LETTER OF TRANSMITTAL

July 1, 1936.

SUBJECT: Biennial Report.

TO: HIS EXCELLENCY, CLYDE L. HERRING, Governor and Commander-in-Chief, State Capitol, Des Moines, Iowa.

I. In accordance with the provisions of Section 467-f42 of Chapter 28 of the Code of Iowa, 1935, there is submitted herewith the biennial report of the activities and expenses of the Adjutant General's Department during the period July 1, 1934 to June 30, 1936.

a. PERSONNEL.

During the period covered by this report, the personnel, the training, and the efficiency of the Iowa National Guard have steadily improved. Through the conduct of schools, conferences and extension courses, the officers and men have taken advantage of every opportunity to better qualify themselves.

b. CAMP DODGE.

During this biennium, through the Work Progress Administration, a new stone gateway and fence have been constructed at Camp Dodge. It adds much to the appearance of that Military Reservation. The Works Progress Administration is also working on a project of installing a storm sewer at Camp Dodge which will be of material benefit in connection with the drainage which has always been a serious problem.

It will be essential that the legislature appropriate sufficient funds for the rehabilitation of the water supply system at Camp Dodge. The present system was installed by the Federal Government in 1917. During the past several years, due to the fact that the seasons have been exceptionally dry, we have had great difficulty with the present obsolete equip-

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ment to supply water to the camp. It is apparent that with three thousand men at Camp Dodge each summer during the field training period, it is essential that we have an adequate water supply system.

c. ARMORIES.

During the present biennium, new armories have been constructed at Des Moines, Ottumwa, Burlington, and Cedar Falls.

A detailed report of other activities of the National Guard, General Orders published, financial report, et cetera, are contained in this report.

II. To you, Governor, I desire to extend the thanks of the entire Iowa National Guard for your sympathetic understanding of the problems that confront us and for your hearty cooperation and support in matters pertaining to this office. It has been a pleasure to administer the affairs of this office under such agreeable conditions and circumstances.

TRAINING OF THE IOWA NATIONAL GUARD

The Training Mission of the Iowa National Guard Units is to maintain that stage of combat training which will enable each Unit to be prepared at all times for use by the State or Federal Government for the suppression of domestic disturbances or insurrections, and by the Federal Government, in case of national emergency, for active field service.

The Training Year extends from the close of the Field Training period of one year to the close of the Field Training period of the next year. The Training Year is divided into, *a.* Armory Training Period, and *b.* Field Training Period.

ARMORY TRAINING PERIOD

Armory Training is, in general, that training which can be conducted satisfactorily in the Armories of the Units at their home stations. This consists of training in discipline, use and care of arms, material and equipment, leadership, responsibility of Commanders, protective measures against chemical warfare, and target practice.

The Armory Training is accomplished by following programs and schedules prepared beforehand by higher commanders. Training inspections are made from time to time by higher commanders to observe the progress being made and to determine whether or not the prescribed programs and schedules are being followed.

FIELD TRAINING PERIOD

Field Training consists of the application to practical exercises in the Field of such theoretical and practical knowledge as has been gained during the Armory Training Period. The Field Training for the Iowa National Guard Units is held for a 15-day period, each year, generally in the month of August, at Camp Dodge, Iowa, with the exception of the Artillery Regiment. Due to the fact that no Artillery Range is available in the State of Iowa, the 185th Field Artillery Regiment conducts its Field Training Period for 15 days at Camp Ripley, Little Falls, Minnesota. All expenses incident to the Field Training Period are paid by the Federal Government. This includes transportation, rations, pay, etc.

The Field Training Period is divided into the Morning Period, which is devoted purely to Military Training; the Afternoon Period, during which the time is devoted to schools for Officers, and non-commissioned Officers, physical training, athletics, field meets, etc.; the Evening Period from 4:30 p. m., during which ceremonies are held and amusements provided.

REDESIGNATION AND NEW UNITS OF THE IOWA NATIONAL GUARD

July 1, 1934 to June 30, 1936.

Redesignation of Service Company 168th Infantry, Iowa National Guard—Pursuant to authority contained in 4th Indorsement, War Department, National Guard Bureau, dated March 5, 1935, and Tables of Organization No. 25-NG., approved October 27, 1934, The Service Company, 168th Infantry, Iowa National Guard was redesignated "Service Company (less Staff Section) 168th Infantry, Iowa National Guard." This re-designation was effective April 11, 1935.

Organization of Staff Section, Service Company 168th Infantry, Iowa National Guard—Pursuant to authority contained in 4th Indorsement, War Department, National Guard Bureau, dated March 5, 1935, and Tables of Organization No. 25-NG., approved October 27, 1934, the Staff Section, Service Company, 168th Infantry, Iowa National Guard, was organized with station at Des Moines, Iowa. This organization was inspected for Federal Recognition on April 11, 1935, and Federal Recognition extended as of that date.

Headquarters 57th Cavalry Brigade, Iowa National Guard—Upon the death of Brigadier General Park A. Findley, Iowa National Guard, who commanded the 57th Cavalry Brigade, the Headquarters of this Brigade was allocated by the National Guard Bureau to the State of Kansas. However, that part of the brigade staff which had been allocated to the State of Iowa, with the exception of the Brigade Commander, was not changed.

Upon the organization of the 24th Cavalry Division, the Headquarters of the 57th Cavalry Brigade was again allocated to the State of Iowa, and Colonel Ray Yenter, Commanding the 113th Cavalry, was promoted to Brigadier General and assigned to command the 57th Cavalry Brigade.

Detachment, Headquarters 24th Cavalry Division—At the National Guard Convention held at Santa Fe, New Mexico, in October, 1935, the Adjutants General of the states of Kansas, Wyoming, Idaho, Colorado, Washington and Iowa, agreed to request the National Guard Bureau to organize the Headquarters, 24th Cavalry Division. The following allocation of vacancies on the Division Staff was agreed to:

The agreement reached by the Adjutants General of the states concerned at the Santa Fe convention was a result of preliminary work conducted for a year and a half preceding this meeting. The National Guard Bureau approved the organization of the Headquarters of the 24th Cavalry Division and Federal Recognition was extended to the Headquarters as of January 28, 1936. Captain Ray C. Fountain, S-3 of the 57th Cavalry Brigade, Iowa National Guard, was promoted to Lieutenant Colonel, Cavalry, Iowa National Guard, and assigned as G-2, of the 24th Cavalry Division.

Considerable satisfaction is to be derived from the fact that the Headquarters, 24th Cavalry Division, is the first Cavalry Division Headquarters to be organized in the National Guard of the United States.

New Units. The following letters, dated January 9, 1936, January 27, 1936, and April 2, 1936, were received from the Chief, National Guard Bureau, relative to the proposed organization of the 186th Collecting Company and the 187th Ambulance Company:

Subject: New Units to be Organized from first 5,000 Increase.

To: The Adjutant General of Iowa (through the Commanding General, Seventh Corps Area).

1. The National Guard Bureau plan for organization of new units, from the increase of 5,000 enlisted men authorized for the fiscal year 1936, has been approved in principle by order of the Secretary of War, and will be carried out if not prevented by unforeseen circumstances.

2. Provision is made in this plan for organization of the following units in Iowa; and it is planned to increase the state strength allotment sufficiently to provide for them:

3. The funds appropriated for equipment and maintenance (including pay) of the new units during the fiscal year 1936, will permit Federal recognition on April 1, 1936, with a total of not to exceed twelve (12) drills during the fiscal year 1936.

4. Arrangements will be made to supply clothing to these units, upon their Federal recognition. Definite instructions as to requisitions for clothing and equipment will be forwarded to each State Adjutant General and Corps Area Commander concerned in the near future.

5. Authority for organization will be given as soon as final approval is received.

6. The National Guard Bureau has recorded your verbally expressed desire to organize a fourth medical unit (Service Company) in order that the regimental commander of the 136th Medical Regiment (and Division Surgeon, 34th Division) may be recognized in accordance with the provisions of paragraph 56 e, National Guard Regulations 20. Due to restrictions in the Appropriations Act for the fiscal year 1936, no new service units may be organized during this fiscal year; but if the 187th Ambulance Company were organized, the National Guard Bureau could recognize a field officer as regimental commander and division surgeon. The required maintenance strength of the Ambulance Company is 2 officers and 44 enlisted men. If you can organize and maintain the 186th Collecting Company and the 187th Ambulance Company, with a total increase of 4 officers and 96 enlisted men, the National Guard Bureau will so increase the allotted strength of Iowa when final approval of this plan is received.

NOTE: The strength allotted to the various units is 2 officers and 62 enlisted men less than the total strength allocated to the State of Iowa by the National Guard Bureau. Of this, 2 officers and 50 enlisted men have been allotted to the 186th Collecting Company to be organized in July, 1936. The remaining differential of 12 is necessary in order that the maximum allocated enlisted strength may not be exceeded at any time.

ARMY SERVICE SCHOOLS

Each year the War Department authorizes National Guard Officers and enlisted men to attend certain of the Army Service Schools. The schools are conducted at the expense of the federal government and are of inestimable value to the National Guard. Officers and enlisted men are recommended and selected to attend these Service Schools with particular attention being paid to their educational and physical qualifications and their intention of remaining in the military service.

RIFLE MARKSMANSHIP COMPETITIONS

During the fiscal years 1935 and 1936, units of the Iowa National Guard competed in the Chief, National Guard Bureau's Indoor Rifle Team Matches and in the William

Randolph Hearst Musketry Competitions. There were also competitions in outdoor firing held between various organizations at home stations.

CHIEF, NATIONAL GUARD BUREAU'S INDOOR RIFLE TEAM MATCHES

These matches are held annually under the authority of the National Guard Bureau and under the supervision of the National Rifle Association. The matches are divided into two principal phases; *a*, the Company Team Match, *b*, National Team Match. The Company Team Matches are to determine which company, troop or battery team throughout the nation is to receive the title "The Chief of the National Guard Bureau's Champion Company Indoor Rifle Team." The team consists of a Team Captain, Team Coach and five firing members. The regimental teams are selected by the Regimental Commanders, and are composed of a Team Captain, Team Coach and ten firing members. All units armed with the rifle are eligible to compete. The course is fired with the .22 Caliber rifle as issued, and on a fifty-foot gallery range.

Company Team Match, 1935: There were thirty-three teams entered from units of the 133rd Infantry, 168th Infantry and 113th Cavalry. More teams were entered from the state of Iowa than from any other state in the union. The next nearest number of entries was California with 17 teams in the competition. This match was won by Co. "F," 133rd Infantry, Mason City, with a total score of 2,777. The National Team Match was won by Co. "B," 186th Infantry, Oregon National Guard, with a total score of 2,866. Each member of the winning team in each state was awarded a bronze medal by the Chief, National Guard Bureau.

