

TO HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR OF IOWA AND COMMANDER IN CHIEF OF THE IOWA NATIONAL GUARD (Army and Air):

The Biennial Report of the Adjutant General of Iowa, for the period 1 July, 1952 through 30 June, 1954, is respectfully submitted.

This report summarizes the major activities of the Iowa National Guard (Army and Air) for the indicated period. A discussion of subjects common to both Army and Air National Guard is followed by separate sections devoted to the activities of each.

For purposes of clarity, in this report the term "National Guard" will be used to denote the organized militia as a whole, both Army and Air, and the terms "Army National Guard" and "Air National Guard" used when specific reference is made to ground or air forces of the Iowa National Guard, respectively.

The Adjutant General's Department reviews the achievements of the indicated biennium with pride and satisfaction. Numerical strength increased appreciably, the status of training is excellent, and new missions have been capably undertaken. It is believed that the Nation and the State receive a tremendous return on every dollar invested in the National Guard.

As Annexes the Report includes all General Orders published during the period, a complete list of all Adjutant Generals who have served throughout the history of the State of Iowa, and a complete list of all retired officers.

INTRODUCTION

The National Guard of Iowa is an organization composed of individuals voluntarily serving the State and the Nation as members of military units. The tradition of the citizen-soldier goes back to colonial days when every adult male was assigned to a military company. Those companies which were active were called "Volunteer Militia" and were equipped and trained according to the needs of the time. The National Guard is the lineal descendant of the Volunteer Corps. The equipment of the Volunteers was meager and training was limited to drill—but regular drill was required. Then, as now, the emphasis was on training, on readiness for the emergency.

The National Guard of today is organized under the Army and Air Force tables of organization and equipment. There are 27 divisions in the Army National Guard of the United States and 27 Wings in the Air National Guard of the United States. In addition to these major organizations, there are regimental combat teams, artillery battalions, and numerous other combat support units, making a total in the United States, Hawaii, Puerto Rico, Alaska and the District of Columbia of 5,612 units, with a federally recognized strength of 367,851. The major portions of one infantry division, the 34th Infantry Division, and one wing, the 132d Fighter-Bomber Wing are in the State of Iowa, the balance of each being in Nebraska. In addition Iowa has the 194th Field Artillery Battalion (155MM How.), two ordnance companies (DS) the 133d Aircraft control and Warning Flight.

The National Guard of the United States has the federal mission of providing units for the active Army and Air Force, adequately organized, trained and equipped, available for mobilization in the event of national emergency or war, in accordance with the deployment schedule, and capable of participating in combat operations in support of Department of Defense war plans.

The National Guard of Iowa has a dual status and mission. Each unit is simultaneously a part of the National Guard of the State of Iowa and of the National Guard of The United States. The National Guard of Iowa, in addition to its federal mission as explained above, has the state mission and responsibility for maintaining a force with strength adequate to protect life and property in the State and uphold the peace and quiet of the community when called upon by the Governor in times of emergency. Except when ordered into active military service, the National Guard is under the command of the Governor of the State.

This report deals with the achievements and the problems of the National Guard of Iowa in its progress toward its objectives.

POLICIES OF DEPARTMENT OF THE ARMY AND DEPARTMENT OF THE AIR FORCE RELATING TO THE NATIONAL GUARD

GENERAL

The National Guard of the United States and the Air National Guard of the United States are integral parts and first line reserve components of the Army of the United States and the United States Air Force. The National Guard of the United States and territories continues to exist and, in time of national emergency, may be called or ordered into the Army of the United States and the United States Air Force through its National Guard of the United States status. All federally recognized units and elements of the active National Guard and the personnel of the Inactive National Guard of the several states, territories, the District of Columbia and Puerto Rico, together, constitutes the National Guard of The United States.

MISSIONS

A. Mission of the National Guard of the United States and the policy relative to its employment are set forth in the Armed Forces Reserve

Act of 1952 (Public Law 476, 82d Congress) as follows:

"Sec. 201. (a) The Congress hereby declares that the reserve components of the Armed Forces of the United States are maintained for the purpose of providing trained units and qualified individuals to be available for active duty in the Armed Forces of the United States in time of War or national emergency, and at such other times as the national security may require, to meet the requirements of the Armed Forces of the United States in excess of those of the Regular components thereof, during and after the period needed for procurement and training of additional trained units and qualified

individuals to achieve the planned mobilization."
This law specifically defined and further clarified dictates that the mission of the National Guard of the United States is to provide a reserve component of the Army of the United States and the United States Air Force capable of immediate expansion to war strength, able to furnish units fit for service anywhere in the world, trained and equipped to: 1. Defend critical areas of the United States against land, seaborne or airborne invasion. 2. Assist in covering the mobilization and concentration of the remainder of the reserve forces. 3. Participate by units in all types of operations, including the offensive either in

the United States or overseas.

B. Mission of the National Guard of the Several States.

A dual mission is levied upon both the Army and Air National Guard. As stated above, both the Army and Air National Guard have the Federal mission of preparing their units and members for active military service in time of national emergency, however there is also an important mission to perform for the State of Iowa. The State mission, a peacetime one, is the traditional guardian of life and property and constitutes a State security Force, which provides sufficient organization in the State so trained and equipped as to enable them to function efficiently at existing strength in the protection of life and property and the preservation of peace, order and public safety under competent orders of State authorities. This mission also is being accomplished. (See "Active State Duty"), bereafter, for incidents requiring use of State Troops during this biennium).

COMPOSITION OF THE IOWA NATIONAL GUARD

A. The organization and units alloted to the several States will be those which are required for the accomplishment of the mission of the National Guard and when taken with the units of the Regular Army, United States Air Force and their reserve components, will provide the essential forces required for early mobilization. Within the total allotment, organizations of the proper type will be allotted to each State to enable it to accomplish the Federal and State missions. (See "Troop Allocation," hereafter, for a listing of units allotted to the State of Iowa during this biennium.)

IV. FEDERAL AND STATE RESPONSIBILITY

A. General.

The National Guard is an integral part of the Army of the United States and the United States Air Force and its success depends upon mutual confidence between the Federal Government and the States and Territories. Such confidence is obtained only by the wholehearted efforts of all parties to maintain an effective National Guard.

B. The Federal Government is responsible for:

Providing the pay of federally recognized personnel for participation in authorized inactive duty training and active duty for training, including appropriate duty or duties and periods of equivalent duty or training, and Administrative pay.

2. The procurement and issue of uniforms, arms, equipment and

supplies.

