GENERAL COMMENTS

During the period 1 July to 30 June 1952, the Iowa National Guard made very rapid strides. The units were able to increase and to maintain in most cases, their strength at a level which enabled them to concentrate on a Training Program which has generally shown gratifying results.

During this period 11% (plus) of total personnel attended Service Schools as indicated under that Heading in this report.

Units were able to initiate and carry out Armory Training Programs in accordance with the mobilization assignment of the National Guard, and the results of the Federal Inspections for this period generally reflect the improvement in the overall Training of the National Guard on the unit level.

FIELD TRAINING—1950

The Iowa National Guard, performed annual Field Training at Fort Leonard Wood, Missouri, during the period 30 July to 13 August 1950. This was the second consecutive period of Training at Fort Leonard Wood, many of the problems involving transportation of troops were made simpler because of this fact.

Training was conducted on a Battalion level and was climaxed by a Division CPX and a continuation of the Air Transportability Demonstration which was originated in 1949.

Percentage of attendance was very good with a total of 573 Officers and 4,135 enlisted men.

During the closing days of Field Training the 194th F. A. Bn, Iowa N. G., was alerted for Active Federal Duty. Although this had somewhat of a dampening effect, there was definitely no breakdown of morale and on the whole was looked forward to as a challenge to the Battalion as a representative of the Iowa N. G.

FIELD TRAINING—1951

The Iowa National Guard attended Field Training at Camp McCoy, Wisconsin during the period 12-26 August, 1951, with a total of 514 Officers and 4,563 enlisted men. Camp McCoy, provides nearly the ideal site for National Guard Field Training. Adequate ranges, and facilities are available, the full advantage was taken of the facilities available and the cool weather to conduct training on a Regimental level. Although this was the fourth full scale, postwar, Field Training, this was the first attempt to conduct training on a Full Regimental level. Although the results was very satisfactory it definitely showed the need for additional training on a Battalion level.

FACILITIES AND CONSTRUCTION PROGRAM

IOWA NATIONAL GUARD (ARMY AND AIR)

I. END OF WORLD WAR II THROUGH FISCAL YEAR 1952:

A. Facilities Required by the Iowa National Guard:

1. Facilities required by the Iowa National Guard include armories, training camps, ranges, hangars for the Air National Guard, and logistical support facilities such as warehouses, equipment storage buildings, maintenance shops and service centers, army aviation operational and maintenance installations for the Army National Guard, and fuel storage, crash equipment, maintenance and storage facilities for the Air National Guard. In addition, administrative and office facilities are required for the Adjutant General's staff, the United States Property and Disbursing Officer and the base technical detachments of the Air National Guard.

2. Because of the very large postwar increase of the National Guard, both army and air, a considerable proportion of facilities in existence at the time of the reorganization of the Iowa National Guard, following the end of World War II, were inadequate.

B. State and Federal Responsibility:

3. The Chief of the National Guard Bureau directed a letter to the Honorable Robert D. Blue, Governor of Iowa, dated 6 February 1946, in implementation of the Reorganization of the Iowa National Guard, following World War II, wherein the State of Iowa was called upon to accept an allotment of troop strength far in excess of the troop basis in existence prior to the War.

4. In his letter reply, dated 30 March 1946, Governor Blue tentatively accepted a proposed aggregate strength of 12,090 officers and enlisted men to be contained in 99 units. Inasmuch, however, as the prewar strength of the Iowa National Guard, at the time of induction into Federal service, had been 6,643 officers and enlisted men contained in 84 units, the Governor conditioned his acceptance of the increased troop basis upon the undertaking of the Federal Government to assume responsibility for assisting the State in constructing and maintaining required facilities for the support of the expanded National Guard. The following statement has been extracted from the Governor's letter:

"If the State of Iowa is to maintain units of the National Guard as set forth in the allocation to this state, it will necessitate the organization of at least 15 additional units within the State together with the necessity of providing additional armory facilities.

"It will mean, too, that many of the present armories will need to be enlarged and remodeled to adequately take care of new types of units. It is felt that if the State formally accepts the allocation of troops made to it, there must be a definite program on the part of the Federal Government to contribute its equitable share of construction and for the maintenance of the required facilities."

5. In formulating policies with reference to reorganization of the National Defense structure, following World War II, the war department assigned the National Guard a mission as an integral part and a first line reserve component of the Army of the United States, as set forth in "War Department Policies Relating to Postwar National Guard", approved by the Secretary of War on 13 October 1945. In this policy

statement the following general principles relative to the division of responsibility, as between the Federal Government and the respective States, for support of the National Guard, are set forth:

- (1) The States will furnish the personnel, adequate armories, and storage facilities.
- (2) The Federal Government will supervise the instructions and will furnish the outdoor training facilities, the pay, and all uniforms, equipment and ammunition.
- (3) When the requirements for a balanced force in the Army of the United States necessitates the allocation to a State of troops or equipment, the housing or storage of which would impose an inequitable burden upon the State or Territory, such allocation will be made with the understanding that the Federal Government will contribute its equitable share of the expense of constructing and maintaining the necessary facilities.

6. Federal fiscal assistance to the States, for new construction of National Guard facilities, was first implemented in the Department of Defense Appropriation Act for fiscal year 1947, wherein Congress provided Federal Funds for the construction and procurement of National Guard facilities, within the various States, for the logistical support of the National Guard, such facilities to include ordnance maintenance shops, warehouses, service centers, concentration sites, administrative facilities for the United States Property and Disbursing Officer, and outdoor training facilities. Construction and procurement projects of this category were designated as non-armory construction projects and the basic concept of this program called for the Federal Government to provide 100% of the construction cost of the facilities required by the States to meet the expanded strength of the reorganized National Guard. Approximately \$500,000.00 was allocated to the State of Iowa, under this non-armory program, during fiscal year 1948. Details with reference to the utilization of these funds will be fully set forth in later paragraphs.