Regimental Team Match, 1935: Teams selected by the Regimental Commanders were assembled at Des Moines in order that the firing of this match could be held under neutral supervision. The 133rd Infantry, 168th Infantry and 113th Cavalry were each represented by a team. The match was won by the 168th Infantry with a score of 5,406. The National Match was won by the 122nd Infantry, Georgia National Guard, with a total score of 5,757.

Company Team Match, 1936: Twenty-six teams from the 133rd Infantry, 168th Infantry and 113th Cavalry fired in this competition. The next nearest entry was West Virginia with 16 teams. The match was won by Co. "G," 168th Infantry with a score of 1,842. The National Match was won by Co. "E," 144th Infantry, Texas National Guard, with a total score of 1,886.

Regimental Team Match, 1936: A team was entered by each of the three regiments competing in the 1935 matches. These regimental teams were again assembled at Des Moines for shoulder to shoulder competition. The match was again annexed by the 168th Infantry with a total score of 3,497. The National Match was won by the 9th Infantry, Fort Sam Houston, Texas, with a total score of 3,775.

WILLIAM RANDOLPH HEARST MUSKETRY COMPETITION

There is held annually a competition in musketry sponsored by William Randolph Hearst. This competition is to determine the outstanding team in each regiment and also throughout the nation. The company winning its respective Regimental Match is designated as Regimental Champion, and the members of the team receive bronze medals. A team is composed of a Corporal, and four firing members. Musketry problem is fired on the indoor range with Cal. .22 rifles as issued. In 1935, Company "F," 168th Infantry was designated regimental champion, while Co. "L," 133rd Infantry annexed the title for that regiment. The 1936 winners were Company "E," 168th Infantry and Company "L," 133rd Infantry.

NATIONAL MATCHES AT CAMP PERRY, OHIO

The State of Iowa was represented at the National Matches held at Camp Perry, Ohio, by a civilian team. There being no appropriations made for the participation of the National Guard at the National Matches on a pay status, it was found impracticable to send a National Guard team to the Matches at state expenses. An insufficient number of men could absent themselves from their employment for the necessary period of time to send a team on the voluntary basis. Reasonable assurance has been given that the appropriations will be restored for the fiscal year 1937, and it is hoped that

a National Guard team may be entered in the matches during the coming year.

EXAMINATIONS FOR U. S. MILITARY ACADEMY

Each year the Governor of Iowa is authorized to nominate one or more enlisted men of the Iowa National Guard to take the final examination for entrance to the U. S. Military Academy. The statutes provide that the persons nominated must be selected through the medium of a competitive examination. Examinations are held annually between November 1st and 15th.

For the calendar year 1934, the Governor was authorized to nominate two members of the Iowa National Guard to take the entrance examination, but only one was authorized for the calendar year, 1935.

The examination questions were prepared by one of the state educational institutions through the cooperation of the State Board of Education. Upon the completion of the examination, the papers were graded by the teaching staff of one of the educational institutions. For the years covered by this report, the examinations were prepared by the Iowa State Teachers College, and the completed papers graded by the same institution. Acknowledgment is made for the splendid cooperation of President Latham and the teaching staff of the Iowa State Teachers College and for their valuable assistance in making the examination a success.

In 1934, as a result of the preliminary competitive examination, the following were nominated to take the entrance examination:

Pvt. 1st cl. John R. Wright, Serv. Co. 133rd Inf., Fairfield.

Pvt. Newton E. James, Hq. Co. 2nd Bn. 133rd Inf., Mason City.

In 1935 Pvt. William W. Wilcox, M. G. Tr. 113th Cav., Oskaloosa, was nominated to take the entrance examination.

The final entrance examinations are held annually at Omaha, Nebraska, under the supervision of the Regular Army.

In the past, the Iowa National Guard has furnished some outstanding cadets to the Military Academy. One in particular is worthy of mention. Cadet Fred E. Ressegieu, who was appointed to the Academy as a result of a competitive examination, was a member of Co. "M," 133rd Infantry, Sioux

City. At the close of the Academic year 1935, this cadet was rated a Distinguished Cadet and finished fifth in a class of 316. Also worthy of mention is the fact that there were four members of Co. "M," 133rd Infantry, Sioux City, Iowa, in attendance at the U. S. Military Academy at the same time. These were: Fred E. Ressegieu, James D. Lange, Austin G. Fisher and Burton E. McKenzie. The first three mentioned were appointed from the National Guard, whereas McKenzie was appointed by Congressman Gillette.

A marked increase in the activities of the Iowa Soldiers' Bonus Board for the biennium is to be noted. Several factors for this increase can be cited. The most important of these factors, however, is the closer relationship between this department and the two hundred ninety-seven county soldiers' relief commissioners in the state.

Because of the economic conditions existing during this period many questions of policy have arisen and it is to this department that requests for information and guidance have been directed. Also, the fact that it has been necessary to co-ordinate soldiers' relief with the Emergency Relief and Works Progress Administrations, has brought forth many detailed and complex questions.

From the state disability fund, a total of \$176,383.57 has been expended for the aid of disabled Iowa veterans and their dependents. In this same period of time, approximately \$1,100,000.00 has been spent by the counties on both unemployable and employable veterans and their dependents.

As a protection to all veterans whose services are accredited to the state, copies of their records were completed and have been stored with the historical department. This was done to avoid the experience of other states which lost the records of their veterans by fire. The work of making these records was done as a federal works project with the cost to this department amounting to \$35.50 for supplies. The records of 114,217 veterans who served from Iowa are maintained in the files of this department.

Added to the activities of the department by the last General Assembly, is the duty of administering the World War Orphans' Educational fund. This fund amounting to \$5,000.00 was appropriated for the aid of war orphans in securing a college education. There are one hundred one orphans who are entitled or will be entitled to receive aid from this fund. At the present time, aid is being furnished seventeen orphans in the various educational institutions in the state.

The revenue on which this department operates and from which disability allowances are made is derived as interest from a trust fund amounting to \$1,782,000.00, which was established after the original bonus had been paid.

GRAVES REGISTRATION DIVISION

W. F. Hathaway, Secretary

For the purpose of perpetuating the memory of those who have served in the military and naval forces of the United States, in time of war, and to provide information to patriotic organizations, and to encourage the custom of decorating their graves on Memorial Day, this Division is charged with the duty of compiling a record of their burial places within the state.

Patriotic and service organizations, have continued their support of this program with added interest and active work. The American Legion is still giving its full support and has

extended the organization for its accomplishment to practically all of their Posts. During this period this office carried on an aggressive program in cooperation with their leadership. This was done by personal visits to their various meetings and by correspondence.

One of the most valuable sources of assistance to the Graves Registration Division is the activity of the Allied Grand Army groups, known as the Women's Relief Corps, The Ladies' of the Grand Army, The Daughters of Union Veterans, The Sons of Union Veterans and their Auxiliary. They are developing a program for their own purpose, that will be of benefit to the state program. It has as its object the registration of the burial places of soldiers who were relatives of their members, regardless of where they may be buried. They are also undertaking to make a registration of the burial place of each member of The Grand Army Post that formerly existed in their community. This will prove a very valuable asset to the state.

The number of registrations that have been received to date, is approximately 35,000. These are in various stages of completion, from very little information to some that have very complete records. There is a desire on the part of each organization, to take advantage of this opportunity to provide a permanent record of the graves of the Iowa service men. They are obtaining all information possible in the locality where each soldier lived, and from relatives and others who may have knowledge that would be of value to such a record. All records will eventually be checked thoroughly and any additional information will be added. It is the intention to make each registration a complete history of the life and service of the veteran.

To accomplish this objective, it is necessary to do an extensive amount of research work. Some of the sources of information are as follows:

1. Cemeteries are thoroughly and systematically searched. Many veterans' graves do not have any marking to distinguish them as such. Consequently workers have to rely upon their ingenuity in devising means of getting the needed information.

2. Newspaper files, wherever they exist are a valuable asset. However, many notices of the death of veterans and

obituaries do not mention the fact that they served their country, or do not give any indication of the organization with which they served.

3. County records, at the courthouse where the soldier may have filed a claim for tax exemption, or where his discharge papers may have been recorded.

4. Libraries, particularly those having histories pertaining to the county in which they are located.

5. Records of Grand Army Posts, American Legion Posts, Spanish War Camps, Veterans of Foreign Wars and other patriotic organizations.

6. Family records and relatives of a soldier, his former friends and early residents.

Every patriotic and service organization is cooperating with the second part of the program, which has as its objective the placing of a headstone or marker at each unmarked veteran's grave. It is the prevailing belief of each, that our nation's defenders are entitled to at least one moment's thought, from a passerby. An unmarked grave robs its tenant of this just due.

In this state it has been discovered there are several hundred such graves without any marking of any kind to identify them as graves of veterans. Many others have markers made of poor grade material and the inscription is gradually becoming deleted. There are also many veterans' graves with very fine monuments or headstones, entirely destitute of anything to indicate the service rendered by the veteran.

The lack of markers on the graves of many veterans is due to the fact that relatives or friends do not have financial means for providing them. In some cases it is due to a lack of interest.

It is the intention to provide a remedy for such situations and progress is being made. Congress authorized the War Department to furnish a headstone for each unmarked, honorably discharged veteran's grave, when proper application is made. This office has a supply of application blanks to distribute to those who desire to make such application, and cooperates in furnishing information required by the War Department.

During the fiscal year of 1935, there were 620 government headstones shipped into Iowa, and in 1936 there were 841.

This is regarded as good progress towards the objective it is hoped will be accomplished. There are however, some sections of certain cemeteries and in some cases entire cemeteries, where a headstone that extends a certain distance above the ground, is forbidden. To overcome this, the American Legion is requesting Congress to authorize the War Department to design a headstone that will comply with the rules governing such burial places.

There has been one outstanding effort with reference to obtaining government headstones, and that is in Lee county, where the department chairman of the American Legion, Charles E. Roberts, has obtained and set up 98 of them in cemeteries in and near the city of Keokuk.

The third part of this program covers the care of veterans' graves. We find many shameful and sad situations existing in many of the old abandoned cemeteries. Hundreds are found to be covered with a heavy growth of weeds and brush and in some cases animals have burrowed into graves and actually brought human bones to the surface of the ground. Others are sunken with no drainage or care being provided, and have been in such a condition for many years.

Most of the old cemeteries were first used when the pioneer settlers entered the state, and when a death occurred, burial was made where most convenient. There were then no established burial grounds. When highways were established and churches organized, better cemeteries were started. Interest in old burial places gradually waned, and as a consequence, the disgraceful situations developed. Some of these old cemeteries have lost their identity, and have been plowed over.

It is recommended that legislation be passed by the 47th General Assembly, charging the counties with the responsibility of caring for these old burial places.