3. The supervision of training.

4. To appropriate a sum of money annually for the expense of providing ordnance stores, quartermaster stores, camp equipment and to contribute to State Funds an equitable share of the expense of construction and maintenance of certain training facilities, as are now or may later be authorized by law.

Audit and inspect National Guard Units, Army and Air, and accounts and records of the United States Property and

Physical Officer.

C. The State Government is responsible for:

 Subject to such qualifications for Federal recognition as may be established by the Secretary of the Army and Air Force, appoint, promote, transfer, assign and separate personnel of the National Guard, Army and Air.

2. Provide training and storage facilities, except as contributed

to by the Federal Government.

To train officers, warrant officers and enlisted personnel of the National Guard, Army and Air.

 To properly account for and maintain all Federal property and funds.

D. Headquarters and Headquarters Detachment Iowa National Guard

Within each State there shall be an administrative staff to be designated as "State Headquarters and Headquarters Detachment" and which will be organized and federally recognized as a unit of the National Guard. The numbers and grades of officers, warrant officers and enlisted men within the State Headquarters and Headquarters Detachment will be based upon the strength of allotted National Guard units to the State and, in addition, will provide a suitable number of officers and enlisted men for duties in connection with selective Service and internal security.

E. Headquarters, Iowa Air National Guard

By direction of the Secretary of the Air Force through the Chief, National Guard Bureau the unit known as the Headquarters, Iowa Air National Guard is assigned to the office of the State Adjutant General. As the State Headquarters and Headquarters Detachment, the strength of the Headquarters, Iowa Air National Guard is based upon the total personnel authorization of the Federally recognized Air National Guard units of the State. The responsibility of determining positions and titles for the grades authorized rests with the State Adjutant General. The Mission of Headquarters, Iowa Air National Guard is to advise and assist the Adjutant General in matters pertaining to administration, logistics and training of Air National Guard Units within the State.

F. Advisors

Under policies of the Department of the Army and Department of the Air Force, selection and assignment of qualified advisors is reserved as a function of the Air Force. The supervision of the training responsibility of the advisors is vested in the Chief, Army Field Forces and Chief of Reserve Forces, Headquarters, United States Air Force. Personnel on duty as advisors with the National Guard will have no command status with troops or units of the National Guard, nor will they be subject to orders of State military authorities. The primary duties of advisors will be to advise and assist responsible commanders in the attainment and maintenance of that state of efficiency of the National Guard units as is prescribed by Headquarters, Department of the Army and Headquarters, Department of the Air Force.

G. National Guard Bureau.

1. The National Guard Bureau is charged with:

a. Administering approved joint Army and Air Force policies, other than those relative to training, when such policies are applicable to both the Army National Guard not in the Federal service and the Air National Guard not in the Federal service and with promulgating joint Army-Air Force directives applicable to both the Army and Air National Guard, including those relating to training.

b. Functioning as the channel of communication between the Departments of the Army and Air Force and the State on all matters pertaining to the Army and Air National Guard.

c. Maintaining an office of record of all Department of the Army and Air National Guard not in the Federal service.

H. National Guard Policy Making.

All policies affecting the National Guard are prepared by the General Staff Committee on National Guard Policy (known as the "Section Five Committee") for action by the Secretary of the Army and Secretary of the Air Force under normal Department of the Army and Department of the Air Force Procedure. All regulations to carry such policies into effect are reviewed by this committee.

1. Public Law 461.

During the Korean emergency, selected National Guard units of the several states were called to active duty for a period of five years, and upon termination of the emergency, Congress enacted Public Law 461, which authorized units to be reactivated at their home stations at reduced strength and yet keep the parent organization on active duty.

MILITARY DEPARTMENT OF THE STATE OF IOWA

Sec. 29.2, Code of Iowa, 1954, creates the Iowa National Guard and the Iowa Air National Guard, and Section 29.6 provides that the Military Forces of the State of Iowa shall consist of the National Guard and the Militia.

National Guard Regulations, published by the Department of the Army, and Air National Guard Regulations, published by the Department of the Air Force, provide that the National Guard of the United States and Air National Guard of the United States, civilian components of the Army of the United States and the United States Air Force, shall consist of Federally recognized units of the National Guard and the Air National Guard, and as such are subject to federal law and regulations.

Section 29.7, Code of Iowa, 1954, provides that the Governor shall be the Commander in Chief of the Military Forces of the State, except so much of the National Guard and/or Air National Guard as may be in federal service, and as such may employ the same for the defense of relief of the State, the enforcement of its laws and the protection of life and property therein.

Section 29.12, Code of Iowa, 1954, provides that the Adjutant General shall have control of the Military Department of the State and perform such duties as pertain to the office of the Adjutant General under federal laws and regulations. Paragraph 35, National Guard Regulations Number 1, published by the Department of the Army and Air Force, provides that, the office of the State Adjutant General is a State Office administered under the Governor of the State, and that the State Adjutant General is the agency through whom instructions are issued to the National Guard of the State by Federal Military Authorties.

THE ADJUTANT GENERAL OF IOWA

Section 29.11 and 29.12, Code of Iowa, 1954, provide for the appointment and qualifications of the Adjutant General of the State and further provides that the Adjutant General shall have the following duties and responsibilities:

- (1) The Adjutant General shall have charge of the State Military Reservations, and all other property of the State kept or used for military purposes:
- (2) The Adjutant General of Iowa is the principal assistant and adviser to the Governor on all matters pertaining to the Military Forces of the State of Iowa.
- (3) He transmits the decisions of the Commander in Chief to appropriate staff officers for preparation of necessary orders, or transmits them in the form of orders to those who execute them.
 - (4) He is the principal coordinating agency of the command.
- (5) He formulates and announces policies for the operation of the Staff and for the administration, operation and training of the Military Forces of the States of Iowa.
- (6) He advises and informs the Governor relative to the administration, operations, training and general effectiveness of the command.
- (7) He represents the Commander in Chief when duly authorized to do so.