7. Congressional authority for construction of facilities for all reserve components of the Armed Forces has been incorporated into P.L. 783 (81st Congress), entitled the "National Defense Facilities Act of 1950". Funds are now appropriated, pursuant to authority contained in P.L. 783, under the title "Military Construction, Army Civilian Components", and appropriations for years 1950 to 1952 were provided in the following Acts:

1950—P.L. 221 (81st Congress)
1951-52—P.L. 759 (81st Congress)

8. Under the authority of P.L. 783, (81st Congress), the Federal Government is participating, for the first time, in the construction of armories for the National Guard. Under this Act, the Secretary of Defense is authorized to construct armories for all civilian components and to contribute funds to the States for the construction of National Guard armories. Funds appropriated pursuant to authority of P.L. 783 are not 'fiscal year' funds, but remain available until expended for the purpose for which appropriated. Under National Guard Bureau Policy, States receiving assistance pursuant to authority contained in P.L. 783, agree to contribute the following toward armory construction projects wherein title to the completed project is to be retained by the State:

- a. 25% of the cost of the project as determined under competitive bidding.

- b. Necessary real estate.
 - c. Entire cost of grading, paving, and landscaping.
 - d. Provision of access roads and utilities.
 - e. Necessary furniture and equipment.
 - f. Maintenance of building and grounds for period of 25 years.
9. Non-armory funds are normally appropriated under the title

"Army National Guard", and are so appropriated pursuant to authority contained in P.L. 783. Such appropriations are funded 100% with federal funds and title to completed projects is retained by the States. Armory construction funds, however, are appropriated pursuant to the same authority but under the title "Military construction, Army Civilian Components" and are subject to the restrictions set forth in par. 8, above.

10. Federal funds for construction and maintenance of Air National Guard installations and facilities are derived from annual budget authorization.

11. Federal "Repairs and Utilities" funds (R&U) are appropriated for the purpose of assisting the States in the maintenance and operation of logistical and training facilities. 'Service Contracts' between the States and the National Guard Bureau, whereby the States are reimbursed to the extent of 75% of the operational and maintenance cost of such facilities, are supported from these funds. It is desired to emphasize, however, that in some instances States cannot recover full 75% of such costs for the reason that every service contract stipulates a 'limiting amount', and that the total cost of the Federal Government, in reimbursing the State for 75% of operational and maintenance costs under the terms of the contract, is limited to the specified amount. Direct allotments of R&U funds may be made to State for major repairs, alterations, and improvements of State-owned logistical and training facilities.

C. Logistical Support Facilities—Iowa National Guard:

12. Logistical facilities required for the support of the reorganized Iowa National Guard consisted of offices, and warehouses for the United States Property and Disbursing Officer, maintenance shops and a concentration site for the maintenance and storage of equipment, and an operational base and maintenance installation for light aircraft made available to the Army National Guard.

13. Office and warehouse facilities for the United States Property and Disbursing Officer, and maintenance shops and equipment storage installations were provided from available facilities at Camp Dodge, the State Military Reservation, as indicated below:

14. The State is reimbursed by the Federal Government for 75% of the operational and maintenance cost of the above facilities from Repair and Utilities funds subject to a limiting amount of \$20,400.00 as explained in paragraph 11 above. Remodeling and reconstruction projects, to include electrical installation, high pressure boilers, re-roofing of buildings No. 7 and No. 7A, concrete ramps and elevator service within warehouses have been undertaken with assistance of federal funds available through the service contract.

15. The equipment storage facilities at Camp Dodge were augmented in 1948 by the construction of a motor vehicle storage building, 52 by 128 feet in size, at a cost of \$14,000.00 (contract W13-035-NG-7). Federal non-armory funds appropriated in 1947 and made available to the State of Iowa, as explained in paragraph 6, above, were used in support of this project. This building was given the Camp Dodge Military Reservation designation of building number 59.

16. In 1951 another motor vehicle storage building, 52 by 236 feet in size, was constructed with federal non-armory funds at a cost of \$63,436.00 (contract W13-035-NG-11). This building was designated number 85 and further augmented the equipment storage facilities available at Camp Dodge.

17. Liaison type army aircraft were made available to the Army National Guard early in fiscal year 1948 and it became necessary to establish operational bases and maintenance installations for these aircraft. It was decided to centralize all maintenance responsibility in one pool, under the State Maintenance Officer, and the city of Boone, Iowa, home station of Headquarters, 34th Infantry Division Artillery, was selected as the site for the Light Aviation (Army) Maintenance Pool. In July, 1948, the city of Boone conveyed 3.9 acres of land, adjacent to the Municipal Airport, to the State of Iowa for the purpose of erecting a hangar and other necessary maintenance support facilities. Operational facilities for the pool were provided by a lease between the United States Government and the city of Boone, date April 1, 1949, at a rental of \$154.16 per month. The pool facilities eventually consisted of a hangar, 75 by 135 feet in size, offices, storage and parachute rooms, maintenance shop and fuel storage facilities with adequate fire protection, for basing approximately eighteen aircraft. This project, costing approximately \$20,400.00 was supported in part by funds made available by the State of Iowa, and in part by materials furnished by the Federal Government without cost.

C. Army National Guard Facilities:

18. During the years 1948 and 1949 twelve motor vehicle storage buildings were constructed in the State of Iowa, for the support of the Iowa National Guard (Army), at locations and costs indicated in the following table. The cost of all of these projects was funded 100% from the federal non-armory appropriation explained in paragraph 6, above, and title vested in the State of Iowa.

19. At certain of the above locations, complete armory units were acquired by the construction of additional armory type facilities adjacent to and connecting with the vehicle storage building. Such projects were supported by private funds made available to local armory corporations created as non-profit corporations under the laws of Iowa for the purpose of financing and holding title to the adjoining structures, in such instances the local armory corporations have entered into long term leases with the Armory Board of the State of Iowa on a rental basis designed to amortize the mortgage obligation of the local corporations during the period of the leases, with the further provision that upon liquidation of the obligations of the lessors, title to the armory premises will pass to the State of Iowa. This type of armory procurement program has been utilized at the following locations:

20. In the fall of 1951 a program of completely state-supported armory procurement was initiated wherein no Federal assistance whatsoever was utilized. This program included elements similar to the program explained in the paragraph above. The plan provided for the creation of non-profit armory corporations, created under the laws of Iowa, for the purpose of financing, purchasing and remodeling existing structures or contracting for the construction of entirely new armory facilities upon land conveyed to the Corporations without cost, and leasing the facilities to the Armory Board for the State of Iowa on long term leases at annual rentals based upon amounts necessary to amortize the corporation's mortgage obligations during the periods of the leases, the leases further providing options to the State to purchase the facilities at any time upon payment of the outstanding mortgage indebtedness and accrued interest or upon the expiration of the term of the leases, and the assumption by the State of all operational and maintenance costs.