The Iowa Aeronautics Commission which functions through the office of the Adjutant General, has been very active during the past biennium, in acquainting the people of the state

with the Iowa aeronautics laws with a view towards eliminating the practice of flying unlicensed ships, and flying by unlicensed pilots.

On December 7 and 8, 1934, the Second Regional meeting of the North Central Section of the National Association of State Aviation Officials was held in Des Moines. Papers were read and round table discussions held on many matters of interest and importance to State Aviation officials.

At a meeting of the Aeronautics Commission, June 19, 1935, the following rules and regulations were adopted. They have been printed in pamphlet form and distributed to pilots, owners of aircraft, and to managers of airports throughout the state.

CHAPTER 1

LICENSING OF AIRCRAFT

Section 1. Registration, Meaning of—Registration means entry of a licensed aircraft in an official license registry of the Secretary of the Commission of Aeronautics as aircraft of the United States. Unlicensed aircraft, though entered of record for purposes of identification are not registered aircraft within the meaning of these regulations.

Sec. 2. Airworthiness, Meaning of—Airworthiness means conformity with requirements prescribed or deviations therefrom approved by the Bureau of Air Commerce.

NOTE—See Airworthiness Requirements (Aeronautics Bulletin No. 7-A) for airworthiness requirements prescribed by the Bureau of Air Commerce.

Sec. 3. Manufacturer's Identification Data—(1) The date of manufacture and the date of remodeling and the name of the manufacturer and the remodeler, together with the manufacturer's serial number, model designation, and type of engine, must be permanently affixed in a visible location by means of a metal plate in the pilot's cockpit or compartment of each aircraft in order that it may be distinguished from all other aircraft.

(2) All engines used in licensed aircraft shall be provided with an identification plate.

This plate shall be so attached to the engine as to be accessible when the engine is installed in the aircraft.

The following information shall be given on the identification plate: Name or designation of engine, maker's name, model number, serial number, approved rated engine speed, and approved rated power.

(3) Baggage compartments shall have conspicuously displayed a placard stating the maximum load for which such compartments have been approved by the Bureau of Air Commerce.

(4) The manufacturer shall specify the gasoline capacity of each gasoline tank on the manufacturer's plate prescribed in paragraph one (1) hereof, or on or adjacent to the pilot's shut-off valves for the fuel supply in the pilot's compartment. In addition, the filler caps of each gasoline and oil tank shall be so marked as to show the capacity of that particular tank.

Sec. 4. Sale of Licensed Aircraft—On the date of sale or transfer of

title of licensed aircraft, the recorded owner shall report in writing to the Commissioner of Aeronautics, giving the date and place of sale or transfer and the name and residence of the purchaser. The recorded owner shall execute the transfer portion of the registration certificate and mail it promptly to the Secretary of the Iowa Aeronautics Commission. A new certificate will be issued upon proper registry of newly recorded owner. A time limit of 15 days will be permitted for filing of this application of transfer with the Secretary of the Iowa Aeronautics Commission.

DEFINITION OF OWNERSHIP

Recorded owner is the individual, partnership, company, or corporation that has presented to the Bureau of Air Commerce evidence of ownership acceptable for the purposes of licensing.

Sec. 5. Grounding of Airplanes—An airplane may be grounded by the Commission of Aeronautics or any officer designated by the Commission for

(a) Violating the air commerce act or any regulations promulgated thereunder.

(b) Equipping the airplane with a type of engine not specified in the license.

(c) Remodeling the engine and using it to propel licensed aircraft without the aircraft having been first rerated as airworthy by the Bureau of Air Commerce.

(d) Remodeling the airplane structure and flying the airplane without having it first rerated as airworthy by the Bureau of Air Commerce.

(e) Operating the airplane in excess of the authorized useful load as specified in the license.

(f) Operating with passengers in excess of the number authorized in the aircraft license. Children under 12 years of age are excepted, provided the maximum pay load as specified in the aircraft license is not exceeded and further provided the aircraft is properly equipped with individual safety belts for each occupant 5 years of age or older.

(g) Using or displaying license for fraudulent purpose and/or misrepresenting any product for which an approved type of certificate has been issued.

(h) Using or displaying license in any manner contrary to the public safety or interest.

(i) Equipping aircraft with type of propeller which will permit the rated revolutions per minute of engine to be exceeded by more than the allowable excess specified by the engine manufacturer which in no case shall be more than 5 per cent in level flight.

(j) Moral irresponsibility of manufacturer and/or owner.

CHAPTER 2

INSPECTION OF AIRCRAFT

Sec. 6. Continuous Duty as to Flying Conditions—After an aircraft is licensed, and between the times that it is inspected for airworthiness by an inspector, the owner is charged with the continuous duty of maintaining the aircraft in a good and proper state of repair and flying condition.

Sec. 7. Weekly and Periodic Inspection—(a) It is the responsibility of the recorded owner that licensed aircraft (other than aircraft engaged in scheduled interstate passenger operation for which inspection requirements are outlined in Aeronautics Bulletin No. 7-E) shall be given a line inspection by a licensed airman at least once within seven days preceding flight, except, however, that there shall be at least one

inspection for each 25 hours of flying time. The result thereof shall be entered in the log under the signature of the person making such inspection. The line inspection must be made to ascertain the working conditions and state of repair of the

- (1) Open control wires, all control wires and pulleys open to inspection through apertures, and all hinges on control surfaces.
- (2) Landing gear, wheels, fittings, and shock absorbers.
- (3) Fuselage parts open to visual inspection.
- (4) Main plane external bracing, including fittings and struts, external wires, cables, turn-buckles, and fabric or covering.
- (5) Control-surface fabric or covering.
- (6) Engine-exhaust manifolds and exhaust-pipe extensions. The engine shall be given a warming-up test, during which the proper functioning of the engine instruments shall be ascertained.
- (7) Carburetors and fuel-feed lines open to visual inspection to insure proper functioning.
- (8) Cooling system and connections.
- (9) Cowling, to insure that the cowlings are properly secured and safetied.
- (10) Propellers, as to condition.

(b) After each 100 hours of flight the aircraft must be given a "periodic inspection" by a licensed mechanic, and the result thereof must be entered in the log by the person making such inspection. This inspection must be made to ascertain the working condition and state of repair of the

- (1) Engine installation.
- (2) Control systems throughout.
- (3) Propeller alignment.
- (4) Fuselage, including fittings, tail skid, and tail-skid shock absorbers.
- (5) All items specified in (a) above.

Sec. 8. Government Inspection—The inspector or other authorized officer of the Bureau of Air Commerce shall be permitted by the owner, operating agency, or pilot to inspect the licensed aircraft at any time and place for the purpose of determining its flying condition and state of repair. For such purposes the owner, operating agency, or pilot shall give to such inspector or officer free and uninterrupted access to the aircraft and the field or shelter where the craft is located.

CHAPTER 3

OPERATION OF AIRCRAFT

Sec. 9. Accident Reports—Where serious injury to person or property is suffered or death results in operating licensed aircraft the recorded owner and/or pilot of such aircraft shall immediately report, by telegraph or telephone, to the Secretary of Iowa Aeronautics Commission the license number or identification number of the aircraft and the time and place of the accident. All accidents in the operation of licensed aircraft which result in injury to the aircraft shall be reported by the recorded owner and/or pilot without delay on the form provided for that purpose. This last sentence shall not apply to gliders, except when serious injury or death results to persons.

Sec. 10. Flying Damaged Aircraft—(a) A licensed aircraft which is slightly damaged but not damaged to such an extent as to come within the meaning of major component shall not be flown until it has been fully repaired and such repairs approved by a licensed mechanic. The repair and approval must be noted in the airplane log, together with the signature of the mechanic involved.

(b) A licensed aircraft which is seriously damaged shall not be flown until it has been fully repaired in accordance with Section 31, Bulletin No. 7, and the repairs approved by a Bureau of Air Commerce inspector.

Sec. 11. Repair and Reconstruction of Licensed Aircraft.

NOTE. For acceptable repair methods see Aeronautics Bulletin No. 7-H.

(a) When a licensed aircraft or major component thereof, such as the fuselage, the tail surfaces, the control system, a wing, or a landing gear, has been damaged to a greater extent than 50 per cent, in the opinion of the inspector, for the Bureau of Air Commerce, the rebuilder will be required to submit to the Bureau drawings and stress analysis of the parts to be rebuilt or repaired. If these drawings and stress analysis are approved by the Bureau, the repairs shall be made in accordance with such approved drawings and analysis, and the rebuilder shall furnish the inspector for the Bureau making the final inspection a statement under oath that repairs have been made in accordance with such approved drawings.

(b) When a licensed aircraft or major component thereof, such as the fuselage, the tail surfaces, the control system, a wing, or a landing gear, has been damaged to a less extent than 50 per cent, in the judgment of the inspector, but is classed by him as a major repair, the rebuilder will be required to submit to the Bureau of Air Commerce a drawing or drawings of the parts to be rebuilt or repaired showing clearly the dimensions, sizes, and materials to be used in the rebuilt or repaired members. The rebuilder will furnish the inspector for the Bureau making the inspection a statement under oath that repairs have been made in accordance with such drawings.

(c) The requirements stated above in paragraphs a or b shall not apply when the repair has been made by an approved repair station provided such repair is in accordance with Aeronautics Bulletin No. 7-H.

(d) In order for a repair station to engage in the repair of licensed aircraft as an approved repair station, it must be approved as such by the Bureau of Air Commerce. Requirements for such approval are set forth in Aeronautics Bulletin No. 7-H.

(e) (1) Paragraphs a and b of this section shall not apply to gliders. A licensed glider or major component thereof, such as the fuselage, control system or a wing, which in the opinion of the inspector for the Bureau of Air Commerce, has been damaged to a greater extent than 50 per cent, shall not be flown until the same has been repaired by a licensed airplane mechanic and such repairs approved by an inspector for the Bureau of Air Commerce. The repair and approval shall be noted in the glider log together with the signature of the inspector and the mechanic involved.

(2) A licensed glider which is slightly damaged but not damaged to such an extent as to come within the meaning of subparagraph (1) of this paragraph, shall not be flown until it has been fully repaired and such repairs approved by a licensed airplane mechanic. The repair and approval shall be noted in the glider log together with the signature of the mechanic involved.

(f) The Commission of Aeronautics, in its discretion, may at any time require the holder of the aircraft license to comply with any of the requirements which were a prerequisite for the original licensing.

Sec. 12. Solo Flights with Passenger Planes—In addition to the requirements of Airworthiness Requirements (Aeronautics Bulletin No. 7-A), licensed airplanes with newly installed engines—old, new, or reconditioned—and airplanes upon which major repairs have been made to the plane structure must be first test flown by a licensed pilot before carrying passengers for hire.

