period are paid by the Federal Government. This includes transportation, rations, pay, etc.

The Field Training Period is divided into the Morning Period, which is devoted purely to Military Training; the Afternoon Period, during which the time is devoted to schools for Officers, and non-commissioned Officers, physical training, athletics, field meets, etc.; the Evening Period from 4:30 P. M., during which, ceremonies are held and amusements provided.

Subject: Report on Annual Field Training Period 67th Infantry Brigade less Headquarters and Headquarters Company.

To: The Adjutant General of Iowa, State House, Des Moines, Iowa,

1. Pursuant to Par. 1, S.O. 63, AGO, Iowa dated August 6, 1927, the undersigned assumed command at Camp Dodge, Iowa, August 14, 1927.

2. The advance details provided for in Par. 2, SO, 63, had arrived in

camp on August 12th, and with additional help furnished by your department, had the canvas all up; fuel and rations distributed to the kitchens and everything in readiness to receive the troops upon their arrival on August 14th.

3. As the Infantry and Cavalry organizations return to Camp Dodge each year it becomes more evident, that the policy established in the year 1907 of locating a permanent rifle range by the Federal Government and a State owned camp ground adjacent thereto was a sound one in every way. The plant has been added to and improved by succeeding administrations until now we enjoy an almost perfect camp ground. The troops arrive in camp each year knowing where they are going to be located in the camp and what they are going to do, with the result that the camp is fully established, quickly and without confusion during what is termed the travel day to camp and all are ready for the beginning of the training on the second day of the camp period.

A large number of the men who come to our Field training camps each year are recruits. They arrive in a camp where they are promptly assigned comfortable quarters and beds; after a long trip by train which many of them take, a warm bath or a swim in the pool is enjoyed; a hot meal in the commodious and convenient dining-rooms then follows and he is given a favorable impression of camp life. He goes to his training cheerfully the following days and good results naturally follow.

The programs of training prepared by the two infantry regiments of the brigade; the 186th Ambulance Company and the 186th Hospital Company, and approved by higher state authority and the Commanding General of the 7th Corps area were generally carried out by all organizations with the exception of that of Tuesday afternoon, August 14th, when all organizations were brought into the city of Des Moines for participation in the military section of the parade for the American Legion then in state convention. Their appearance in this parade was worthy the favorable comments that were made concerning them and it is felt that their experience in the parade and in going to and returning from it compensated for the loss of the afternoon attendance at the schools of the camp.

There has been a noticeable advance in the care and skill used in the preparation of training programs and schedules. Well balanced and progressive training is now the rule and it is beginning to show favorable results in all units with the general result that the same class of training is general throughout a regiment and all units are generally qualified in basic training.

We are gradually building up in each of the infantry regiments a corps of instructors which are competent to train the different specialist groups in the latest methods and with the latest equipment, when furnished, for such groups. It is felt that with these specialist instructors and the high class of officers, both line and field, now assigned to both infantry regiments that, should an emergency arise and officers of the Regular army then on duty with these units be ordered elsewhere, the training of the brigade for active duty in the field would be carried out without difficulty.

Each organization spent two days on the target range but only those who had completed the complete preparatory exercises were permitted to fire the prescribed course with the weapons with which they were armed. Company commanders do not give sufficient attention to preparatory instruction for rifle practice at their home stations. This matter should be impressed upon the different organization commanders. The organizations of the 133d Infantry, armed with the rifle, fired a course over the rifle range at landscape targets. The field problem leading up to the firing of this course, and this class of firing, created a great

deal of interest in this regiment. It is recommended that this training be continued in the year 1927.

The afternoon schools were well conducted and attendance thereat carefully checked. The mass athletics were much better conducted than in any previous year. Particularly was this true in the 168th Infantry.

Governor Hammill, with a part of his staff, arrived in camp at 4:15 o'clock in the afternoon of August 24th and then immediately proceeded to the parade ground, west of the arsenal buildings where the troops were in waiting for a review by him. The two regiments of Infantry, the 186th Ambulance Company and the 186th Hospital Company passed in review before the Governor in a most creditable manner. It certainly is a pleasure to command such troops and have them show such marching efficiency. The review was marked by the presentation by Governor Hammill of the twenty-five year gold and diamond medal of the Iowa National Guard upon Lieut. Colonel Fred S. Hird, assigned to duty on the 34th Division Staff, he having completed twenty-five years' service in the Iowa National Guard. The complete ceremony for the conferring of decorations was carried out and was a very impressive ceremony.

Immediately after the review, the Governor held a reception for the officers of the command at the camp headquarters at which time he briefly commended the officers on the appearance of their commands. The Governor and his party were guests of the camp headquarters mess for the evening meal.