21. Pursuant to this plan the Clinton Armory Corporation purchased, financed and remodeled the new Veteran's of Foreign Wars Building, located at 213-215 Sixth Avenue South, Clinton, Iowa, from contract lien-holders in the fall of 1951. The building was purchased for \$55,500.00 and remodeled at a cost of \$32,000.00 to provide an adequate 2-unit armory for the Clinton Garrison. The lease with the Armory Board for the State of Iowa provided for an annual rental of \$6,660.00 for a period of twenty years at which time title will pass to the State. The Clinton Garrison took possession of the armory on 1 March 1952.

22. The Armory building at Fairfield, Iowa, was acquired under the same general plan in July, 1951, upon execution of a purchase-option type lease between the Company "M", 54th Infantry Armory Corporation of Fairfield and the owners of the building, and the Armory Board of the State of Iowa wherein the annual rental was fixed at \$2,670.00 for a period of fifteen years and the agreed purchase price to be amortized was \$30,000.00.

23. 27 April 1949, the War Assets Administration conveyed a war time Hemp Plant to the State of Iowa, without cost, for the purpose of providing armory facilities. In as much as the conveyance by the Government Agency contained a re-capture clause and certain restrictions with reference to alterations of the property for a period of twenty-five years. The Adjutant General of Iowa applied to the Secretary of War for authority to dismantle and dispose of the uneconomical boilers installed in the premises in order to apply the proceeds toward installation of a modern and efficient heating system in the facility. The Secretary of War granted the authority, by letter dated 14 February 1951, and the desired improvements were accomplished. This became the first state owned armory.

24. In the spring of 1952 the armory building at Iowa City was acquired and remodeled by the Iowa City Armory Corporation, in accordance with the plan described in paragraph 20 above, and the resulting two-unit armory facility was leased to the State for twenty years at an annual rental of \$6,500.00, and the agreed purchase price was \$70,000.00, title to pass to the State upon expiration of the lease.

25. In the fall of 1951, the armory building at Sioux City was acquired by execution of a purchase-option type lease between the Armory Company, Sioux City, owners, and the Armory Board of the State of Iowa, (see paragraph 20 above), providing an annual rental of \$7,834.28 for a period of twenty years, the rental based upon an amount necessary to retire outstanding bonded indebtedness of the Corporation, in the amount of \$98,500.00, over the period of the lease, and title to pass to the State upon liquidation of the indebtedness or expiration of the lease.

26. 27 June 1949, the Executive Council of Iowa authorized the expenditure of \$70,000.00 for the purchase and rehabilitation of the Red Horse Armory, Prospect Blvd. and Harding Road, Des Moines, Iowa, \$35,000.00 of which was to be applied toward retirement of outstanding indebtedness and \$35,000.00 to be utilized in remodeling and rehabilitation of the armory. This was the second state owned armory in the State.

27. The following tabulation reflects the status of the Army National Guard facilities procurement program, in the State of Iowa, as of 30 June 1952:

D. Air National Guard Facilities:

28. The allocation of Air National Guard to the State of Iowa, following World War II, included the 132d Fighter Group, consisting

of Group Headquarters, and two Fighter Squadrons (SE) with certain essential supporting units, and the 133rd Aircraft Control and Warning Squadron. In 1950 this allocation was augmented by the addition of Headquarters, 132d Fighter Wing and additional supporting elements.

29. Bases for 132d Fighter Wing were selected by Air Force planners of the basis of locations best suited to conform to the planned air defense of the United States and as a result thereof Des Moines and Sioux City were selected. Wing and Group Headquarters, the 124th Fighter Squadron (SE) and certain supporting elements were based at Des Moines and the 174th Fighter Squadron (SE) with supporting elements were based at Sioux City. The 133rd AC&W Squadron was stationed at Fort Dodge with a detachment at Cedar Rapids.

30. The Des Moines Air National Guard Base was located at the Des Moines Municipal Airport. The Hangar was constructed in 1942, with WPA support, at a cost of \$40,585.00, for the Iowa National Guard. The land for the base was leased by the Federal Government from the city of Des Moines, for twenty-five years at an annual rental of \$7,500.00. During the war years the facility was taken over by the Federal Government and was returned to the National Guard in 1947. The Base facilities were augmented in 1951 by the construction of a Group and Squadron Warehouse at a cost of \$147,959.00 (contract DA-13-035-NG-3) and conversion of the heating system to heavy oil fired steam boiler system at a cost of \$18,990.70 (contract DA-13-035-NG-9). Both of these projects were supported by Federal funds derived from Air National Guard budget authorization.

31. The Sioux City Air National Guard Base was located at the Sioux City Municipal Airport, Sergeant Bluff, Iowa, and the necessary facilities were acquired through a twenty-five year lease by the Federal Government with the city of Sioux City at an annual rental of \$1.00. The lease provided an aggregate of 128,073 feet of floor space, necessary streets and concrete apron upon the airfield containing 549,910 square feet with joint usage of flying field and flying rights. This lease, and the supporting service contracts described hereafter, were terminated upon induction of the Air National Guard into active federal service in the spring of 1951, and the installation was taken over entirely by the Air Defense Command.