- (8) He observes and supervises the execution of authorized orders.
- (9) Publications of federal military authorities are supplied to the National Guard through the Adjutant General.
- (10) The Adjutant General is responsible to Federal Military Authorities for the preparation and submission og reports and returns to the Chief National Guard Bureau as directed.
- (11) The Adjutant General is charged with the responsibility for maintaining the Office of Records for the Iowa National Guard. The office of the Adjutant General processes all correspondence as provided in Section IX, NGR 1 and AR 340-15. The safeguarding of classified military information and the classification of military documents will be the responsibility of the Adjutant General.
- (12) The Adjutant General is responsible for authentication, publication and distribution of all orders, circulars and memoranda; the operation of the Headquarters message center to include postal service, establishment and supervision of administrative procedures, classifications, assignment, reclassification, reassignment, promotion, transfer, retirement and discharge of all individuals of the Iowa National Guard within the policies established by Federal Military Authorities and the Gevernor of Iowa; decorations, citations, honors and awards.
- (13) The Adjutant General is responsible for the supervision of and formulation of policies pertaining to all civilian personnel employed by the Military Department of the State of Iowa, and personnel employed pursuant to the Civilian Personnel Program (Army & Air) supported with federal funds.
- (14) The Adjutant General is responsible for the custody and maintenance of all property and funds, Federal and State, provided for the use of the Iowa National Guard, and for all installations within the State of Iowa utilized for military purposes.
- (15) Upon receipt from the Chief, National Guard Bureau of notification of Federal funds apportioned to the State of Iowa under the approved program of expenditures, the Adjutant General will request, by letter, that the Chief, National Guard Bureau, allot, the funds apportioned for the approved projects for which the State may obligate funds.

ASSISTANT ADJUTANT GENERAL OF IOWA

Section 29.12, Code of Iowa, 1954, provides that the Assistant Adjutant General shall serve in the office of the Adjutant General and aid him by performing such duties as the Adjutant General may assign him. In the absence or disability of the Adjutant General he shall perform the duties of that office as Acting Adjutant General.

ORGANIZATION AND FUNCTIONS OFFICE OF THE ADJUTANT GENERAL OF IOWA

U.S. PROPERTY AND FISCAL OFFICER

The United States Property & Fiscal Officer, Lt. Col. Russell E. Law, is an Iowa National Guard Officer, assigned to Headquarters and Headquarters Detachment, Iowa National Guard, on active federal duty and paid from federal funds. In accordance with the provisions of Section 29.18, Code of Iowa, 1954, and appropriate federal regulations, he is appointed by the Governor of Iowa upon the recommendation of the Adjutant General, subject to the approval of the Secretary of Defense.

Public Law 477, 83rd Congress, amended Section 67 of the National Defense Act and changed the designation of the Acting United States Property and Disbursing Officer to United States Property and Fiscal Officer.

The USP&FO for Iowa is responsible to the Adjutant General of Iowa and to the Chief, National Guard Bureau, for the direction and coordination of activities relating to the storage, issue, distribution, maintenance, repair, and salvage of all federally owned supplies and equipment assigned to the Iowa National Guard, and as State Quartermaster he is responsible to the Adjutant General for all state owned military supplies and equipment utilized by the Military Forces of the State of Iowa.

He is accountable for all federally owned property, both Army and Air Force.

He functions as transportation officer (not to include operation of organic National Guard vehicular transportation) and as Fiscal Officer (for federal funds only.)

He is responsible to the Adjutant General of Iowa for the supervision and execution of arrangements for supply evacuation, transportation and other administrative matters related thereto, and for recommendations as to necessary decisions concerning supply evacuation and transportation.

The facilities of the USP&FO consist of approximately 40,000 square feet of warehousing and 9500 square feet of office space located at Camp Dodge. Under a service contract, the Department of Defense reimburses the State of Iowa for 75% of the maintenance and operational costs of the facility.

The USP&FO activity employs thirty six (36) accounting and clerical personnel in the offices and warehouses, all of whom are employed pursuant to the Civilian Personnel Program supported entirely with federal funds.

STATE MAINTENANCE ACTIVITIES

Maintenance of equipment issued to the Iowa National Guard is a vital and continuing function of the Military Department of the State. Military maintenance is defined as "any action taken to keep material in a serviceable condition or to restore it to servicability when it is unserviceable." Thus maintenance of material includes inspecting, testing, servicing, classifying as to serviceability, repairing, rebuilding and reclaiming.

The State Maintenance Officer, Col. George L. Shoemaker, is a full-time civilian employee who is also an Iowa National Guard officer assigned to Headquarters and Headquarters Detachment, Iowa National Guard. He is employed pursuant to the Civilian Personnel Program, with an NGC classification, supported entirely with federal funds.

The State Maintenance Officer is the technical advisor to the Adjutant General of Iowa and to the United States Property & Fiscal Officer on all matters pertaining to maintenance of supplies and equipment, including Army National Guard aviation.

. The Military Department of the State of Iowa maintenance activities, under the control and supervision of the State Maintenance officer, include the following:

1. National Guard Maintenance Shop:

The State Maintenance Shop is a field maintenace facility, equipped with personnel, tools, test equipment and shop equipment for repairing and servicing of material of all technical services. The Maintenance Shop occupies (39 technicians employed) the following facilities located at Camp Dodge:

Building #7 and 8-approximately 44,195 square feet

Building #232—small arms repair shop, approximately 1,704 square feet

2. Concentration Site:

Concentration Sites are established for the storage and maintenance of unit T/E equipment which is not essential at unit garrisons for training purposes, in order to effect savings in transportation and assure more efficient and economical maintenance. The Concentration Site in Iowa is located at Camp Dodge and occupies the following facilities:

Building Number 7A, approximately 34,776 square feet

Buildings Number 59 and 85 are used for storage of vehicles, approximately 16,120 square feet.

Seven (7) technicians are employed.

3. Army Aviation Maintenance Pool:

Liaison type aircraft assigned to the Army National Guard are based at the Army Aviation Maintenance Pool, under the control and supervision of the State Maintenance Officer, located at the Boone Municipal Airport, in Boone, Iowa. The Pool facilities consist of a hangar, office and storage facilities, parachute rooms, maintenance shop and fuel storage facilities, adequate for approximately eighteen (18) liaison type army aircraft. Eight (8) technicians are employed at the Pool pursuant to the Civilian Personnel, with NGM classifications, entirely supported by federal funds.

4. Service Centers:

Service Centers, sub-shops of the main State Maintenance Shop at Camp Dodge, have been located at the following Iowa National Guard Garrisons for the purpose of more economical operation of the State maintenance functions:

Davenport, Iowa City, Fairfield, Oskaloosa, Corning, Council Bluffs, Sioux City, Cherokee, Ft. Dodge, and Waterloo, A total of Thirteen (13) mechanics, with NGM classifications, supported with federal funds, are assigned duty stations at the service centers.

Construction of four Type C Service Center buildings at locations and costs as indicated below, were constructed in 1953. The cost of these buildings is supported 100% with federal funds. It is planned to eventually centralize all service center activities in these four facilities.