Sec. 13. Responsibility of Owner—The owner of licensed aircraft shall not permit the same to be flown by any person other than a pilot licensed by the Bureau of Air Commerce for the type of operation involved.

Sec. 14. Supplies and Equipment—(a) In licensed aircraft the controls shall be so constructed or arranged to prevent passengers or cargo from interfering with the course of flight of the aircraft. A passenger may, however, be permitted to sit at controls of a side-by-side dual controlled aircraft operated by a transport, limited commercial, or private pilot, provided no passengers are carried for hire. A passenger may also be permitted to sit at controls of a tandem dual controlled aircraft operated by a transport, limited commercial, or private pilot provided no other person is in the aircraft.

(b) The following equipment and instruments are required in licensed aircraft and shall be serviceable and in operating condition:

(1) Fire-extinguishing equipment, of design approved by the Commission of Aeronautics. Cabin airplanes carrying passengers must be equipped with at least one portable extinguisher accessible to the passengers.

(2) First-aid kits in aircraft carrying passengers.

(3) Safety belts or equivalent for pilot and passengers in all aircraft. Seats or chairs in cabin aircraft shall be firmly secured in place. Safety belts and their attachments shall be capable of withstanding a load of 1,000 pounds applied in the same manner as a passenger's weight would be applied in a crash. The attachment shall be such as to be capable of carrying this load through to the main structure.

(4) Aircraft and engine log books.

(5) Tachometer of each engine.

(6) Oil-pressure gage where oil-pressure systems are employed.

(7) Water thermometers for water-cooled engines and oil thermometers for air cooled engines.

(8) Altimeter.

(9) Compass Requirements—An aircraft flying across country 100 or more miles shall be equipped with a compass.

Sec. 15. Logs and Navigation Reports—(a) The owners of all licensed aircraft shall keep a navigation and engine log book for each aircraft and shall have recorded in such log book a current report of the duration of the use of each engine, the engine installation and repairs, and the plane structure and rigging changes and repairs. The log books shall be carried in the aircraft at all times when such aircraft is away from its home airport: Provided, however, that logs for aircraft engaged in scheduled air transportation service may be maintained and kept at terminals.

(b) The owner of every licensed aircraft engaged in flying, other than scheduled air transport service, shall on the 1st day of January and July of each year, transmit to the Bureau of Air Commerce a navigation summary report showing the hours flown in each kind of non-scheduled operation during the six months immediately preceding the rendering of the report, and such other data as are specified from time to time on forms provided for this purpose by the Bureau of Air Commerce. When licensed aircraft are not flown during the period, the fact shall be so reported.

CHAPTER 4

MARKING OF LICENSED AND UNLICENSED AIRCRAFT

Sec. 16. Other Symbols and Marks—Except with the approval of the Bureau of Air Commerce, no design, mark, character, symbol, or description shall be placed upon aircraft if said design, etc., modifies, adds to, or subtracts from or confuses the assigned mark or impairs or destroys its visibility.

CHAPTER 5

LICENSING OF PILOTS

Sec. 17. Application of the Law—For the purpose of this chapter persons in command of or piloting licensed aircraft in flight will be classed as pilots.

Sec. 18. Classification of Pilots—Licensed pilots are classed as commercial or noncommercial pilots. Commercial pilots are licensed as transport or limited commercial pilots or as commercial glider pilots. Noncommercial pilots are designated as private, amateur, student pilots or noncommercial glider pilots.

Sec. 19. Privileges and Restrictions of Licensed Pilots—Except as otherwise provided in these regulations, the privileges conferred and restrictions imposed upon licensed pilots are as follows:

(a) Transport pilots may pilot any type of licensed aircraft, but shall not carry persons for hire in licensed aircraft other than in conventional types of heavier-than-air craft and within the classes specified in their license.

Transport pilots shall demonstrate their ability to navigate land-planes, seaplanes, or both in one or more of the weight classes set forth below. Such demonstration shall be to the satisfaction of the examiner for the Bureau of Air Commerce.

No pilot shall pilot unlicensed aircraft in Iowa without a waiver in writing from the Commission of Aeronautics.

(b) Limited commercial pilots shall have all of the privileges conferred and be subject to all of the restrictions imposed upon transport pilots, except that they shall not, for hire, instruct students in the operation of aircraft in flight and they shall not pilot aircraft carrying persons for hire outside of the areas mentioned in their licenses, except that they may be permitted to function as copilot on dual-controlled aircraft when accompanied by a transport pilot who is in command of and responsible for the operation of such aircraft. Such pilots may, beyond the 10-mile radius of their base, operate licensed aircraft carrying guests, executives, or employees of the companies employing them, provided no payment is made for the transportation. They may also demonstrate aircraft in flight to prospective purchasers.

(c) Commercial glider pilots may pilot any type of motorless aircraft but shall not transport persons or property nor instruct students except in licensed motorless aircraft.

(d) Noncommercial glider pilots' licenses may be issued for non-commercial flights upon satisfactory accomplishment of the prescribed flight tests.

(e) (1) Private pilots may pilot licensed aircraft but shall not carry persons or cargo for hire in licensed or unlicensed aircraft. They shall not for hire instruct students in the operation of aircraft in flight. Such pilots may operate aircraft carrying guests, executives, or employees of companies employing them, provided no payment is made for the transportation. They may also demonstrate aircraft in flight to prospective purchasers.

(2) Amateur pilots may pilot licensed aircraft but shall not carry persons (except licensed transport, limited commercial, or private pilots in dual controlled aircraft) or cargo in licensed or unlicensed aircraft, nor instruct students in the operation of aircraft in flight.

(3) Student pilots may operate licensed aircraft only while receiving flying instruction. They shall not be in command of aircraft carrying any other person and shall not carry cargo in licensed or unlicensed aircraft. They may make solo cross country practice flights, but while away from their home airport on such flights shall not make landings on airports where flying meets or air races are in progress or at airline

terminals. They shall not be in command of United States aircraft operating in a foreign country.

(f) Until otherwise provided by regulations the licensing of airship and balloon pilots shall be in accordance with special orders of the Bureau of Air Commerce.

(g) Special classes of pilot license may be issued for operation of unconventional types of aircraft in accordance with special orders of the Bureau of Air Commerce.

Sec. 20. Personal Possession of Pilots' Licenses—The pilot's license shall be kept in his personal possession when he is piloting aircraft and must be presented for inspection upon the demand of any passenger or any authorized official or employee of the Commission of Aeronautics or municipal officials charged with enforcing local regulations or laws involving Federal compliance.

Sec. 21. Pilots' Certified Log Books—A licensed pilot must keep an accurate record of his solo flying time in a log book in which the entries have been certified to and signed by him and attested by one of the following persons:

(a) An official of an approved type airplane or engine manufacturing company.

(b) An official of an approved flying school.

(c) A contract United States air mail operator.

(d) A notary public.

(e) A properly authorized operations officer for any military organization.

(f) Bureau of Air Commerce aeronautical inspectors.

(g) Any officer of an organization engaged in the operation of aircraft when such officer has direct knowledge of the authenticity of the entries.

This log book shall contain the date of flight, the type of aircraft flown, the license or identification number of such aircraft, the type of engine, the duration of the flight, and the points between which such flight was made, and, in addition, when any flight results in serious damage to the aircraft, a notation to this effect shall be entered. This log book must be presented, upon demand, to any authorized representative of the Commission of Aeronautics or municipal officer enforcing local regulations or laws involving Federal compliance.

Sec. 22. Pilots' Night-Flying Qualifications—A transport or limited commercial pilot who has not had at least 2 hours of night solo flying within the last preceding 90 days shall not pilot aircraft carrying passengers, for hire, between sunset and sunrise, except where he takes off and lands between sunset and sunrise, at least ten times solo. At least three of such landings must be to a full stop.

Sec. 23. Meaning of Solo Flying—As used in these regulations, a person is engaged in solo flying when he is the sole operator of the controls and is in command of aircraft in flight.

CHAPTER 6

LICENSING OF MECHANICS

Sec. 24. Application of the Law—For the purpose of this chapter, persons repairing or adjusting licensed aircraft in flight, and persons in charge of the ground inspection, overhauling, or repairing of licensed aircraft will be classed as mechanics. A workman or mechanic may engage in the repair or over haul of licensed aircraft without being licensed if such repair or overhaul is in charge of a licensed mechanic. An application for a mechanic's license must be filed, under oath, with the Bureau of Air Commerce upon blanks furnished for that purpose. An

applicant for mechanic's license is not required to take a physical examination.

Sec. 25. Personal Possession of Mechanics' Licenses—A mechanic's license shall be kept in his personal possession when he is serving in connection with licensed aircraft and must be presented for inspection upon the demand of any passenger in or owner of repaired licensed aircraft upon which such mechanic has worked, or any authorized official or employee of the Commission of Aeronautics or State or Municipal officials charged with enforcing local regulations or laws involving Federal compliance.

CHAPTER 7

AIR TRAFFIC RULES

Sec. 26. Display of License or Identification Mark—All aircraft in flight, must display license number issued by the Bureau of Air Commerce in the manner prescribed in chapter 4. This applies to all flights, whether for hire or for pleasure, test purposes, experimental purposes, and whether aircraft is licensed or unlicensed.

Aircraft bearing numbers assigned by the Bureau of Air Commerce must at all times display airplane license assignment conspicuously posted in the airplane where it may be readily seen.

Sec. 27. Minimum Safe Altitudes of Flight—(1) The minimum safe altitude of flight in taking off or landing and while flying over the property of another in taking off or landing, are those at which such flights by aircraft may be made without being in dangerous proximity to persons or property on the land or water beneath, or unsafe to the aircraft.

(2) Minimum safe altitudes of flight over congested parts of cities, towns, or settlements are those sufficient to permit of a reasonably safe emergency landing, but in no case less than 1,000 feet.

(3) The minimum safe altitudes of flight in all other cases shall be not less than 500 feet.

Sec. 28. Flying Rules—(a) Right-Side Traffic—Aircraft flying in established civil airways, when it is safe and practicable, shall keep to the right side of such airways.

(b) Giving-way Order—Craft shall give way to each other in the following order:

(1) Airplanes.

(2) Airships.

(3) Balloons, fixed or free.

An airship not under control is classed as a free balloon. Aircraft required to give way shall keep a safe distance, having regard to the circumstances of the case. Three hundred feet will be considered a minimum safe distance.

(c) Giving-way Duties—If the circumstances permit, the craft which is required to give way shall avoid crossing ahead of the other. The other craft may maintain its course and speed, but no engine-driven craft may pursue its course if it would come within 300 feet of another craft, 300 feet being the minimum distance within which aircraft other than military aircraft of the United States engaged in military maneuvers and commercial aircraft engaged in local industrial operations may come within proximity of each other in flight.