32. The federal leases providing land and facilities for Air National Guard activities required the lessors to furnish certain services to the using Air National Guard units, and the lessor cities were reimbursed for the cost of such services through service contracts entered into between the State of Iowa and the lessor cities. The service contract for operational and maintenance services at the Des Moines base provided reimbursement to the city of Des Moines in the amount of \$15,000.00 annually, and to the city of Sioux City in the amount of \$24,000.00 annually. Upon induction of the Air National Guard into active federal service the Des Moines service contract was renegotiated down to \$6,000.00 annually, as a servicing detachment remained on duty at this base, and the Sioux City contract was terminated.

33. The State, on the other hand, had negotiated service contracts with the National Guard Bureau whereby the State was reimbursed for 75% of the operational and maintenance cost of all Air National Guard facilities, subject to limitations explained in paragraph 11, above, and thereby was enabled to recover 75% of the above described service contract payments to the respective lessor cities. Limiting amounts of the respective service contracts were as follows:

34. Facilities for the Aircraft Control and Warning Squadron, located at Ford Dodge, were leased by the Federal Government for a maximum of ten years at an annual rental of \$6,000.00. The State also negotiated a service contract with the National Guard Bureau for reimbursement of 75% of the operational and maintenance cost of this installation, and the necessary rehabilitation project, to provide facilities adequate for this activity, were in part supported by this means of Federal assistance.