LEGISLATION

THE MILITARY CODE OF IOWA Chapter 29, Code of Iowa, 1954

Chapter 29 of the Code of Iowa, 1954, is commonly referred to as the "Military Code of Iowa." This body of statute law provides the legal basis for the establishment, support and administration of the military forces of the State, as authorized by the Constitution of the United States, the State of Iowa, and pertinent federal rules and regulations. This statute further provides for the appointment, powers and duties of the Adjutant General, the Assistant Adjutant General, and the United States Property and Fiscal Officer, sets forth a Code of Military Justice for the State Military Forces, and charges the Adjutant General with responsibility for management and control of Camp Dodge Military Reservation as well as all other State Military facilities and installations.

The development of the statute law of Iowa pertaining to the Militia and the military forces of the state, from the first reference to the militia found in the "Laws of the Territory of Iowa, 1838-1839," has not kept pace with all the changes that have been taking place in the status of the National Guard as influenced by many federal laws and regulations. From time to time the Legislature of Iowa has acted to bring the Iowa laws relating to the Iowa National Guard into step with federal law, but the efforts have been piecemeal. The last serious effort to modernize the Military Code took place in 1934, when the 54th General Assembly repealed the prior Military Code, appearing in the Code of 1931 as Chapter 28, and endeavored to revise and modernize the military laws of the State. The revision of the National Defense Act, the passage of the Service Unification Act in 1947 and the Armed Forces Reserve Act of 1952, have indicated the necessity for a further modernization and revision of the Iowa Statutes.

House File 141 and Senate File 155 were identical bills introduced in the 55th General Assembly of the Legislature of Iowa early in the calendar year of 1953. The bills proposed to repeal Chapter 29, Code of Iowa, 1950, and enact a new military code in lieu thereof. The bill passed the Senate on February 11, 1953, and the Senate Bill passed the House on March 26, 1953, without a dissenting vote, and was signed by the Governor on April 2, 1953.

The Law became effective as of 4 July, 1953.

Following is a brief explanation of certain revisions in the new law intended to make the statute a more usable Military Code.

- a. The sections of the law were generally reorganized to provide continuity and logical organization.
 - Section I of the Code adds certain definitions.
- c. Changes in terminology will be found that conform to the present organization, equipment and federal laws and regulations pertaining to the services. For instance the new Code refers to anti-aircraft and air units which are now integral and important parts of the Iowa National Guard, and eliminates reference to cavalry units which no longer exist.
- d. Warrant officers are given the same powers and duties as officers, as provided by federal laws and regulations.
- e. Section 29.27 provides for payment of an additional \$3.00 a day to enlisted personnel, while in active state service in disaster or internal security duty. The previous law provided an additional \$1.00 per day in this situation.
- * Section 29.37 authorizes the Adjutant General to arrange for a blanket-type bond of all officers accountable for property, instead of individual bonds for each of such officers.
 - g. Sections 29.55 and 29.56 authorize the Adjutant General to pro-

vide personal liability insurance for guard personnel operating military vehicles and provides for the creation of a claims board for settlement of claims resulting from accidents involving the operation of military vehicles.

- h. Sections 29.62 through 29.81 provide a manual for courts martial for the Iowa National Guard when not in federal service. These diciplinary and courts martial provisions conform to federal laws and regulations as contained in the Code of Military Justice as revised in 1951.
- i Sections 29.83 through 29.91 contain authority for the creation of an "Iowa State Guard" in the event the Iowa National Guard is inducted into federal service in a national emergency.

FEDERAL LEGISLATION

During fiscal year 1953 the 82nd Congress enacted the following legislative measures of concern to the National Guard.

1. P.L. 461, 7 July, 1952. This law amended the Universal Military Training and Service Act to authorize the retention in active Federal service, beyond the 24-month period formerly authorized, of National Guard and Reserve unit designations and equipment, exclusive of the individual members thereof, for a total period of 5 years. The act further provides for the organization of National Guard cadre units comparable in structure to those units retained in active federal service, and for the integration of the retained units with the corresponding cadre units upon the formers release from active duty. To facilitate reference to these cadre units and distinguish them from the parent unit on active duty, they have been referred to by the National Guard Bureau and the Department of the Army as "NGUS" units.

2. P.L. 476, 9 July, 1952, cited as "The Armed Forces Reserve Act of 1951" established a Ready Reserve, limited to an aggregate strength of 1.5 millions and a Standby Reserve. The Ready Reserve can be activated during an emergency declared by the President but only in such numbers as specifically authorized by the Congress. This Act places all Guard units in the Ready Reserve.

The Act further provides for common Federal appointments and enlistments in the National Guard and the Army or Air Force Reserves, provided, of course, that membership in the National Guard is subject to the approval of the Governor of the State concerned. Maximum strength of the National Guard is to be authorized by the Congress or, in the absence of such authorization, fixed by the President. The National Guard will continue to be subject to "call" by the President as distinguished from "Order."

The Act further provides for initial and maintenance uniform allowances for officers and for annual leave for all personnel on active duty for training in excess of 30 days.

3. P.L. 488, 10 July, 1952. This was the Department of Defense Appropriation Act, 1953. This Act authorized free transportation of official mail matter by units and headquarters of the National Guard of the United States whether or not they are in the active service of the United States.

4. P.L. 84, 29 June, 1953 amended the Universal Military Training and Service Act to provide for special registration, classification, and induction of certain medical, dental and allied specialist categories.

During fiscal year 1954, the 83rd Congress, passed no legislation of major concern to the National Guard with the exception of the Department of Defense Appropriation Act (P.L. 179). P.L. 477 authorizing an active-duty status for United States property and fiscal officers passed both Houses of Congress but was not signed by the President until 6 July 1954.

STATE DUTY

NORTHWEST IOWA FLOOD

8 10 June, 1953

On 8 June, 1953, heavy rain in Northwestern Iowa caused flash floods on the Big Sioux, Little Sioux, Floyd and Ocheyedan Rivers, which caused sudden and extensive damage along their routes.

A total of 31 officers and 260 enlisted men were called out in aid to Civil Authorities from the following units of the Iowa National

Guard:

The National Guard Units used four amphibious vehicles and forty 21/2 6x6 trucks during the emergency. The estimated cost for salaries, subsistence, travel, equipment rental and miscellaneous items, \$10,596.41.

NATIONAL GUARD PARTICIPATION, DES MOINES RIVER FLOOD, 1954

On 22 June, 1954, under the command of Lt. Col. Harold K. Hensler, about 20 National Guardsmen were called to Active Duty for the purpose of aiding City Officials during the Flood Emergency.

On 23 June, 1954, 185 additional Guardsmen from 9 Army National

Guard Units in the Des Moines area were ordered to Duty.

On 24 June, 1954, an additional 200 men from 8 National Guard Units were called to Active Duty ..