(d) Crossing—When two engine-driven aircraft are on crossing courses the aircraft which has the other on its right side shall keep out of the way.

(e) Approaching—When two engine-driven aircraft are approaching head-on, or approximately so, and there is risk of collision, each

shall alter its course to the right, so that each may pass on the left side of the other. This rule does not apply to cases where aircraft will, if each keeps on its respective course, pass more than 300 feet from each other.

(f) Overtaking—(1) Definition—An overtaking aircraft is one approaching another directly from behind or within 70° of that position, and no subsequent alteration of the bearing between the two shall make the overtaking aircraft a crossing aircraft within the meaning of these rules or relieve it of the duty of keeping clear of the overtaken craft until it is finally past and clear.

(2) Presumption—In case of doubt as to whether it is forward or abaft such position, it should assume that it is an overtaking aircraft and keep out of the way.

(3) Altering Course—The overtaking aircraft shall keep out of the way of the overtaken aircraft by altering its own course to the right and not in the vertical plane.

Sec. 29. Height Over Congested and Other Areas—Exclusive of taking off from or landing on an established landing field, airport, or on property designated for that purpose by the owner, and except as otherwise permitted by section 36, aircraft shall not be flown—

(1) Over the congested parts of cities, towns, or settlements, except at a height sufficient to permit of a reasonably safe emergency landing, which in no case shall be less than 1,000 feet.

(2) Elsewhere at height less than 500 feet.

(3) Over certified high explosive danger areas except at a height sufficient to permit of a reasonably safe emergency landing outside of the certified danger area, which in no case shall be less than 1,000 feet.

(4) Height Over Assembly of Persons—No flight under 1,000 feet in height shall be made over any open-air assembly of persons except with the consent of the Bureau of Air Commerce. Such consent will be granted only for limited operations.

(5) No flight under 1,000 feet in height shall be made over any State penal institution.

Sec. 30. Acrobatic Flying—(1) Acrobatic flying means intentional maneuvers not necessary to air navigation. Parachute jumping comes within this category.

(2) No person shall acrobatically fly an aircraft—

(a) Over a congested area of any city, town, or settlement.

(b) Over any open-air assembly of persons or below 2,000 feet in height over any established civil airway, or at any height over any established airport or landing field, or within 1,000 feet horizontally thereof.

(c) Any acrobatic maneuvers performed over any other place shall be concluded at a height greater than 1,500 feet.

(d) No person shall acrobatically fly any aircraft carrying passengers for hire.

(e) When performing acrobatics not prohibited by these regulations each person in the aircraft must be properly equipped with a parachute of a type and design which has been tested, approved, and maintained in accordance with the provisions of Aeronautics Bulletin No. 7-D.

(f) Parachute jumpers making exhibition, test, training, or demonstration jumps shall wear an auxiliary parachute so arranged that it can be operated should the first parachute fail to function or become fouled. Both parachutes must be of a type approved by the Bureau of Air Commerce and maintained in accordance with the provisions of Aeronautics Bulletin No. 7-D.

Sec. 31. Dropping Objects or Things—When an aircraft is in flight the pilot shall not drop or release or permit any person to drop or release any object or thing except by special permission of the Bureau

of Air Commerce or when necessary to the personal safety of the passengers or crew.

Sec. 32. Aircraft on Water, Explosives, Intoxicants and Drugs, Towing—(a) The transporting of any explosives other than that necessary for signaling or fuel for such aircraft while in flight or materials for industrial and agricultural spraying (dusting) is prohibited, except upon special authority obtained from the Commission of Aeronautics.

(b) No person shall navigate aircraft while under the influence of, using, or having personal possession of intoxicating liquor, cocaine, or other habit-forming drugs while on duty, nor shall such person carry passengers who are obviously under the influence of intoxicating liquor, cocaine, or other habit-forming drugs.

(c) The towing of aircraft by other aircraft is prohibited except by special permission of the Commission of Aeronautics.

(d) The towing of any device or object is prohibited except by special permission of the Commission of Aeronautics.

Sec. 33. Take-off and Landing Rules—(a) Method—Take-offs and landings shall be made upwind when practicable. The take-off shall not be commenced until there is no risk of collision with landing aircraft. Aircraft when taking off or landing shall observe the traffic lanes indicated by the field rules or signals. No take-off or landing shall be made from or on a public street or highway without the prior consent of the local governing authority and the approval of the Bureau of Air Commerce.

(b) Course—If practicable, when within 1,000 feet horizontally of the leeward side of the landing field the airplane shall maintain a direct course toward the landing zone. All flights to and from landing fields located on civil airways shall be made on the right side of the airway, and where necessary to circle a landing field to comply with this requirement, and/or when circling a landing field for any purpose, whether or not it is located on a civil airway, all circles shall be made to the left, unless otherwise specified by the Bureau of Air Commerce. All aircraft flying within 3,000 feet horizontally of the nearest point of the landing area shall conform to this circuit rule unless flying at a height in excess of 2,000 feet.

(c) Right Over Ground Planes—A landing plane has the right of way over planes moving on the ground or taking off, but this shall not excuse the pilots of either or both such aircraft from the exercise of due care and diligence.

(d) Giving Way—When landing and maneuvering in preparation to land, the airplane at the greater height shall be responsible for avoiding the airplane at lower height and shall, as regards landing, observe the rules governing overtaking aircraft.

(e) Distress Landing—An aircraft in distress shall be given free way in attempting to land.

(f) Airmeet Landing Rules—In approaching an airport where there is a congestion of aircraft or an assembly of persons or automobiles in the vicinity of aircraft, pilots shall proceed with caution and ascertain before landing, or before flying at low altitude over the airport, whether or not an airmeet or airport demonstration is in progress. This may be ascertained by a signal which shall be located by the airport or air demonstration officials either near the announcer's stand or near the home pylon, and shall consist either of a large white letter "O" indicating open, and a large white letter "X" indicating closed, or by the words spelled in large white letters on the ground, "OPEN" or "CLOSED," as the case may be. These signals shall be so constructed as to be easily legible at 2,000 feet altitude. These signals will indicate whether the airport is open for landing to nonparticipants in the meet, or demonstration, or whether it is closed, and the nonparticipant pilot shall only make his landing when the signal indicates that the port is open

and at all other times he shall so fly and maneuver his airplane as to avoid any air demonstration or race that may be in progress at the time.

Sec. 34. Lights—(a) Angular Limits—The angular limits laid down in these rules will be determined as when aircraft is in normal flying position.

(b) Airplane Lights—Between sunset and sunrise, airplanes in flight must show the following lights:

(1) On the right side, a green light so constructed and fixed as to show an unbroken light between two vertical planes whose dihedral angle is 110° when measured to the right from dead ahead, and visible at a distance of at least 2 miles.

(2) On the left side, a red light so constructed and fixed as to show an unbroken light between two vertical planes whose dihedral angle is 110° when measured to the left from dead ahead, and visible at a distance of at least 2 miles.

(3) At the rear and as far aft as possible, a white light shining rearward, visible at a dihedral angle of 140° bisected by a vertical plane through the line of flight and visible at least 3 miles.

(4) Aircraft, when engaged in carrying passengers for hire any time between sunset and sunrise, shall be equipped with electric landing lights and approved parachute type of flares, or approved equivalent, in addition to the position lights required. Airplanes of 3,500 pounds gross weight or less shall carry five 1-minute flares or three $1\frac{1}{2}$ -minute flares. Airplanes having a gross weight between 3,500 pounds and 5,000 pounds shall carry four $1\frac{1}{2}$ -minute flares. Airplanes of 5,000 pounds gross weight or more shall carry two 3-minute flares or a combination of three $1\frac{1}{2}$ -minute flares and one 3-minute flare. Any airplane may carry two 3-minute flares or three $1\frac{1}{2}$ -minute flares and one 3-minute flare in lieu of the above combinations.

The requirements as to flares for the scheduled operation of interstate passenger air transport services are set forth in the interpretations of Aeronautics Bulletin No. 7-E.

(c) Airship Lights—Between sunset and sunrise airships shall carry and display the same lights that are prescribed for airplanes, excepting the side lights shall be doubled horizontally in a fore-and-aft position and the rear light shall be doubled vertically. Lights in a pair shall be at least 7 feet apart.

(d) Balloon Lights—A free balloon, between sunset and sunrise, shall display one white light not less than 20 feet below the car, visible for at least 2 miles. A fixed balloon, or airship, shall carry three lights—red, white, and red—in a vertical line, one over the other, visible at least 2 miles. The top red light shall be not less than 20 feet below the car, and the lights shall be not less than 7 nor more than 10 feet apart.

(e) Lights When Stationary—(1) Between sunset and sunrise all aircrafts which are on the surface of water and not under control, or which are moored or anchored in navigation lanes shall show a white light visible for at least 2 miles in all directions.

(2) Balloon and airship mooring cables between sunset and sunrise shall show groups of three red lights at intervals of at least every 100 feet, measured from the basket, the first light in the first group to be approximately 20 feet from the lower red balloon light. The object to which the balloon is moored on the ground shall have a similar group of lights to mark its position.

Sec. 35. Signals—(a) Distress—The following signals, separately or together, shall, where practicable, be used in case of distress, and shall indicate that the aircraft sending such signal is threatened by serious and imminent danger and requests immediate assistance.

(1) In radio telegraphy, the international distress signal SOS; in radio telephony, the spoken expression MAYDAY (corresponding to the French pronunciation of the expression *m'aider*).

(2) The international code flag signal of distress, NC.

(3) A square flag having either above or below it a ball or anything resembling a ball.

(b) Signal When Compelled to Land—When an aircraft is forced to land at night at a lighted airport it shall signal its forced landing by making a series of short flashes with its position lights if practicable to do so.

(c) Fog Signals—In fog, mist, or heavy weather an aircraft on the water in navigation lanes, when its engines are not running, shall signal its presence by a sound device emitting a signal for about 5 seconds in 2-minute intervals.

Sec. 36. Deviation from Air-Traffic Rules—The air-traffic rules may be deviated from when special circumstances render a departure necessary to avoid immediate danger or when such departure is required because of stress of weather conditions or other unavoidable causes; Provided, however, that aircraft carrying passengers for hire shall not deviate from the air-traffic rules pertaining to minimum altitudes of flight because of stress of weather conditions.

The pilot in command of the aircraft shall be responsible for the safety of the public in relation to the operation of his craft.

Dual flight instruction for hire or reward shall be given by transport pilots only.