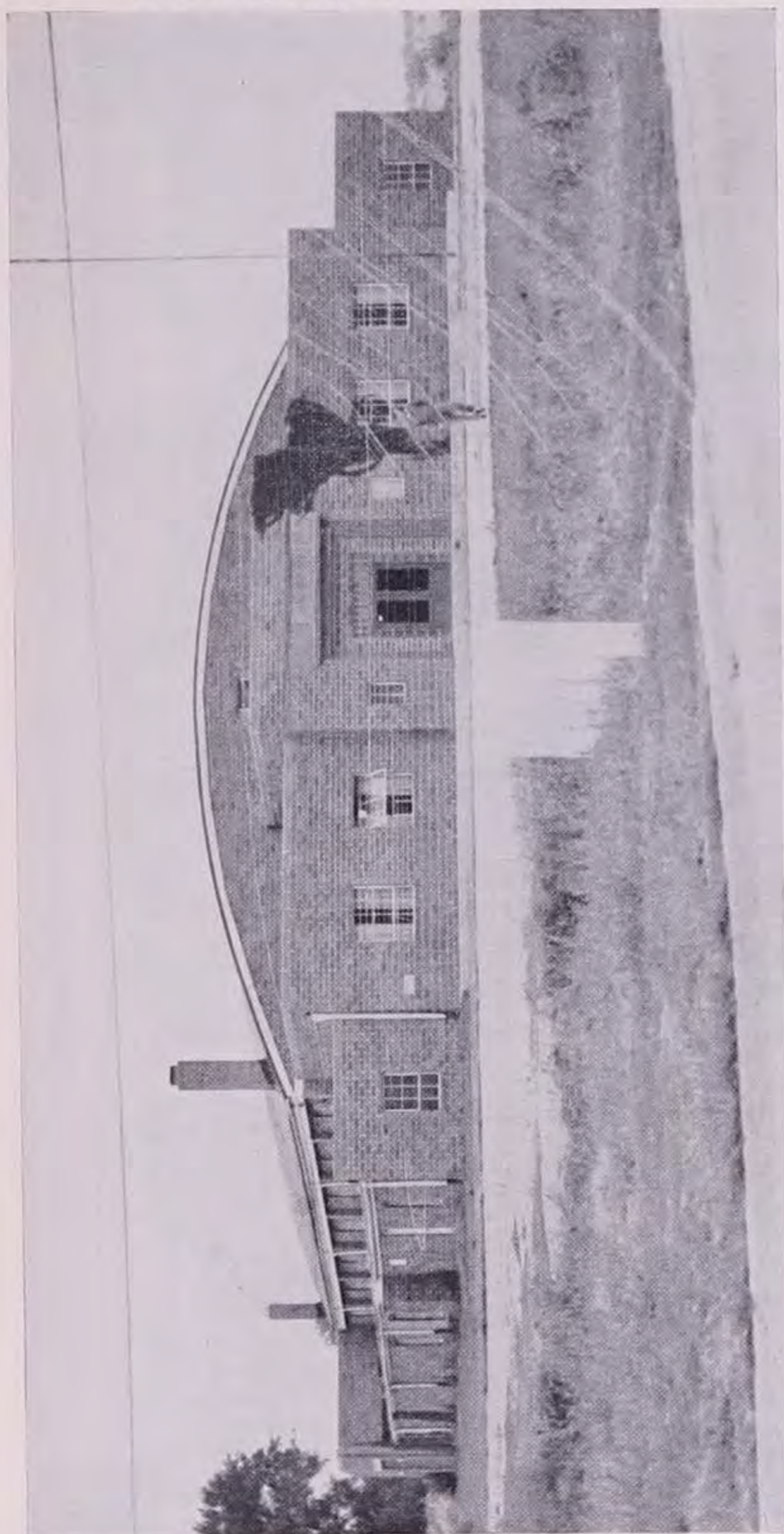

NATIONAL GUARD ARMORY, CLINTON, IOWA



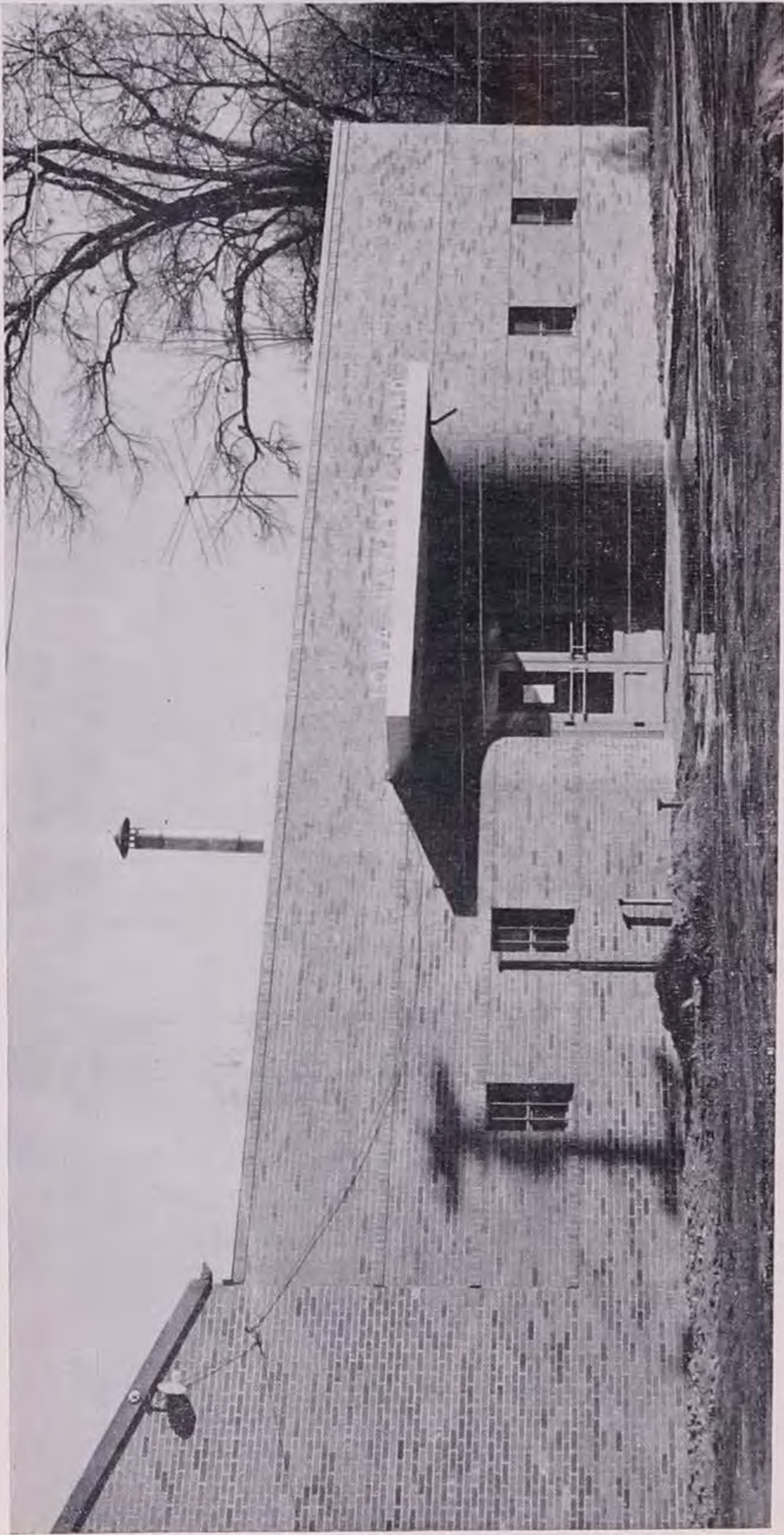
NATIONAL GUARD ARMORY, WASHINGTON, IOWA



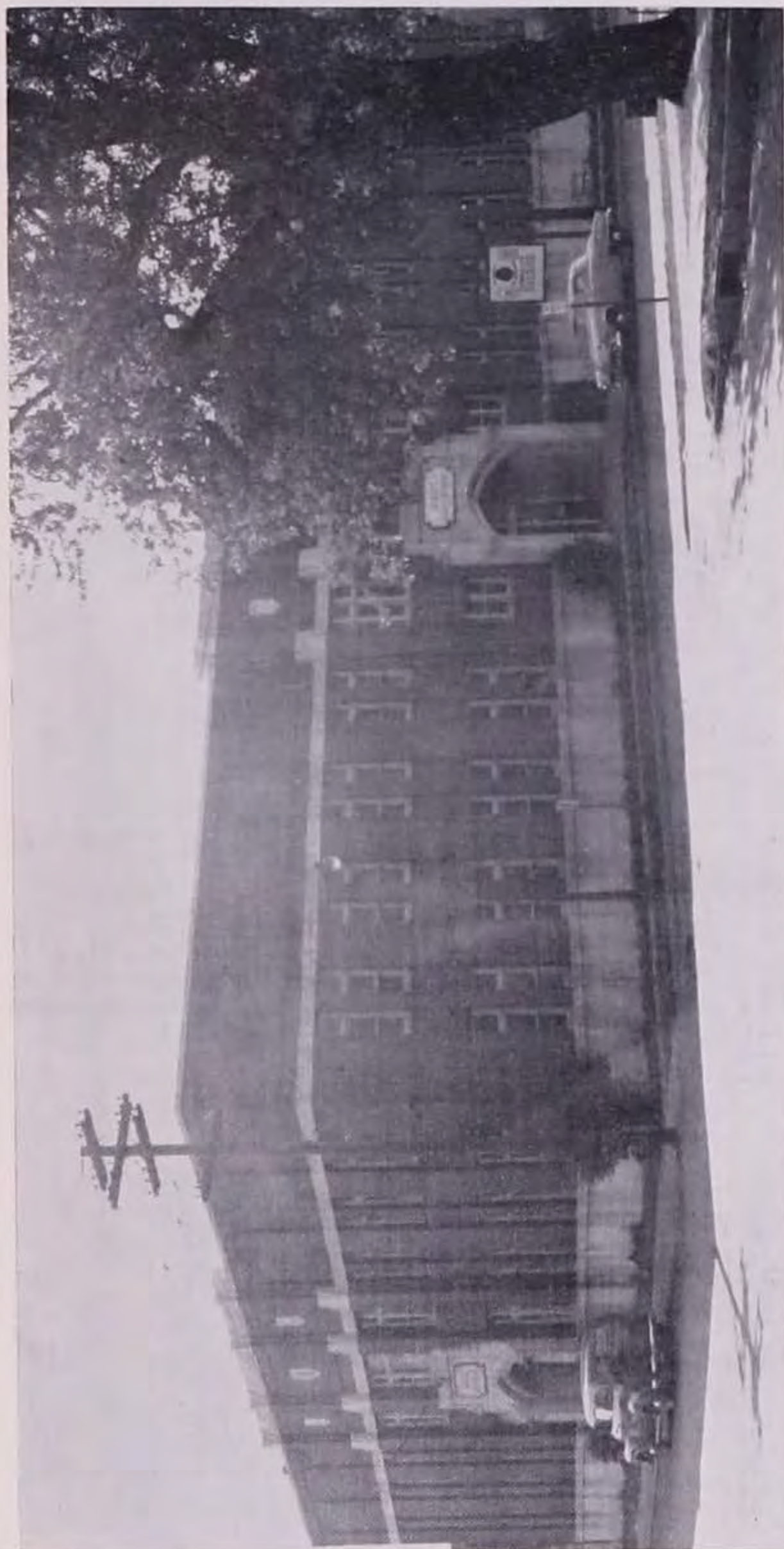
NATIONAL GUARD ARMORY, FAIRFIELD, IOWA

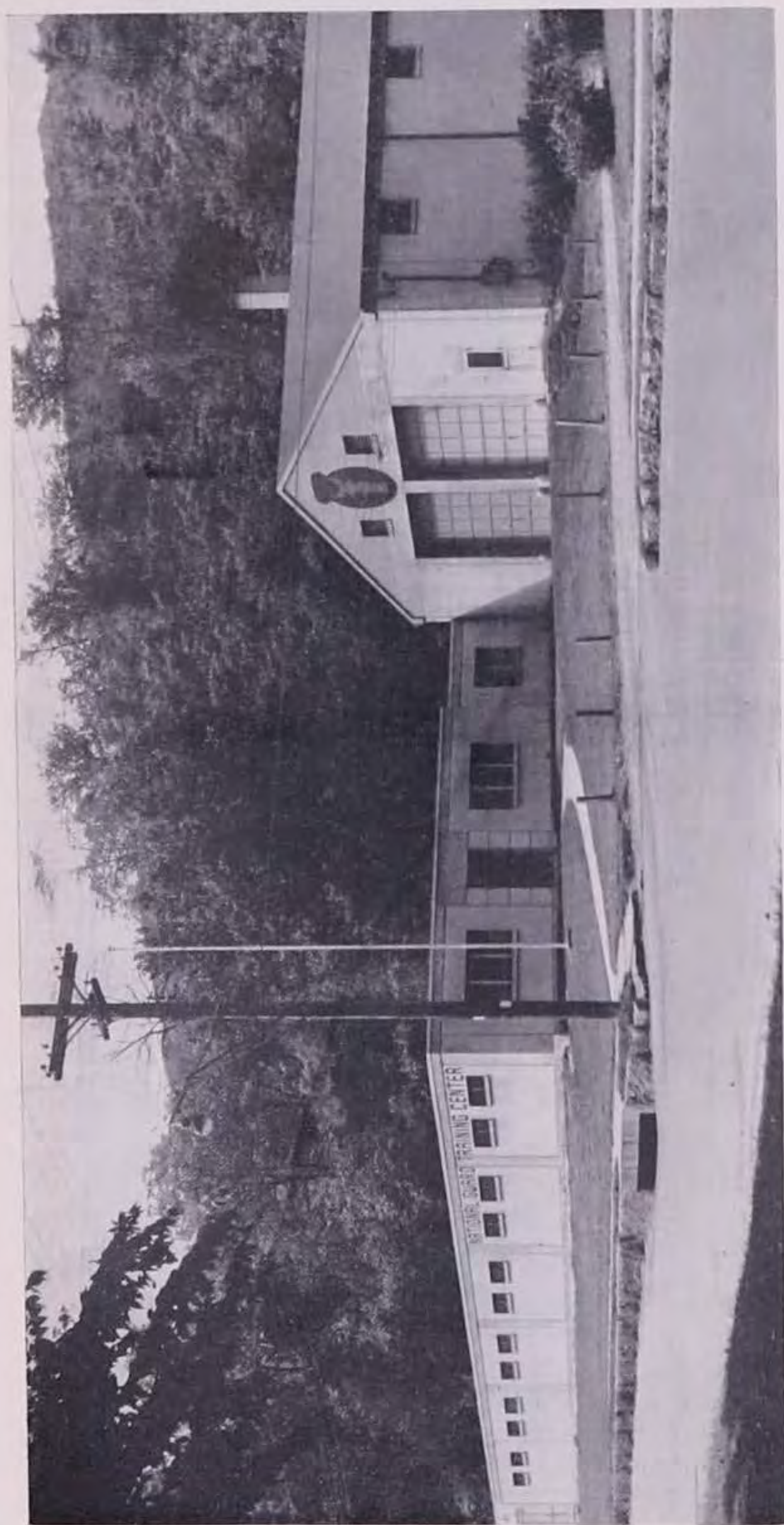

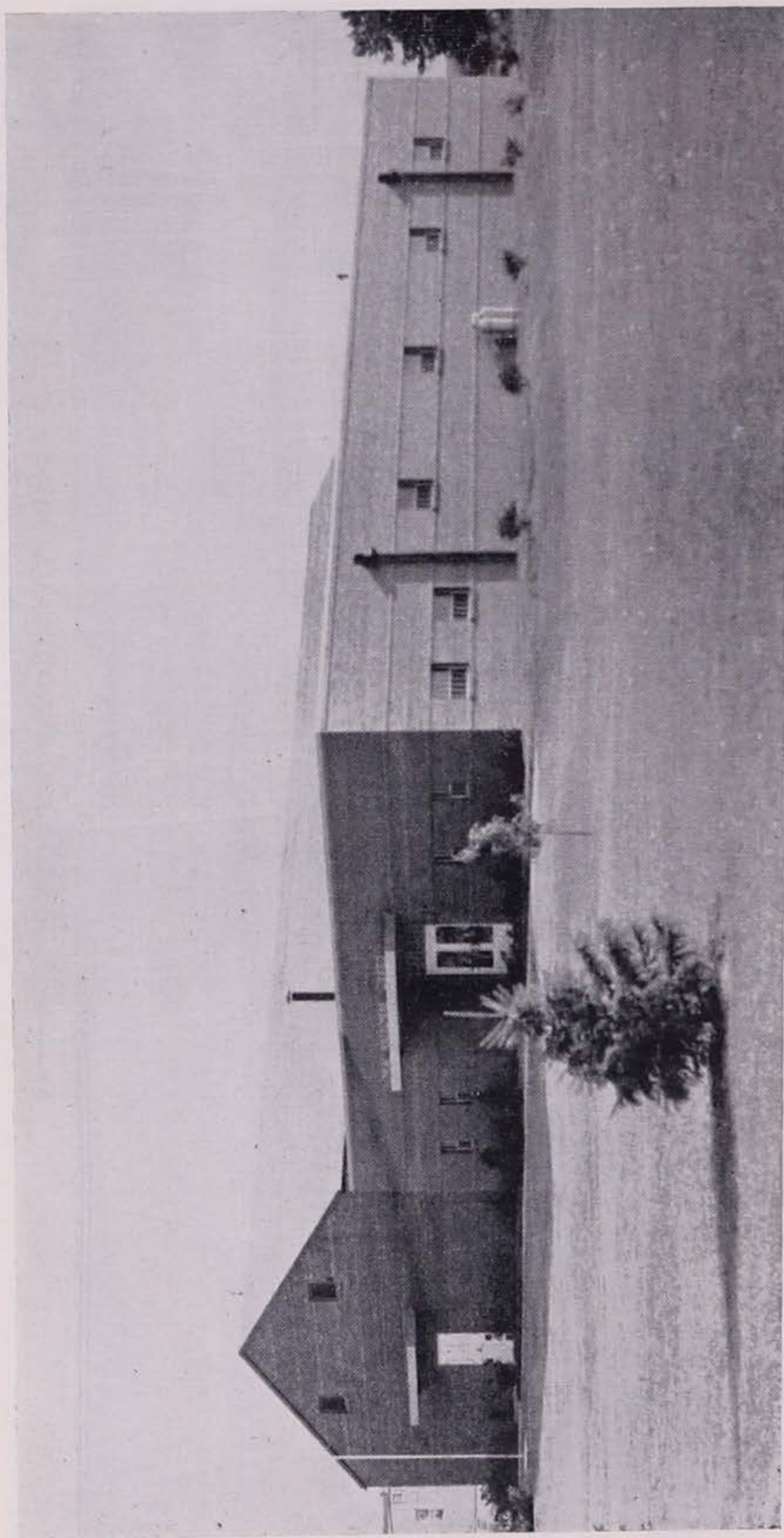

By direction of the President each officer and warrant officer of the National Guard, appointed in the National Guard, who shall have been Federally recognized or examined and found qualified for Federal Recognition by a duly constituted board of officers, and shall have been assigned to a position vacancy for a commissioned officer or warrant officer in a unit ordered to active duty under this order prior to the effective date of entry into the active military service, who does not hold an appointment in the National Guard of the United States in the same grade and arm or service in which he has been most recently examined and found qualified for Federal Recognition by a duly constituted board of officers, is tendered appointment in the National Guard of the United States in the same grade and arm or service in which he shall have been most recently Federally recognized or examined and found qualified for Federal Recognition. Each person so appointed will forward oath of office with individual report prescribed by paragraph 10, Army Regulations 130-10. Service numbers will be assigned by the Adjutant General upon receipt of report of entry into the active military service of the United States; except that if the individual is a former officer of the Army, the service number previously assigned to him will be used and entered on all records.