The Assistant Secretary of War, Colonel Hanford MacNider; the Commanding General 7th Corps Area and the officers connected with the administration of National Guard affairs at Corps Area headquarters were also camp visitors at different times during the period of the camp. Our division commander, General Tinley, also visited us.

Major T. F. Hardin USA, DOL assigned to camp as senior instructor, Captain Thomas B. Richardson Inf. USA, DOL. and Captain P. J. Dowling Inf. USA, DOL. as additional instructors were a very welcome addition to our list of instructors. These with Captain Fred W. Miller Inf. USA, DOL. Captain Allan Johnson Inf. USA. DOL. and Captain J. S. Claussen Inf. USA. DOL. rendered valuable aid in the training of the regiments. They were most efficient and took a genuine interest in their work with the different units.

During the night of August 15th-16th the U.S.A. Army Blimp RS1 arrived over camp from its station at Belleville, Illinois. It cruised over Des Moines and the camp area until five o'clock in the morning when it landed on the parade ground west of the arsenal buildings with the assistance of the third battalion of the 168th Infantry. The battalion remained on duty with the ship until it took to the air some five hours

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later, holding it to the ground and guarding it from the crowds which came from Des Moines to see it.

Amusements at the camp were in charge of the two Chaplains, Chaplain Van Metre of the 133d Infantry and Chaplain Hogan, 168th Infantry. Their arrangements were well made and executed. The large recreation building was given over to general camp entertainment while the platforms at each of the regimental headquarters were given over to boxing and wrestling contests. So well did the entertainment satisfy the men of the commands that requests for evening passes were reduced to such a minimum that it was not necessary to operate special trains on the interurban to care for their going and return.

In summing up, I believe the camp proved very successful in every way and was a marked improvement over the camp of the year 1926.

The recommendations of the regimental commanders in their reports attached hereto, are concurred in by the Camp Commander. It is also recommended that the young trees now in place along the roads in camp be cultivated, fertilized and trimmed and replacements be made for those missing also that some survey be made for future drainage of some parts of the camp area.

Subject: Report on Annual Field Training Period, 133d Infantry, Iowa N.G.

To: The Commanding General, 67th Inf. Brigade, Iowa N.G.

1. Pursuant to the provisions of Encampment Letter No. 2, Headquarters Iowa National Guard, AGO, Iowa, dated April 21, 1927 and Training Memorandum No. 1, Headquarters 67th Inf., Brigade, Iowa National Guard, dated May 15, 1927, the 133rd Infantry, Iowa N.G. assembled at Camp Dodge, Iowa on August 14, 1927 for Field Training. G.O. No. 6, these Headquarters (copy attached), together with Regimental Camp Orders No. 1 to 5 were issued and received by all officers and organizations before their departure from Home Station. Copies of the Field Training Program, as attached were also received at the Home Station.

2. The Service Co., less Band Section, arrived in Camp Dodge at 1:55 P. M. on August 12, 1927. Captain Althouse, R. 3, also arrived on this date. The time prior to the arrival of the Regiment was utilized by the Service Company in the preparation of the area to receive the troops, viz., the erection of canvas, placing of rations and supplies in kitchens, etc. The Regimental Commander desires to commend this system of preparation, and both Captain Althouse and the Service Company for their efficient work in connection therewith.

3. Special mention should be made of the fact, that notwithstanding the condition of having had a large number of sheep pastured on the Regimental Area for some time prior to the encampment, the area was in excellent shape and very little policing was required. It is our understanding that this was due to the circumstance of having a force of State Prisoners at work on the grounds for some time prior, and also due to the fact that it rained hard several times after the removal of the sheep. We would recommend that if sheep must be kept in Camp Dodge that they be placed somewhere else than in the Regimental Areas.

4. Various Organizations of the Regiment began to arrive in Camp at 8:00 A. M. August 14, 1927, and were all in camp by 3:00 P. M. All Organizations came in in excellent shape. The remainder of the day was spent in making camp. Special mention should be made concerning the fact that Co. "A" of Dubuque was transported by Motor Coach, thereby arriving at Camp Dodge early in the morning, instead of late at night as heretofore.

The above figures include four (4) reserve Officers attached for duty. While the attendance is considered satisfactory, it can and will be improved at subsequent encampments.

These instructors rendered valuable aid in the training of the Regiment and are to be commended for their efforts.

7. Training as outlined in the Field Training Program was started on Monday, August 15, and with very few changes was carried out through the encampment period. The Program this year functioned very smoothly, and wide comment has been made by both officers and enlisted men, that they derived much benefit from the training received, and they were well pleased with the manner in which it functioned. The afternoon schools worked out especially well. The instructors of each individual school had ample notice and time to prepare themselves for their work and they did so.