The Iowa aeronautics laws were amended as follows by the Forty-sixth General Assembly:

CHAPTER 92

COMMISSION AERONAUTICS. POWERS

S. F. 329—Approved April 20, 1935

AN ACT to amend sections eighty-three hundred thirty-eight-c two (8338-c2) and eighty-three hundred thirty-eight-c seven (8338-c7), code, 1931, and section one (1), chapter one hundred eighty-three (183), acts of the Forty-fifth General Assembly, relating to the powers of the commission of aeronautics and the erection of objects or structures near certain airports.

Be It Enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Iowa:

Section 1. Section eighty-three hundred thirty-eight-c two (8338-c2), code, 1931, is hereby amended by striking the period at the end thereof and adding the following: "unless said requirements are waived in writing by the commission of aeronautics."

Sec. 2. Section eighty-three hundred thirty-eight-c seven (8338-c7), code, 1931, is hereby amended as follows:

1. Strike subsection h and substitute in lieu thereof the following: "h. The commission of aeronautics shall have power to grant waivers for any flight other than as herein provided."

2. Strike from lines 8 and 9 of subsection j the words "board of railroad commissioners" and insert in lieu thereof "commission of aeronautics."

Sec. 3. That section one (1) of chapter one hundred eighty-three (183), acts of the Forty-fifth General Assembly, is hereby amended by striking out after the word "structure" in line 3 the words "over fifty feet high," and amend line 4 after the word "municipal" by inserting "or regularly established" and amend line 4 by inserting after the word "airport" the words "or landing place," and amend line 5 by changing the period after the word "navigation" to a comma and adding thereto the following: "including take-off and landing, unless such object or structure constitutes a proper use or enjoyment of the land on which the same is located."

The Iowa Aeronautics Commission has sponsored a project under Works Progress Administration for the air-marking of six hundred (600) towns in the state of Iowa. This project is under way in many localities of the state and will be of great value to all flyers within the state of Iowa and those flyers passing over the state. Through the cooperation of American Legion Posts over the state, permission was obtained from owners of buildings to have the name of the town painted on the roofs of these buildings.

EXECUTIVE ORDER

1. Under the provisions of Section 27, Military Code of Iowa, 1934, the appointment of Gardner Cowles, Jr., Des Moines, Iowa, as Aide on the Military Staff of the Commander-in-Chief with the rank of Lieutenant Colonel, is announced, effective this date.

MESSING AND MESS MANAGEMENT DIRECTIVE, FIELD
TRAINING PERIOD, 1934

1. GENERAL. The following instructions constitute the Messing and Mess Management Directive for the 1934 field training period and, in addition to these paragraphs, includes the following appendices:

Standard Menus, All Organizations.....Appendix "A"

Field Menu 113th CavalryAppendix "B"

Advance DetachmentsAppendix "C"

2. THE PLAN. The basis of the present system is the issue of a ration in kind purchased in competitive markets based on stock sheets prepared from standard menus in advance of the field training period. The notable difference between this plan and most other ration plans is the standardized menu which provides for all units of the National Guard being served identical meals on the same day. It is believed that the attendance for the current year will be approximately the same as in 1933 and based on these figures, the allotment of funds for subsistence, and current market quotations on commodities desired, daily menus for the fifteen-day period have been carefully arranged. This enables stock sheets showing full requirements of all components of the ration to be prepared and these form the basis of circular proposals to leading business firms for all parts thereof. Delivery of staple parts of these components are made to regimental supply officers two days prior to the arrival of troops. Perishable components, such as bread, meat, pastry, butter, fresh milk, fresh fruit and vegetables, will be delivered daily. No bulk issue of meat is made. The exact number of pounds required for each mess, in cuts ready for the pan or oven, are delivered daily to the unit messes. This effects a considerable saving and eliminates waste and the cutting of meats by inexperienced personnel.

3. ADVANTAGES OF THE PLAN. a. Prior to this year subsistence was purchased with little regard for the purpose for which it was to be used or the manner in which it was to be prepared. Meat issues were limited to beef, distributed in bulk in such quantity as to necessitate storage for several days. Much wastage from spoiling and cutting prevailed. Issues of fresh fruit and vegetables were the exception. Pastries were only available as cooks were able and competent to bake them. Many other tasty dishes now available from the subsistence allowance were not considered possible. As a result there was issued an over-abundance of staple commodities such as canned and dried vegetables, dried fruits, rice, flour, cereal, coffee and tea. Other items could only be secured by supplementing the ration from organization funds and it was not uncommon for a single unit to disburse a considerable sum during the fifteen-day period. The disastrous effect on the morale of troops having little or no organization funds with which to purchase extras was reflected in the recruiting, discipline and training of organizations concerned.

b. Under the Standard Menu Plan it is possible to definitely determine the exact quantity of all components required in feeding the best ration procurable within the limitations of the amount of the Federal allowance. With the planning of each meal under the control of the agency responsible for the procurement of the components necessary

therefor, waste is reduced to the absolute minimum and commodities may be purchased in quantities assuring the maximum purchasing power of the subsistence allowance. This permits a variety of menu items, of good quality and sufficient quantity, not otherwise possible. The ration is considered ample in every respect and no reasons for deviating from or supplementing the menu should exist.

c. The present system does not minimize the responsibility, supervision, or control of the normal functions of the regimental supply or unit administrative and mess personnel. While it is true that they are denied the responsibility of determining the items on the daily menu and the actual procurement of commodities from local markets, the regiments do, however, have full and complete control of the system's operation from the time the initial issue of staples is drawn from the Camp Quartermaster. Supply officers and their assistants should be familiar with the manner of procurement and qualified to carry on such a system independently should such an occasion arise. Under this system mess sergeants and cooks are receiving valuable training in the preparation and serving of well balanced, varied, wholesome and appetizing meals, and under rigid supervision of higher unit and regimental authority must perform their duties with more exactness and efficiency than is required of any other plan.

4. SUPPLY OFFICERS. a. Supply officers will draw the initial issue of staple and dry rations and such perishables as will be required for the first day from the Camp Quartermaster, not later than noon on the day preceding the arrival of the troops. Daily delivery of perishables will be made to Supply Officers in ample time to permit issue to unit messes before items are required. Additional issues of staple and dry rations will be available to make any adjustments during the training period to take care of any overages or shortages resulting in increased or decreased personnel. Supply Officers will maintain a record of the quantities and cost of all items issued to each mess, and will also maintain a consolidation of all quantities and costs so as to have a knowledge of all unexpended balances.

b. Supply officers will carefully study the inventories submitted as outlined in paragraph 6 for the purpose of determining that units are adequately supplied with components required for preparation of the meals appearing on the menu for the balance of the issue period. Indications of shortages will be immediately investigated and corrective measures applied.

c. The responsibility of issue and administration of the messing system within each regiment or similar organization rests squarely on the shoulders of Supply Officers. As regimental S-4s they are specifically charged with the function of supply and, while they may have officers detailed from the Service Units to assist them in the administration of the subsistence plan, control thereof and responsibility therefor must remain with them. To enable Supply Officers to devote the necessary time to these duties the practice of assigning this class of officers to duty other than supply is to be discouraged.

5. MESS ADMINISTRATION AND CONTROL. a. There is nothing in this system which obviates administration and control of the unit mess by unit commanders and mess sergeants nor does it in any way lessen the need for experienced and well trained permanent kitchen personnel. These are basic requirements necessary to the success of every plan of troop feeding. This system can only guarantee the delivery to unit kitchens of the best rations procurable within the limitations of the federal allowance. A systematic management of the unit mess will prove this to be entirely satisfactory and eliminate all necessity of supplementing the ration from other sources. The morale and efficiency of troops are contingent on wholesome, well prepared food and the degree of success of field training can be measured by the

ability of those charged with troop feeding to properly perform their duties.

b. Mess Sergeants should be selected with the utmost care and on the basis of aptitude, alertness, age and experience. Cooks should be enlisted or employed on the strength of experience and demonstrated ability. These men form the backbone of the messing system and too much emphasis cannot be placed on care in their selection.

c. Unit Commanders are enjoined to exercise constant supervision over their messes. Daily inspections should be made of unit kitchens at which time prompt correction of all irregularities existing should be directed. Not less than one meal each day will be inspected by an officer of the command immediately before serving. Strict adherence to the menu will be demanded at all times.

d. Mess Sergeants will have immediate control of all messing functions and will be held directly responsible to higher authority that all the requirements of the system are observed. They will be on the alert at all times to see that meals are in accord with the menu, are carefully prepared, served hot and in the most appetizing manner. They will maintain a record of all charges against the unit of subsistence allowance and have knowledge of unexpended balances at all times and must have constant information of stock balances for the purpose of ascertaining that units are adequately supplied with components required for the meals appearing on the menus.

e. Training Manual No. 2100-152 on the subject of "The Army Cook" is a valuable guide to mess sergeants and cooks, and is highly recommended as a text reference on all matters pertaining to mess management and the composition and preparation of appetizing and wholesome food. This publication has been given general distribution and should be available in the files of each unit.

6. STOCK INVENTORIES. The mess sergeant of each unit operating a mess will submit a full and complete stock inventory to regimental supply officers before 9:30 A. M. on the sixth and eleventh days of the field training period. These inventories will include all items to be consumed after the morning meal on the days submitted. Carefully estimated weights of bulk items may be submitted in lieu of actual measurement or scale weight.

7. ORGANIZATION OF MESSES. The assignment of units messing together has been made on the recommendation of organization commanders and it is presumed they are satisfactory to all concerned. Where two units mess together the senior unit commander will assume full responsibility for the operation of the mess.

8. MENUS. The menus provided for in the appendices form the basis of the entire ration procurement system and no deviation therefrom is authorized. Printed menus will be furnished all units upon arrival in camp and copies thereof will be posted in a conspicuous place in each kitchen and on unit bulletin boards.

9. CONCLUSION. This directive has been promulgated with the end in view of providing the Iowa National Guard with the most efficient messing possible under existing limitations. Compliance with the provisions contained herein will add greatly to the efficiency and training and serve to increase the morale of the entire command.

I. RESCINDING GENERAL ORDERS. 1. General Orders Number 3, Series 1932, and General Orders Number 2, Series 1933, are rescinded.

II. ANNOUNCEMENT OF TARGET SEASON. 1. The target season for troops of the Iowa National Guard will be from January 1st to October 31st of each year, as follows:

OUTDOOR

Regular.....January 1st to August 31st
Supplementary.....September 1st to October 31st

INDOOR

Regular.....January 1st to April 30th
Supplementary.....May 1st to June 30th

III. REGULATIONS GOVERNING ANNUAL INDOOR GALLERY PRACTICE. 1. The following regulations governing the Annual Indoor Gallery Practice with the rifle are published, and will be strictly complied with until rescinded or amended.

2. Targets for the regular season will be forwarded to reach the state Ordnance Officer (Major Robert L. Fulton, 940 Bank St., Webster City, Iowa), not later than May 10th of each year. Targets for the supplementary season will be forwarded to reach the State Ordnance Officer not later than July 10th of each year. Targets received after those dates will not be given consideration.