The National Guard furnished 77,500 Sandbags to the City and 300

Cots, Blankets, and Mattresses to the Red Cross.

National Guard participation ranged from Crowd Control and Aid to City Police, General Guard duty, Medical Aid, Traffic Control Dike Guards, Motor vehicle drivers, and evacuation work, and were on duty from 22 through 26 June.

It is felt by this Headquarters that cooperation between the Guard

and City Officials was excellent at all times.







NATIONAL AND STATE GUARD FINANCIAL REPORT 1 JULY, 1952 TO 30 JUNE, 1953

The following is our Report of the Audit of the Records of the National and State Guard, for the period from 1 July, 1952 to 30 June, 1953. The Report consists of a Summary of Receipts and Disbursements, together with Exhibits "A" to "G," inclusive, with Supporting Schedules.

Salaries:

A separate appropriation by the 54th G.A. was made for salaries in the amount of \$128,080.00. There was a beginning balance as of July 1, 1952, of \$661.16. Transfers into the Salary fund, totalling \$26,500.00, plus cancelled warrant, \$92.90, added to the beginning balance, and appropriated amount, made a total of \$155,334.06 to be accounted for. Disbursements during the Audit period totalled \$155,334.06, thereby leaving no balance at the end of the Fiscal year.

Support and Maintenance of Armories:

A summary of the Transactions in this Division are reflected in Exhibit "B." Receipts consisted of a beginning balance of \$18,876.61, an appropriation of \$421,920.00, cancelled warrants amounting to \$2,035.02, and a transfer of \$2,028.06, totalling \$444,859.69 to be accounted for. In addition to the aforementioned receipts, the following were deducted from Expenditures:

Disbursements, together with transfers from Support and Maintenance of Armories Fund, totalled \$444,845.36, leaving a balance as of June 30, 1953, of \$14.33, which was reverted to the General Revenue Fund.

The State has a Contract to furnish Electricity for Lighting, and Pumping Water at Camp Dodge. These facilities are sold to Tenants living in State owned houses located on State Property, as well as the Hyperion Country Club. A number of homes located outside of the Camp, are also furnished Electricity. Monthly Statements are issued to customers, and the Receipts are remitted to the State Adjutant General. All receipts at Camp Dodge, were verified from records in the office of the Camp Superintendent.

The Federal Government, reimburses the State, for 75 per cent of the Maintenance costs of the Airports at Des Moines, Sioux City, and Fort Dodge, as well as Camp Dodge. The amount varies from year to year, and not all expense items are covered.

Headquarters Allowance made each Guard Unit, is fixed by the State Armory Board. Expenditures from this fund is limited to the Purchase of Office Supplies, Postage, Telephone Services, and any other specific purpose, authorized in writing in advance by the Adjutant General of Iowa.

Section 29-52, Code of Iowa, provides for the payment of Drill allowance, Per Capita, based on the average enlisted strength of each Guard Unit, during each Seminannual Period. Expenditures from this allowance are restricted to the purchase of articles, and payment of services, which contribute to the Welfare of the enlisted personnel, or Military efficiency of the Unit. A refund of Inaugural Expenses, amounting to \$1,515.80, was deducted from the Per Capita fund.

A seminannual report, in detail, is required of each officer receiving State funds, which is made to the Adjutant General, and covering

the Disbursement of these funds.

A spot-check was made of the seminannual reports on file in the office of the State Adjutant General, covering the disbursements of both Headquarters and Per Capita Allowances. The 34th Division Headquarters at Des Moines is summarized as follows:

Exhibit "C" details payments made by the State due to death and injury. Disbursements in the amount of \$1,374.30 were made to Burt J. Wolcott for pay and subsistence.

Aid to Civi! Authority:

Disbursements under Code Section 29.31 for Aid to Civil Authority is shown in Exhibit "D," and amounting to \$19,213.87. Cancelled warrants totalling \$161.89 left a net total of disbursements of \$19,051.98.

Camp Dodge Improvement Trust:

Transactions in the Camp Dodge Improvement Trust Fund, authorized under Section 29.46, Code of Iowa, are summarized in Exhibit "E." A beginning balance, 1 July, 1952, \$11,900.27 together with receipts of \$4,312.99, made a total of \$16,213.26 to account for. Disbursements totalling \$7,022.01 left a net balance as of 30 June, 1953, of \$9,191.25.

Armory Construction Fund:

Exhibit "F" details allocation by the Budget and Finance Control Commission, 5-53, for this fund. Balance 1 July, 1952 was \$117,420.00. Disbursements during the period, \$58,504.50, left a net balance, 30 June, 1953, of \$58,915.50, which was carried forward.

Airport Engineering Services:

The Budget and Finance Control Commission, as shown in Exhibit "G," allocated \$16,000.00 for Aiport Engineering Services. Disbursements totalling \$15,994.58, left a net balance, 30 June, 1953, of \$5.42, which was reverted to the Budget Finance and Control Commission.

General Comments:

During previous years, free housing was furnished to some State and Federal Men. This practice was discontinued during the Audit Period, and rent was collected, (\$1,385.00), which is included in rental fees shown in Exhibit "E."

Invoices and Salary Vouchers were on file to support all Disburse-

ments. A reconciliation was made with the Collector of Internal Revenue, and the Iowa Employment Security Commission, for money withheld for Federal Income Tax, and Iowa Old Age Security Insurance, respectively.

NATIONAL AND STATE GUARD FINANCIAL REPORT

1 July, 1953 to 30 June, 1954

The following is our report of the audit of the records of the National and State Guard for the period from 1 July, 1953 to 30 June, 1954. The report consists of a Summary of Receipts and Disbursements, together with Exhibits "A" to "H" inclusive and supporting schedules thereto.

Salaries:

The 55th G.A. appropriated \$358,210.00 in salaries for the biennium beginning 1 July, 1953 and ending 30 June, 1955. There was available from this appropriation, the amount of \$179,105.00 for the audit year, An additional allocation in the amount of \$67,000.00, was made by the Budget and Financial Control Committee to allow for this department employees, as all other state department employees, to be covered by the Federal Insurance Contribution Act and also the newly created Iowa Public Employees Retirement System. Transfers into the salary fund totaled \$52,700.00. A refund was received from the U.S. Government in the amount of \$4,865.91 to cover F.I.C.A. of Federal Employees employed at Camp Dodge. Cancelled warrants were added to the beginning balance in the amount of \$34.20, making a total balance to be accounted for of \$303,705.11. Disbursements during the period under review totaled \$236,696.51. Transfers to Support Control amounting to \$65,000.00 were made, leaving an unexpended balance of \$2,008.60 at 30 June, 1954.