Two days were spent on the ranges, and the lack of preparatory instruction was again evident. Every effort will be made to improve this before another Field Training Period.

The Program this year provided very little duty for Sunday, August 21, and much appreciative comment has been made by the personnel. A majority of those who attend camp get no other vacation period, and the fact that they were permitted to enjoy a day free from duties, will not in my opinion, be at all detrimental to the Iowa National Guard as a whole. On the other hand it should reflect in added enlistments, and should serve in helping to bring back men to camp next year who might not come otherwise. In my opinion the success or failure of these encampments lays in the attitude of the personnel toward them. If they return to their home stations feeling that they have had a "good" encampment, have progressed in their training, this attitude is carried throughout the Armory Training Period. Both officers and enlisted men demonstrated this year that they are quick to learn and assimilate information. It is my opinion that the

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organization would quickly become efficient for Field Service in case of an emergency.

8. Weather during the entire encampment was cool, and contributed to the morale and training of the Regiment. The general health of the men was good.

9. Rations this year were excellent and there was very little complaint with the functioning of the supply department.

10. On August 26, 1927 the following organizations were relieved from duty at Camp Dodge and were sent home to assist in a Lindbergh Day Celebration.

It is our understanding that all these organizations acquitted themselves in a creditable manner at their home stations. However it is hoped that it will not be necessary to send organizations home in this manner, inasmuch as it disrupts the Field Training Period.

11. Activities of the Regiment are still handicapped on account of lack of proper terrain. The area between the tracks of the Interurban Railway and Main street could, at very little expense, be put in excellent shape for drill and parade purposes. As it is now it is so rough as to be practically useless. We would recommend that it be plowed up, leveled, and reseeded this fall so that it could be put to full use next year. For combat work there is no area available except that to the north. Steps should be taken to assure the use of this ground yearly.

12. The Regimental Commander desires to thank the Commanding General for the many courtesies shown him during the encampment. It has been a pleasure to serve under you.

Subject: Report on Annual Field Training Period, 168th Infantry, Iowa N. G.

To: The Commanding General 67th Inf. Brigade, Iowa N. G.

1. Pursuant to the provisions of Encampment Letter No. 2 Headquarters Iowa National Guard, AGO, Iowa, dated April 21, 1927, and Training Memorandum No. 1, Headquarters 67th Infantry Brigade, Iowa National Guard, dated May 15, 1927, and Training Memorandum No. 1

dated June 1, 1927, these Headquarters, the 168th Infantry, Iowa National Guard, assembled at Camp Dodge August 14, 1927, for Field Training.

2. Service Company, less band section, Captain Thomas, E. 3, pursuant to orders, arrived at Camp Dodge the afternoon of August 12, 1927, for the purpose of preparing the Camp area, mess halls, delivering canvas to prepared places in area, erecting part of canvas, placing rations in kitchens, icing refrigerators, etc. The work for which this organization was detailed to do, was finished on the morning of August 14, 1927, before the arrival of the troops, and in a most satisfactory manner.

3. With the exception of two organizations, every unit in the Regiment had at their own expense sent an advance detail of one or more men at least one of whom was a cook, so that upon the arrival of the various units the mess had been organized and the men were given a hot meal within a short time after arriving in camp. Every organization was in the camp by 2 P. M. and considering the fact that many of these organizations had entrained at very early hours the night before they came into camp, in excellent condition.

5. Two Reserve Officers were on duty with the Regiment during the entire period of training. Captain Hayes of the Infantry was detailed as Assistant Athletic Officer and had charge of mass athletics.

6. Regular Army Officers assigned to the Regiment were P. J. Dowling, Capt. Inf. DOL and Captain J. S. Claussen, Capt. Inf. DOL, who is the regular instructor assigned to the Regiment. Both instructors rendered very valuable assistance to the training of the Regiment, and were at all times ready to cooperate in this training.

7. With the exception of the Schools during the second week of the training period, the training as outlined in Field Training Program was carried out with few and only minor changes. The morning schedule was crowded due to the necessity under the program of performing all

drill and field training during morning hours. I believe, however, that this proved more satisfactory to the officers and men than continuing that part of the training into the afternoon.