3. All available personnel of organizations will be required to fire during the regular season. Recruits, and personnel who, on account of illness, work or business, cannot complete their firing during the regular season, will be permitted to fire during the supplementary season. Those firing during the supplementary season will be kept to the minimum.

Personnel enlisting subsequently to June 30th will not fall within the sixty-day service requirements for attendance at camp and will not be authorized or permitted to fire for record.

GENERAL PROVISIONS

RANGES: The gallery range for small bore practice, with rifle, will measure not less than 50 feet from firing point to face of target when it is placed in proper position in front of backstop.

The gallery range for small bore practice, with pistol or revolver, will measure not less than 20 yards from firing point to face of target when it is placed in proper position in front of backstop.

CONSTRUCTION AND LIGHTING: The gallery range will be completely enclosed. Any door leading into the range between firing points and backstop will be locked as long as shooters are at firing points. Windows and doors between firing points and backstop, or above, or at either side of backstop, will be properly protected to prevent ricochet or "wild" shots from escaping from the gallery. All lighting will be artificial, the targets being lighted by electricity. The firing points

may be lighted or not, at the discretion of the shooter. Shooters may fire on improvised ranges in cellars or attics, provided all safety precautions are strictly observed, bearing in mind the considerable penetration of the present day .22 caliber long rifle ammunition and provided the regulations relative to lighting are observed.

TARGETS: All regular instruction and record practice, to determine qualifications and awards of trophies and insignia, will be conducted on targets prescribed in these regulations, or subsequent changes thereto. Other practice may be conducted on targets issued therefor, by The United States Property & Disbursing Officer, Iowa NG, the nomenclature of which will be furnished by his office from time to time.

RIFLES: Only small bore rifles will be used. (Definition: Any rifle firing a rim-fire cartridge, with lead or alloy bullet, not larger than .23 inch in diameter, weighing, with sighting equipment, not to exceed 12 pounds.)

SIGHTS: Only metallic sights will be used.

TRIGGER PULL: Trigger pull for all gallery rifles, unless specified otherwise in matches not provided for in these regulations, shall be 3 pounds, pull being actually tested with suitable weight of the exact number of pounds.

SLING: To be used exactly as designated by Training Regulations 150-5, or changes thereto.

PISTOLS AND REVOLVERS: Any pistol or revolver of any caliber, maximum length of barrel, including cylinder, 10 inches. Minimum trigger pull 2½ pounds. Adjustable sights are permitted but they must be strictly open in front of hammer and not over 10 inches apart. No attachments will be permitted to the butt, which will extend along the forearm and serve as an aid in supporting the weapon. Any metallic type sights will be permitted.

COACHING: Coaching is required in all instruction practice conducted preliminary to record practice, but will not be permitted in any record practice pertaining to the tables herein prescribed.

SPOTTING SCOPES: The use of telescopes or other glass to spot shots is permitted and encouraged at all times and in all events herein prescribed.

POSITION WHEN FIRING: Only positions authorized by tables herein published, or subsequent changes thereto, will be assumed during all instruction and record practice. Such positions will be assumed strictly in accordance with provisions of Training Regulations 150-5, or changes thereto.

TIME LIMIT: Firing time limits will be in strict obedience with provisions set forth in tables published in these regulations, or subsequent changes thereto, except in the case of competitions or matches, arranged in such manner as not to interfere with the provisions of these regulations being carried out to fullest extent.

SIGHTING SHOTS: Sighting shots on any record targets pertaining to record practice in accordance with tables published in these regulations are prohibited, and any targets submitted, bearing evidence of sighting shots, the total score thereon will be dropped from the total score of the shooter. Sighting shots may be taken in competitions or matches arranged in such manner as not to interfere with the provisions of these regulations being carried out to the fullest extent.

SCORING: Shots will be scored as indicated on the targets. Any shot touching the counting ring, will be scored as a shot of the higher

value. Shots striking the gallery target outside of the scoring ring will be scored as misses, unless actually touching or cutting the scoring ring. Targets will be scored as fired, on the basis of bullet holes which can be plainly seen, and no claims will be allowed for mistakes having been made. In case of targets showing more than the required number of hits, the target will be scored and there will be deducted the score of those shots of highest value in excess of the required number.

PRELIMINARY SCORING: In preliminary scoring at home stations and prior to record targets being forwarded, for official scoring, the use of cartridges or other forms of gages, which tend to disfigure the shot holes is prohibited, and targets showing evidence of having been given preliminary scoring, using a cartridge as a plug gage or showing evidence that the shot holes have been enlarged in any way will be rejected and thrown out, and the individuals whose targets have so been tampered with, will forfeit their rights in all record practice, and in qualification for insignia. (Parker shot hole gages are recommended for all preliminary scoring.)

WHO WILL FIRE: All enlisted men of the Iowa National Guard, armed with the rifle, are required to fire the instruction and record course as prescribed in these Orders. All officers of the Iowa National Guard, who have not had 15 years' service, on duty with troops required to fire the rifle, are required to fire the instruction and record course as prescribed in these regulations. Instruction and record practice as prescribed in these regulations is not in any sense optional with those mentioned, but is a part of the regular training schedule prescribed by the National Guard Bureau for the National Guard. No excuse for not firing will be accepted, except in remote cases where it is impossible to fire, on account of lack of range facilities, arms, ammunition, et cetera, and then only when a statement of such conditions existing shall be certified to by the Regimental Commander, or by an Instructor on duty in the area concerned, and submitted to this office in writing.

FAILURE TO QUALIFY: Those who fail to qualify in the small bore course will not be permitted to fire Course "D" at home station or any other outdoor range.

PERTINENT DUTIES OF THOSE IN CHARGE OF INSTRUCTION AND RECORD PRACTICE: It is the duty of those in charge of instruction and record practice to familiarize themselves—First—with the general regulations governing gallery practice, and—Second—with the specific conditions of the tables herein prescribed. It will be the duty of such persons to measure the range and to weigh the trigger pull and when these demands are satisfied, as required, they will witness the entire firing, supervise the shooters, and make sure that regulations relative to sights and positions, time limits, et cetera, are enforced. Having been satisfied that all conditions of the firing have been complied with, they will, after record firing has been completed, certify the record targets by signing their names and rank below that of the shooter, the shooter signing first, his signature being an acknowledgment of justice being rendered. In the case of record practice, the targets to be forwarded must be signed by a commissioned officer who has witnessed the actual firing of the same. The name and rank or grade of the shooter must appear upon the face of the target exactly as it appears on the roster of the organization. Any indication that any such person or persons have been lax in any of these regulations will be considered sufficient cause for the rejection of any, or all, record targets and for the forfeiture of any claim to insignia or trophies.

3. INDOOR PISTOL AND REVOLVER PRACTICE. Indoor gallery practice with the pistol or revolver is optional but is encouraged where facilities such as arms, ammunition and ranges permit.

The following record course for pistol or revolver is prescribed:

(Instruction practice with the pistol or revolver will constitute the above course, it being fired at least three or more times prior to firing for record.)

QUALIFICATION: The minimum percentages, required for qualification with the pistol or revolver, are as follows:

Expert	85%
Sharpshooter	78%
Marksman	60%

NOTE: Percentages will be figured as follows:

Divide the aggregate score made in "Slow Fire" by.....	100
Divide the total aggregate score made in "Timed Fire" by...	100
Divide the aggregate score made in "Quick Fire" by.....	100

The sum of the results of these divisions, when added together and divided by 3 (3 classes of fire), will give the final percentages which determine the qualification.

(The divisor, 100, is the total possible score to be made in any class of fire.)

4. TARGETS, TO WHOM SENT. DISPOSITION OF RECORDS.

All record targets of indoor practice will be forwarded to the State Ordnance Officer in such time as will insure them being received by him, immediately following the close of the season. The Ordnance Officer will score the targets and will cause to be published, the scores and qualifications of the individual shooters, giving their name, rank or grade and organization. He will prepare and forward all reports required in paragraph 61, NGR No. 45, on proper blank forms and in accordance with instructions laid down in AR 345-1000.

5. INSIGNIA OF QUALIFICATION.

To each officer, warrant officer or enlisted man of the Iowa National Guard, qualifying as Expert, Sharpshooter, or Marksman, appropriate insignia indicating the class of proficiency attained in indoor marksmanship will be issued upon proper requisition by organization commanders. Such insignia will, upon issue, become the personal property of the individual to whom issued.

When worn: Insignia will be worn only during the period of which the qualification is held. Officers not required to fire may wear the insignia of last qualification at all times. Officers having 15 or more years commissioned service, are not required to fire, but may do so if they desire.

Original qualification: For the first or original qualification, an appropriate basic badge and bar will be issued, the bar showing the arm with which qualified and the year of such qualification. For each yearly qualification thereafter a similar bar will be issued, such bars to be attached to the last preceding bar issued.

To be worn: Only the badge for the highest qualification obtained may be worn. Not more than one basic badge of any one class will be issued to an individual, but on qualification in the same class, with more than one weapon, the appropriate bars will be attached to the same basic badge.

6. TROPHIES: Rifle.

At the close of the indoor season, or as soon thereafter as is possible, there will be awarded to the Company or Troop, firing the ten highest aggregate scores in record practice, the Class "A" Trophy, provided such Company or Troop furnish record targets showing at least 60% of the organization to have fired. Three other trophies, namely Class "B," Class "C" and Class "D," will be awarded to the Companies or Troops in order named, firing the next ten highest aggregate scores,

provided such Companies or Troops furnish record targets showing at least 60% of the organization to have fired.

7. TROPHIES: Pistol or Revolver.

At the close of the indoor season, or as soon thereafter as possible, there will be awarded to the Company, Battery or Troop, firing the ten highest aggregate scores in record practice, the "Military Pistol and Revolver Trophy" provided such Company, Battery or Troop furnish record targets showing at least 60% of the organization to have fired.

Note: All trophies will be emblematic of State Championships, in the order named, will be suitably engraved and deposited with the organization to which awarded, for a period of one year from the date of award, at the end of which time they will be disposed of, as directed by proper authority.

8. ARMS, AMMUNITION AND MATERIEL.

All issue arms with which indoor practice is fired will be given proper attention, both before and after practice, in order to see that the provisions of the general practice are carried out, and at the conclusion of each period of firing to see that they are properly cleaned and stored.

All issue ammunition will be especially safeguarded as to its expenditure, being careful that no undue waste occurs. The supply, as issued, is meager and the results of practice will determine the amount of subsequent issue.

All issue targets, or other materiel will be carefully and properly consumed, in the practice provided for by these regulations.