Support and Maintenance of Armories:

A summary of the transactions in this division are reflected in Exhibit "B." No beginning balance was carried forward. Receipts consisted of an appropriation of \$420,895.00. Cancelled warrants amounting to \$1,316.44 and a transfer from Salary Control in the amount of \$65,000.00, totaling \$487,211.44 to be accounted for. In addition to the aforementioned receipts, the following were deducted from expenditures:

Disbursements, together with transfers from Support and Maintenance of Armories Fund, totaled \$476,267.54 leaving a balance as of 30 June, 1954 of \$10,943.90.

The State has a contract to furnish electricity for lighting and pumping water at Camp Dodge. The facilities are sold to tenants living in State owned houses located on State property, as well as the Hyperion Country Club. A number of homes located outside of Camp Dodge are also furnished electricity. Monthly statements are issued to customers and all receipts are remitted to the State Adjutant General. All receipts at Camp Dodge were verified from records in the office of the Camp Superintendent.

The Federal Government reimburses the State for 75 percent of the Maintenance cost of the various National Guard Airports located throughout the State. Seventy-five per cent of the cost of Camp Dodge is also reimbursed. The amounts vary from year to year and not all expenses are covered. A comparative Summary of Disbursements, not including Salaries, for the 1952-1953 and 1953-1954 fiscal years follows:

Travel expense in connection with National Guard duties is sum-

marized in Schedule "B-2" totaling \$16,707.79.

A detail of the expenses paid from the Contingent Fund, amounting

to \$858.13, can be found in Schedule "B-3."

Schedule "B-4" reflects the cost of maintenance of buildings and grounds at Camp Dodge. To more clearly present the entire maintenance cost in one Schedule, we are including Camp Dodge Improvement Trust in the following summary:

Receipts from the sale of electricity and water amounting to \$5,304.07 and sale of fuel oil and gas amounting to \$545.32 has been deducted fro mtheir respective costs, leaving a net balance as shown above.

Schedule "B-5" details the Rent and Maintenance cost for all Armories and Airports. Total amount disbursed was \$353,882.74. Receipts totaling \$59,815.11 were deducted leaving a Net Operating Cost of \$294,067.63.

Headquarters Allowance made each National Guard Unit is fixed by the State Armory Board. Expenditures from this fund is limited to purchase of office supplies, postage, telephone service and any other specific purpose authorized in writing in advance by the Adjutant General of Iowa.

Section 29-52, Code of Iowa, provides for the payment of drill allowance. Per Capita, based on the average enlisted strength of each National Guard Unit during each semi-annual period. Expenditures from this allowance are restricted to the purchase of articles and payment of service which contribute to the welfare of the enlisted personnel or military efficiency of the Unit.

A semi-annual report, in detail, is required of each officer receiving State funds. These reports are made to the Adjutant General and cover the disbursements of the above two funds.

A spot-check was made of the Semi-annual reports on file in the office of the State Adjutant General covering the disbursements of both Headquarters and Per Capita allowances.

Disbursements from Office Expense and Physical Examinations are shown in Schedules "B-7" and "B-8."

Compensation for Services-Death and Injury:

Exhibit "C" details payments made by the State due to death and injury. Disbursements in the amount of \$1,384.20 were made to Joseph A. Noonan, Iowa City, Iowa.

Aid to Civil Authority:

Disbursements under Code Section 29.31 aid to Civil Authority is shown in Exhibit "D" and amounted to \$20,551.77. Cancelled warrants totaling \$38.86 left a net total of disbursements of \$20,512.91.

Camp Dodge Improvement Trust:

Transactions in the Camp Dodge Improvement Trust Fund, authorized under Section 29.46 Code of Iowa, are summarized in Exhibit "E." A beginning balance on 1 July, 1953 of \$9,191.25 together with receipts of \$7,284.74 made a total of \$16,475.99 to account for. Disbursements of \$15,947.66 left a net balance of 30 June, 1954 of \$528.33.

B and F CC 1-55

Alterations in and Additions to Armory Buildings:

A beginning balance as of 1 July, 1953 was \$45,750.00. Disbursements to various Armories for alterations in and additions to these buildings amounted to \$45,577.79 leaving a balance as of 30 June, 1954 of \$172.21. Exhibit "F" summarizes this account.

B and F CC 3-55

Armory Construction Fund:

This budget and Financial Control Committee on October 2, 1953 made available to Adjutant Generals office the amount of \$77,750.00 for the Construction of Armories. On 29 June, 1954 they made an additional grant to this fund in the amount of \$183,000.00 on transfer order No. 15-55. Disbursements during the audit period amounted to \$35,178.90 leaving a balance as of 30 June, 1954 in the amount of \$225,571.10. This account is summarized in Exhibit "G."

General Comments:

During the Course of the audit your examiners suggested that it had been some time since Joseph Noonan had been examined by a Medical Board. This Board was thereby assembled and determined that Mr. Noonan is permanently disabled. Therefore the State Liability under Section 29.21 Code 1954, Compensation for Services, Death and Injury, shall continue indefinitely.

New records have been set up to show the Amortization of the various Loans on Armory Buildings. With these records it will be possible to Exhibit the actual conditions of these Loans in future reports.

Invoices and Salary Vouchers were on file to support all Disbursements.

FACILITIES AND CONSTRUCTION PROGRAM IOWA NATIONAL GUARD, ARMY AND AIR

II. 1 JULY 1953 THROUGH 30 JUNE 1954:

A. Status of Federal Assistance to the Iowa National Guard During Fiscal Biennium 1952-1954:

39. Definite increase in the field of Federal assistance to the Iowa National Guard for armory and non-armory construction took place during the biennium beginning 1 July, 1952 and ending 30 June, 1954. As has been explained previously, the 81st Congress enacted Public Law 783 in 1951, which authorized Federal assistance for the construction and procurement of armories and other facilities for the Reserve components of the Armed Forces. The Congress appropriated funds for this purpose for the first time in the Department of Defense Appropriation Act for Fiscal Year 1952. Due to procedural difficulties, the funds appropriated for this purpose were not released by the Bureau of the Budget to the Chief of the National Guard Bureau until the summer 1952 and consequently the program was not implemented until early in fiscal year 1953.

40. Each State was advised as to the precise share of the FY 1953 funds which were made available for the armory construction program and each state was further advised to prepare and submit priority reports of desired projects and also submit plans in accordance with procedures outlined in current Army Facilities and Construction Bulletins published by the National Guard Bureau.