5. Department of the Army will issue reorganization directives for units concerned at earliest practicable date after arrival at training station.

6. Individual and organizational supplies and equipment now on hand will accompany the units upon entry into the active military service.

7. The provisions of AR 130-10, as amended, and current directives in connection therewith, will be complied with.

 SECTION II. ALLOWANCES OF STATE FUNDS.

1. Headquarters Allowance.

b. Expenditures from the Headquarters Allowance are limited to the purchase of stationery, office supplies not otherwise provided, postage, official telephone and telegraph service, and any other specific supplies and/or services authorized in writing in advance by the Adjutant General of Iowa.

2. Per Capita (Drill) Allowance.

a. Section 29.52, Code of Iowa, 1950, provides for the payment of a per capita (drill) allowance of four dollars (\$4.00) per capita, computed on the basis of the average enlisted strength, during each semi-annual period, to each company, battery, troop or detachment.

b. Expenditures from the per capita fund are restricted to the purchase of articles or payment for services which contribute to the welfare, comfort, contentment, and mental and physical improvement of the enlisted personnel or the military efficiency of the unit. Payment for supplies and/or services which would ordinarily be paid from other allowances, when such allowances are not adequate, must be approved in writing by the Adjutant General of Iowa prior to making the payment. Disbursements from this allowance for entertainment, refreshments, social activities, dances, or flowers for funerals are prohibited. Unauthorized expenditures will be disallowed and the unit commander will be required to reimburse the fund from personal or other sources.

SECTION III. MANAGEMENT OF STATE FUNDS.

1. Distribution of State Funds.

a. State Allowances (Headquarters Allowance and Per Capita Allowance) are payable semi-annually in advance. Remittance will normally be made between the 15th and 31st of July and January of each fiscal year.

b. Distribution of State Allowances will not be made before the submission and approval of the Account Current for the preceding accounting period.

2. Deposit of State Funds in Bank

a. Warrants issued by the State of Iowa in payment of the allowances will be endorsed by the payee and deposited in an accredited banking institution in a single fund to be known as "State Funds, Company (Battery)th Infantry (Artillery, etc.), Iowa National Guard."

b. Funds derived from any other source than the State of Iowa will not be deposited in this account.

c. Overdrafts on State Fund Accounts are strictly prohibited.

3. Work Sheets.

a. Accountable officers will maintain "work sheets" (Form 112, AGO Iowa (buff), upon which will be entered all receipts and disbursements of State Funds currently during the accounting period.

b. The information contained on the work sheet will be transcribed to the Account Current (Form 112, AGO Iowa, White) as of the final day of the accounting period.

c. Property auditors will be instructed to examine this work sheet during periodic property audits.