The death of Major General Stuart Heintzelman, lately commanding this Corps Area, at Hot Springs, Arkansas, on July 6, 1935, is announced with deep sorrow. The honors set forth in paragraph 9a, Army Regulations 600-30, will be paid by all posts on July 8th.

The third successive generation of his family to reach high command, General Heintzelman was born in New York City on November 19, 1876, and, after studying abroad and at Groton School, entered the Military Academy in 1895; graduated with the Class of 1899; and was commissioned Second Lieutenant, 6th U. S. Cavalry.

As a regimental officer and as Aide-de-Camp, he served in the Philippine Insurrection. In the Boxer Campaign he commanded the cavalry of the Allies in an engagement near Tientsin. On the outbreak of the World War he went to France with the General Staff, American Expeditionary Force; was attached to the French during the Chemin des Dames offensive and on the Italian front; took part in the St. Mihiel offensive as Chief of Staff of our IV Corps, and became finally Chief of Staff of the American Second Army.

In 1921 he was appointed to the War Department General Staff, serving in turn as Chief of the Military Intelligence, Supply, and War Plans Divisions. But to the majority of his fellow officers he will be remembered for the mark he left on our system of military training. After earlier experience as instructor at the Leavenworth Schools, at Princeton, and at the Army War College, he spent the last six years of his life as Commandant of the Command and General Staff School, on the thought and methods of which he exercised a profound, vivid, and inspiring influence for simplicity, reality, and the prevention of formalism.

General Heintzelman was the last of his line. His heir is the Army he served so well, and his traditions will long remain with the many officers and soldiers who felt his friendship, knew his simplicity of manner and frankness of heart, and understood his firm devotion to duty. The tragedy of his death is that he himself is lost to the Army, which knew him, at the

very time when he was coming into the fullness of his strength; and that he is lost to his country, which had only begun to know him, in these anxious and uncertain days.

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I. CERTAIN GENERAL ORDERS SUPERSEDED. 1. This General Order supersedes General Orders No. 9 and 12, series 1931.

II. ALLOWANCES OF STATE FUNDS. 1. The following allowances of State Funds are announced for the information and guidance of all concerned:

a. ARMORY RENTAL ALLOWANCES:

Armory rental allowances have been fixed by the Armory Board based on the appropriations made by the 46th General Assembly of Iowa, for each year of the biennium, beginning July 1, 1935, and ending June 30, 1937.

b. HEADQUARTERS ALLOWANCES:

Headquarters allowances fixed by the Armory Board based on the appropriations made by the 46th General Assembly of Iowa for each year of the biennium, beginning July 1, 1935, and ending June 30, 1937:

- (a) Expenditures from this allowance will be limited to the payment of rentals for rifle or pistol ranges or facilities including construction and maintenance, and transportation to and from range. The purchase of additional arms and ammunition will be considered a legitimate charge against this allowance. In the event there is any doubt as to the propriety of an expenditure from this allowance, commanders will apply to the Adjutant General for written authorization prior to contracting an obligation.

d. PER CAPITA (DRILL) ALLOWANCE:

- (1) Under the provisions of Section 467-f-49, Chapter 28-F1, Code of Iowa, 1935, a Per Capita (Drill) Allowance of \$4.00 per capita, computed on the average enlisted strength during each semi-annual period will be paid to each unit commander.
- (2) Expenditures from this allowance will be confined to payment of items and payment for services rendered which contribute in general to the comfort and contentment and the mental and physical improvement of the enlisted personnel or the betterment, from a Military viewpoint, of the Unit as a whole. Payment of items to be used for the benefit of the entire personnel will be the only legitimate expenditures from this allowance, such as cartage on Military Stores to and from depot to Armory, purchase of athletic equipment, club room fixtures and purchase of military text books, publications and equipment, not otherwise furnished by the Federal Government or the State of Iowa. Under no consideration will funds be disbursed from this allowance for the purpose of sponsoring entertainment, dances or like social activities.
- (3) In addition to the above, expenditures may be made from this allowance for payment of bills that would ordinarily be paid from the Headquarters, Range, or Armory Rental Allowances, when allowances of these funds prove to be insufficient, except that prior written authorization of the Adjutant General will be required in each such case.
- (4) Under special circumstances and subject to the prior approval of the Adjutant General, a reasonable amount may be disbursed from this allowance for the purpose of relieving a responsible officer for property lost, stolen, or destroyed. Such authorization will be given only after approved report of survey has held the responsible officer pecuniarily liable for any shortage of property. No disbursement will be approved by the Adjutant General until the recommendation of the unit council has been filed. This council will be composed of two commissioned officers, other than the responsible officer, and the two senior noncommissioned officers of the unit. When there are but two commissioned officers on duty with the unit, the composition of the unit council is modified to one commissioned officer other than the responsible officer. No payments will be authorized or permitted from this allowance to reimburse officers or enlisted men for attendance at drill or range practice.
- (5) Should any doubt exist as to the propriety of any purchase, a request will be directed to the Adjutant General, setting forth in detail the item or service to be purchased and the amount thereof. In such cases, no purchase will be made until formal approval has been received.

- (6) All payments will be made on "Voucher Checks" Form No. 6, AGO, Iowa, on which will be entered an itemized statement of items or services purchased or such itemized statement will be securely fastened to the voucher check issued in payment. Payments made on other types of checks will not be acceptable.

III. PREPARATION AND SUBMISSION OF ACCOUNTS CURRENT. 1. The following instructions will govern the preparation and submission of Accounts Current:

- a. Accounts Current will be kept in duplicate on Form No. 7 AGO Iowa.
- b. Entries will be made promptly at the time of receipt or disbursement of funds.
- c. All Commanding Officers, who by virtue of their office are disbursing officers or custodians of State Funds, will close their Accounts Current on June 30th and December 31st of each calendar year, or immediately upon being relieved from duty as custodian or disbursing officer of State funds.
- d. The original copy of Accounts Current, embodying all the prescribed data and accompanied by the cancelled Voucher Checks, issued during the period covered by the Account Current, will be submitted to The Adjutant General as soon as practicable at the end of each semi-annual period and in no event later than twenty (20) days from the last day of the semi-annual period. The Accounts Current will also be accompanied by the Bank statement for the last month of the semi-annual period, showing the balance of State funds in the bank as of the last day of the semi-annual period and whenever this is impracticable the Accounts Current will be accompanied by a written statement submitted over the signature of one of the officers of the particular bank in which the funds are on deposit, which will show the total balance of State funds in the bank, as of the last day of the semi-annual period.

2. Warrants issued by the State of Iowa in payment of armory allowances, range allowances, per capita and headquarters allowances will be indorsed by the payee and deposited in an accredited banking institution in a single account to be known as "State Funds, Company "..., Infantry, Iowa NG." Company funds or funds derived from sources other than the State of Iowa, will not be deposited in this account.

3. The lending of money from any allowances received from the State of Iowa for any purpose is prohibited.

IV. LEASES:

1. LEASES (Armory)

- a. Leases will be prepared in triplicate on a standard commercial form and will ordinarily cover a period of one year beginning with the first day of the fiscal year, July 1st. In the event it is desired to accomplish leases for terms longer than one year, written authorization from the Adjutant General must first be obtained.
- b. Leases will be executed by and between the owner of the armory and the State Armory Board. All leases will be "noted" by the commanding officer of the company, troop or battery, who will indicate that such has been done as follows:
"Noted:

- c. All three copies of the lease will be submitted at least ten (10) days prior to the effective date. Two (2) copies of the lease when accomplished will be returned to the unit commander who will transmit one copy to the lessor.
- d. All leases will contain the following clause:
 "In the event the National Guard Unit affected by this lease is disbanded or mustered out, it is agreed, by all concerned, that this lease will be cancelled the last day of the month in which the organization herein mentioned vacates the premises. It is further understood and agreed that should the National Guard Unit herein mentioned, be called or drafted into Federal Service, this lease will not be cancelled before the expiration of ninety (90) days after the organization has responded to such call or draft, but after such ninety days have expired this lease or contract becomes null and void without further notice."
- e. Payment of armory rental will not be made unless a proper lease is on file. Unit commanders will be responsible for the proper execution and submission of leases.

2. LEASES (Range):

- a. Leases for ranges will be prepared in triplicate on a standard commercial form and will ordinarily be for a period of one or two years, beginning with the first day of the fiscal year, July 1st.
- b. Three (3) copies of the lease will be submitted to the Adjutant General for approval and will not be considered in effect until approved by him. Leases for ranges will be accomplished by and between the owner of the property and the commanding officer of the company, troop, or battery concerned. Leases will be submitted at least 10 days prior to the effective date. Two copies of the lease, indicating the approval of the Adjutant General will be returned to the unit commander who will transmit one copy to the lessor.
- c. All leases for ranges will contain the following clause:
 "In the event the National Guard Unit, which is a party to this lease, is disbanded, or mustered out, it is agreed, by all concerned, that this lease will be cancelled the last day of the month in which the organization herein mentioned vacates the premise. It is further understood and agreed that should the National Guard Unit herein mentioned, be called or drafted into Federal Service, this lease will not be cancelled before the expiration of ninety (90) days after the organization has responded to such call or draft but after such ninety days have expired this lease or contract becomes null and void without further notice."
- d. Payment of range rental will not be made unless a proper lease is on file. Unit commanders will be responsible for the proper execution and submission of leases.
- e. Commanding Officers of Units, whose range firing is conducted on a Federally owned range, will be required to submit a certificate for each semi-annual period, certifying to the fact that the Unit has engaged in outdoor range firing before they will be entitled to the prescribed range allowance. The certificate will be submitted on June 20th and December 20th of each Calendar Year and will be in the form set forth below, over the signature of the Unit Commander:
 "I certify that this command conducted Outdoor Range Firing during the Semi-annual period, beginning.....
 19...., and ending19...."

V. OFFICE SUPPLIES—Expendable:

1. The following semi-annual allowance of expendable office supplies, is authorized for each Unit of the Iowa National Guard:
 - 50 No. 10 Envelopes, addressed to AGO
 - 50 No. 10 Envelopes, addressed to USP&DO
 - 100 No. 10 Envelopes, plain with return
 - 25 Clasp Envelopes, 9x12
 - 25 Sheets Carbon Paper
 - 250 Sheets Letter Paper, 8x10½
 - 500 Sheets Second Sheet, 8x10½
2. All issues of expendable office supplies will be made by the State Quartermaster.
3. Requisition to cover replacement for expendable supplies, actually consumed, will be submitted, in triplicate, on or before July 15th and January 15th of each year.
4. The purchase of such items of office supplies which may be needed, in addition to those not otherwise furnished by the Federal Government, or the State of Iowa, will be considered proper expenditures from the Headquarters or Per Capita (Drill) Allowances, of any Unit of the Iowa National Guard.