41. The National Guard Bureau developed standard plans for 1-unit, 2-unit, and Type 'Z' plans for small units armories but each State was permitted to develop its own individual plans, to meet its particular requirements, and these in turn were reviewed by the Bureau under the general criteria governing construction of armories with Federal assistance. This criteria provided specific limitations on the size of armories in terms of square footage, while the methods of construction, materials to be used and ornamentation and trimmings were worked out on a per case basis as plans were submitted to the Bureau.

42. The State of Iowa developed plans for 1, 2 and 3 unit armories which have proven acceptable to the National Guard Bureau, under the indicated criteria, and which it is believed offer the greatest utilitarian value, as armories, under the particular circumstances prevalent in the State.

43. 28 May 1952, the necessary agreement between the National Guard Bureau and the State of Iowa (DA-13-035-NG-13), was executed and duly approved by the Attorney General of Iowa. This agreement was designed as a Master Agreement to cover all funds contributed to the State for construction under the provisions of Sec. 3 (c) of P.L. 783, 81st Congress. Pursuant to this agreement the State of Iowa undertook responsibility for all engineering and construction.

44. Section 3 (c) of the Act specifically authorized contribution to the States of 75% of the cost of armories approved under the criteria, title to vest in the State upon acceptance. This particular authorization is premised upon the admitted obligation of the Federal Government to assist States in "acquisition, construction, expansion, rehabilitation, or conversation by the State of such additional facilities as (the Sec'y. of Defense) shall determine to have been made essential by any increase in strength of the National Guard of the United States of the Air National Guard of the United States." This authorization is to be distinguished from that in Section 3(b), wherein the justification is premised upon 'joint-utilization' by all components of the Armed Forces. It will be recalled that in formulating policies with reference to reorganization of the National Defense structure, following World War II, the War Department assigned the National Guard a mission

as an integral part and a first line reserve component of the Army of the United States as set forth in "War Department Policies relating to Post War National Guard," approved by the Secretary of War on 13 October, 1945, and wherein the following assumption is set forth:

"(3) When the requirements for a balanced force in the Army of the United States necessitates the allocation to a State of troops or equipment, the housing or storage of which would impose an inequitable burden upon the State or Territory, such allocation will be made with the understanding that the Federal Government will contribute its equitable share of the Expense of constructing and maintaining the necessary facilities."

This assumed obligation is reflected in the following terms of the

agreement:

"WHEREAS, the Secretary of Defense has determined to be necessary the acquisition, construction, expansion, rehabilitation or conversion by said State of additional facilities that have been made essential by increase in strength of the National Guard of the United States or the Air National Guard of the United States pursuant to Secretary of Defense Policy letter 800.09-2, 17 October 1951: * * *

and

"WHEREAS, it has been determined by the State that 'joint-utilization' of this proposed facility within the meaning of Sec. 7 (d) of the National Defense Facilities Act of 1950 (64 Stat 829) is impracticable."

B. Logistical Support Facilities:

45. Lt. Av'n (Army) Maintenance Pool (Boone):

a. The Lt Av'n (Army) Maintenance Pool facilities, Boone, Iowa, were improved during the summer of 1953 by the addition of a concrete apron and floor for the hangar at a cost of \$16,440.31 (DA-13-035-NG-19) the cost of which was supported by 100 per cent federal funding with R&U Funds.

b. Plans and specifications for a new additional maintenance shop and hangar for the Light Aviation (Army) Maintenance Pool at Boone, were approved in May, 1954, and the National Guard Bureau

allocated \$39,00.00 for this project.

46. Camp Dodge Military Reservation:

a. Utilities: Installation of a natural gas system in Camp Dodge Military Reservation was commenced in June, 1953, and was completed in January, 1954. The cost of extension of the System into the Reservation and to the logistical support facilities within the Reservation was supported by 100% federal (R&U) funding in the amount of \$23,589.63, and the Cost of extension of the system into State facilities was funded with Departmental funds in the amount of \$18,263.41. 3600 feet of excavation for the system was accomplished with state labor and equipment at an estimated cost of \$1440.00.

b. UPS&DO & Maintenance Facilities:

(1) Dustproofing of the instrument repair shop and remodelling and fireproofing of the paint shop was commenced in the spring of 1954 and the cost, in the amount of \$6,676.75, was supported 100% by R&U Funds (DA-13-035-NG-42).

(2) Additional steel storage shelving for the USP&DO warehouse was procured during the spring of 1954 at a cost of \$1,996.69,

supported 100% by federal R&U funds.

47. Service Center, Type C:

(1) Construction of the following Type C Service Centers, at

locations and cost as indicated, was authorized in 1953 in order to provide ordnance maintenance facilities in the field in augmentation of the facilities provided by the Maintenance Shops at Camp Dodge:

Cost of the Service Centers is supported 100% with federal funds.

C. Army National Guard:

- 48. Upon execution of the State agreement with the National Guard Bureau (DA-13-035-NG-13) (See Par. 43 above). The Adjutant General of Iowa advised the Chief, National Guard Bureau that \$125,000.00 had been made available by the Budget & Fiscal Control Committee of the State of Iowa for the 25% matching funds required of the State for authorized construction under P.L. 783.
- a. Clarinda, Keokuk and Webster City: The first three 'Priority' projects requested consisted of 1-unit armories to be constructed at Clarinda, Keokuk and Webster City at an estimated cost of \$300,000.00. On the basis of submission of satisfactory evidence of site titles in the State of Iowa and approved plans and specifications \$213,712.82 was allocated by the National Guard to the State of Iowa as 75% of the cost of the three projects. The State matching funds in the amount of \$72,237.66 were made available by the Budget and Financial Control Committee and the three projects were completed in 1953 at costs indicated below:

b. Algona, Centerville, Cherokee, Eagle Grove, Estherville, Muscatine: In September of 1953 contract DA-13-035-NG-29 was executed providing for the expansion and conversion of motor vehicle storage buildings located at Algona, Centerville, Cherokee, Eagle Grove, Estherville, and Muscatine (See par. 18, above) into 1-unit armories \$229,655.88 was allocated to the State by the National Guard Bureau, matched by \$76,551.96 in State funds. The six projects were completed in April of 1954 as costs indicated below:

- c. **Humboldt**: In November of 1953 the National Guard Bureau allocated \$27,009.00 to the State, to be matched by \$9,003.00 in State funds, for rehabilitation and conversion of the Humboldt Armory. This was a state owned armory, having been a hemp plant conveyed to the State by the War Assets administration, for armory purposes, in April of 1949, considerable conversion and rehabilitation was needed, however, to provide an adequate armory. The project was completed in the spring of 1954 at a cost of \$36,012.00 (Contract #DA-13-035-NG-33).
- d. **Hampton**: Contract #DA-12-035-NG-40 was executed 24 March 1954, for construction of a 1-unit armory at Hampton at a cost of \$92,400.00 of which the National Guard Bureau allocated \$69,300.00 to the State and the State furnished \$23,100.00.
- e. Oelwein: Contract #DA-13-035-NG-39 was executed 24 March 1954 providing for the construction of a 1-unit armory at Oelwein. The

National Guard Bureau allocated \$74,130.00 to the State and the State matched this amount with \$24,710.00, the total cost to be \$98,840.00.