4. DISBURSEMENTS.

a. All disbursements from State Funds (Headquarters Allowance or Per Capita Allowance) will be made by voucher check (Form 111, AGO Iowa), provided by the Headquarters, upon which will be itemized the articles or services purchased.

b. Unauthorized expenditures will be disallowed and the accountable officer will be required to reimburse the fund from personal or other funds in the amount of the disallowance.

5. Accountable Officers to Personally Manage State Funds.

a. Accountable officers will personally manage and account for State Funds for which they are accountable. This responsibility will not be delegated.

6. Company Council.

a. A company council will be appointed for each unit receiving allowances of State Funds, consisting of two officers, other than the accountable officer, and the two senior non-commissioned officers of the unit. If less than three officers are assigned to the unit, the available officers will be appointed.

b. The duties of the company council are:

- (1) Ascertain that State Funds are being properly administered and safeguarded, that all income is being properly

recorded, and to insure that all disbursements are within the purposes for which the fund is allowed.

- (2) To approve all disbursements from the Funds.
- (3) To inquire into the necessity for proposed disbursements and, when necessary, to curtail or eliminate the least essential.
- (4) To audit the Account Current prior to submission to this Headquarters for approval. A statement to the effect that the Company Council was consulted on all reported disbursements and that the Account Current was audited by the Council, signed by all members of the Council, will accompany the Account Current when it is submitted for approval.

7. Expenditure of Per Capita Funds in Lieu of Headquarters Allowance.

a. Requests for authority to expend per capita funds for supplies and/or services which would ordinarily be paid from other allowances, when such other Allowances are inadequate, will be carefully scrutinized by this Headquarters. Experience has demonstrated that the majority of such requests pertain to expenses incident to the purchase of postage, office supplies, and telephone service. In as much as the Headquarters Allowances for company size units have been materially increased, it is believed that by careful management, this Fund will now be adequate, without the necessity for recourse to per capita funds, to defray the cost of the supplies and services for which it was intended. In this connection it is the opinion of this Headquarters that in too many instances the cost for postage and telephone service has been excessively high. Unit commanders are directed to take immediate steps to control the use of long distance telephone service for communications that, with ordinarily careful planning, and anticipation, might be just as expeditiously conducted by use of postal service. It is further directed that immediate steps will be taken to prohibit the use of armory telephones for personal long distance telephone calls. All future requests for authority to expend per capita funds for payment of telephone service must be accompanied by the telephone company's statement of charges with the accompanying detailed list of long distance toll charges. Telephone service charges considered excessive will be investigated.

b. Attention is further directed to the requirement (see Section II, par. 2, b, above) that requests to this Headquarters for authority to expend per capita funds for supplies and/or services which would ordinarily be paid from other allowances, when such allowances are inadequate, must be submitted for approval prior to making the expenditure. In the future all such expenditures that have not had the prior approval of this Headquarters, will be disallowed and the accountable officer will be required to effect a monetary adjustment of the account.

8. Purchase of Non-expendable Property from Per Capita Funds.

a. Non-expendable property authorized for purchase by expenditure of per capita funds becomes State property and unit commanders become accountable for such State property in the same manner as they are accountable for non-expendable federal property.

b. Purchase of such non-expendable State property, as reflected by the Account Current, will be reported to the State Quartermaster for recording in the State Property records as accountable State property. Unit commanders will enter such property in unit property records as accountable State property.

9. Lending of Money from State Funds Prohibited from State Funds.

a. The lending of money from State Funds for any purpose, without authority of this Headquarters, is strictly prohibited.

SECTION IV. ACCOUNTING FOR STATE FUNDS.**1. Audit of State Funds by Adjutant General of Iowa.**

a. Officers accountable for State Funds will submit an Account Current (Form 112, AGO Iowa (White) for accountable State Funds (Headquarters Allowance and Per Capita Allowance) at the end of each accounting period.

b. Accounting periods are 1 July through 31 December and 1 January through 30 June of each fiscal year.

c. In the event of a change of command of a unit during the accounting period, the outgoing unit commander will submit an Account Current to this Headquarters for the current accounting period and to include the last day of his tenure of command.

2. Preparation of Account Current (Form 112, AGO Iowa, White).

a. Approximately thirty (30) days prior to the end of each accounting period, Account Current forms (112, AGO Iowa, white) will be forwarded to each accountable officer.

b. The balances remaining in each fund of the State Allowances (Headquarters Allowance and Per Capita Allowance), as indicated from the Account Current last submitted, will be entered as of first day of the accounting period, and State Allowances received during the accounting period will be duly entered in the appropriate space, as reflected by the "work sheet" (Form 112 AGO, Iowa, buff), maintained by the accountable officers during the accounting period. The total "receipts" will be entered in appropriate space in the "Summary".

c. Disbursements from the respective funds, as reflected by the "work sheet" will be transcribed to the Account Current under the appropriate heading and the total of the disbursements will be entered in the appropriate space in the "Summary".

d. The total of the differentials between total receipts and disbursements for each of the allowances must coincide with the bank balance as of the accounting date.

e. The Account Current will be prepared and submitted in duplicate.

3. Accounts Current to be Submitted Within Fifteen (15) Days.

a. The completed Account Current will be forwarded so as to reach this Headquarters not later than the 15th day of the month following the end of the accounting period, or not later than fifteen (15) days following the last day of tenure of command of an accountable officer relinquishing his command during the accounting period.

b. Subsequent State Allowances will not be distributed to any organization until the Account Current for that organization for the preceding accounting period has been submitted and approved.

4. Supporting Documents.

a. The original copy of the Account Current will be accompanied by the following supporting documents:

- (1) Cancelled voucher checks numbered to correspond with the disbursements reported in the Account Current.

- (2) Bank Statement as of the final day of accounting period.
- (3) Vendor's itemized statements or invoices will be attached to the voucher check representing the disbursement in payment for the supplies or services. Accountable officers will request invoices or statements from vendors in each instance of a purchase or payment, to include payment for telephone service, utilities, and postage.