S. During the afternoon of each day during the first week, all enlisted men and officers not assigned to other duties were marched to the Parade Ground where they engaged in mass athletics under direct supervision of Captain West, Athletic Officer, and Captain Hayes, Assistant, This was something the Regiment had never tried before and it is believed that this plan of athletics proved very satisfactory, first from purely athletic standpoint, and, second, the enthusiastic enjoyment the men seemed to get from the games themselves. These games consisted mostly of Volley Ball and Kitten Ball during the period from 1:30 until 3 P. M. At 3 P. M. all schools were dismissed and the entire personnel of the Regiment took part in these games in addition to other regular athletics. Due to the fact that so many men were attending schools from 1:30 to 3 P. M., during the second week of the Training Period, these schools were omitted and the entire Regiment was marched to the field at 1:30 and entered into these games until 4 P. M. It is believed that this form of athletics was the most successful that was ever participated in and that next year attendance of the schools will be cut down to the minimum but that schools will be held for those best qualified daily as was contemplated in this training program.

9. Two days were spent on the range. Machine Gun and Pistol range work were very satisfactory. The work on the Rifle Range not so satisfactory as last year, and steps must be taken by the Regiment to secure better preparatory instruction during the annual armory training period. These steps will be taken.

10. All duties for both officers and men for Sunday, August 21, were cut to the minimum, there being no formations of any kind except church service in the morning. Both the officers and men were excused for the entire day except for necessary detail.

11. The ration allowance was ample, and I believe this Regiment was never better rationed. I made frequent inspection of the messes and always found the men satisfied with well cooked meals. In fact I heard no complaints at all.

12. One of the army Blimps had been sent to Des Moines to take part in the American Legion Convention. The Regimental Commander was notified to assign 150 men to handle this Blimp upon its arrival. Major Caughlan and his Battalion were assigned to this duty. The Blimp arrived during the night and Major Caughlan upon being advised as to the time of the proposed landing had ample troops properly organized upon the field. A most successful landing was made as I was advised by the Commanding Officer of the Ship.

13. The Regiment had a new Chaplain, and after the second day of the camp each night upon the regimental platform a high class entertainment was given consisting of music both instrumental and vocal, boxing and wrestling. A large portion of the Regiment were present each night and a very small per cent of the officers and men left the camp.

14. The weather during the entire training period was ideal for the work of training. There was very little sickness in camp.

15. There are a number of open ditches in the regimental area that should be filled. This is particularly true in the area occupied by L company, D company and E company. A great deal of work should be done in leveling off other spaces in the regimental area.

16. The hauling away of the garbage was very satisfactorily performed, but the dry grass and other debris was each day raked up and piled in the rear of the regimental area and of necessity had to lay there for several hours before it could be hauled away by the Service Company. The building of a small battalion incinerator would simplify matters very materially and would save a great amount of unnecessary work on the part of the Service Company.

17. On the whole, I believe it is the opinion of the officers of the Regiment and the men themselves, that this training period was one of the most satisfactory in every respect that they ever had.

18. On August 25th I assumed command of the camp, but found matters so well organized at camp headquarters that it was not necessary for me to devote any time to the camp proper.

19. I desire to express my appreciation of the cooperation at all times of the Commanding General,

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### ARMY SERVICE SCHOOLS

Each year, the Federal Government allocates to each state a certain number of officers and enlisted men of the National Guard to be sent to Army Service Schools at Federal expense. The allotment of students to the states is based on the funds available and the number of students each state has previously been authorized to send to the various schools.

Officers and enlisted men are recommended and selected to attend these schools with particular attention being paid to their educational and physical qualifications, and their intention of remaining in the service. This is done in order that they may prove of value as instructors upon their return and that the National Guard of the state may profit from the training they have received. It has the added advantage of qualifying the officers and men attending the Service Schools, for advancement and the better performance of their duties. Needless to say, there are always more applications for attendance at the Service Schools than there are places to be filled.





#### ROSTER OF THE WORLD WAR AND MEXICAN BORDER SERVICE

There were approximately 114,218 persons in Iowa, either called or inducted into the World War Service and about 5,109 men were sent to the Mexican Border.

The revision of the historical sketches has necessitated further research for verification of data, which is almost an endless task and probably this work should be continued. Many errors in the spelling of geographical names and in giving the proper location of birth places, residences and places of induction have been discovered and corrected whenever possible. Mistakes were found in classifying the men according to race in quite a number of instances and corrections were authorized by the War Department.

Numerous amendments to service records were received from the Adjutant General's Office, War Department. All amendments have been properly inserted in the service records. In several instances service cards that were erroneously sent to other states were received and likewise cards that were sent to Iowa by mistake were ordered cancelled. Undoubtedly, errors will be found and additions and cancellations will be necessary for several years.

The collection, tabulation and verification of valuable statistics has been accomplished.

An effort has been made to eliminate superfluous words and phrases for the sake of brevity, in preparing material for the historical sketches and in compiling the roster.