- f. A project for expansion and rehabilitation of the Red Horse Armory, Des Moines, has been approved by the National Gurad Bureau at an estimated cost of \$250,000.00. It is planned to create an 8-unit armory of this State owned facility.
- 49. The completely state-supported armory procurement program, based upon private funding by local non-profit armory corporations and long-term purchase option type leases with the Armory Board for the State of Iowa, wherein the annual rental is determined by amortization requirements to liquidate the local corporation's obligation and the title to the facilities will rest in the State upon expiration of the leases or liquidation of the obligations and exercise of the options by the State, whichever occurs, first, received considerable impetus during the years 1953 and 1954.
- a. Atlantic: The existing 1-unit armory facility at Atlantic was purchased for \$35,000.00 and expanded and rehabiltated at a cost of \$40,000.00 in the spring of 1954.
- b. Burlington: The existing 2-unit armory facility was purchased for \$55,000.00 and remodelled at a cost of \$38,258.00, in 1953.
- c. Davenport: The existing facility, consisting of an administrative type building remaining after the armory had been destroyed by fire, was purchased for \$40,000.00, and an adjoining armory was constructed at a cost of \$112,975.00 in 1953. The resulting facility consisted of an adequate 3-unit armory.
- d. Fort Dodge: A new 3-unit armory was constructed, on land conveyed by the City of Ft. Dodge, at a cost of \$150,000.00. It is expected that the project will be completed by 1 July, 1954.
- e. Iowa Falls: An existing building, located three miles West of Iowa Falls, was purchased for \$32,210.00 and remodelled at a cost of \$32,790.00, providing an excellent 1-unit armory.
- f. **Jefferson:** The existing armory facility was purchased for \$21,500.00 and remodelled at a cost of \$13,500.00 providing an adequate 1-unit armory.
- g. Mason City: An existing building was purchased for \$52,500.00 and was remodelled and rehabilitated into a 3-unit armory at a cost of \$106,500.00.
- h. Mt. Pleasant: The existing 1-unit armory was damaged by fire in October of 1952, and from insurance proceeds of \$16,579.00 and additional financing in the amount of \$26,000.00, the structure was rebuilt and expanded.
- i. Oskaloosa: The existing armory facility, remodelled and rehabilitated at a cost of \$47,160.00, was procured from the Oskaloosa Armory Corporation on a purchase-option type lease on the basis of amortization of an obligation of \$97,160.00 over a twenty year period at which time title will pass to the State.
- j. Red Oak: A new 1-unit armory was constructed, on land conveyed by the City of Red Oak, at a cost of \$104,500.00.

k. Villisca: The existing 1-unit armory facility was purchased for \$35,000.00 and remodelled and rehabilitated at a cost of \$26,768.72.

1. Waterloo-Cedar Falls: A new 3-unit armory was constructed at the Waterloo Airport, midway between Waterloo and Cedar Falls, on land conveyed by the City of Waterloo, at a cost of \$160,000.00. Armories at Waterloo and Cedar Falls, respectively, had been leased, and the leases were cancelled as of 1 July, 1954, the Waterloo and Cedar Falls garrisons being combined into one garrison and housed at the newly constructed armory.

D. Air National Guard Facilities:

51. Des Moines Air National Guard Base (Des Moines Municipal Airport):

The facilities of the Des Moines Air National Guard Base, located at the North end of the Des Moines Municipal Airport, Des Moines, Iowa, were augmented by several important construction projects, all funded 100% with federal fiscal support, during the fiscal years 1953 and 1954:

- a. Roadways and Parking Area: Contract #DA-13-035-NG-10 was executed 25 June, 1951, providing for much needed extension and hard surfaced of the roadways and parking area within the base. This project was completed in April of 1953 at a cost of \$45,944.78.
- b. Extension of NW-SE Runway: Conversion of the 132d Ftr-Bmr Wing of the Iowa Air National Guard from SE to Jet Aircraft, upon the return of the Wing from active federal service, in the winter of 1952-53. required extension of the runways 1800 lineal feet to a total length of 7500 lineal feet. The project, under Contract #DA-13-035-NG-14, provided 1800 lineal feet of 150' concrete runway and 3400 lineal feet of 75' taxiway at a cost of \$1,082,864.47 supported by federal funds. The cost of engineering services for the project was supported by the State of Iowa at a cost of \$18,096.70. The necessary additional land was provided by the City of Des Moines and relocation of certain streets and roads was supported by Polk County.
- c. An additional 8.700 feet of five foot chain link fencing was required for security of the ANG Base and the extended runway. This was procured though Contract #DA-13-035-NG-15 in November of 1952 at a cost of \$8,684.00, supported from federal funds.
- d. In the spring of 1953 the hangar and warehouse was repainted at a cost of \$2,709.67 (Contract #DA-13-035-NG-20).
- e. Conversion of the 132d Ftr-Bmr Wing to Jet Aircraft required the construction of additional JP fuel handling system. This was accomplished during the winter of 1953-54 at a cost of \$31,333.26 through Contract #DA-13-035-NG-21.
- f. The base facilities were augmented, during the winter of 1953-54, by construction of a motor service shop costing \$64,212.15, through Contract DA-13-035-NG-23.
- g. Construction of a crash-truck station was authorized in June of 1953, through Contract #DA-13-035-NG-25, at a cost of \$43,899.91, for housing fire, crash and rescue equipment.
- h. Additional paving for the base was authorized 5 June, 1953. through Contract #DA-13-035-NG-26, providing for 8,200 sq. yards of flexible bituminous pavement at a cost of \$31,066.00.
- 52. During the period of active federal service of the 132d Ftr-Bmr Wing, Central Air Defense Command took over the entire Base Facilities of The Sioux City Municipal Airport, Sergeant Bluffs, Iowa, and upon return of the Wing it was necessary to negotiate with CAD for facilities for the 174th Ftr-Bmr Squadron, on a joint-usage contract.
- a. During the spring of 1954 a project for conversion of the heating facilities was authorized under Contract #DA-13-035-NG-35, at a cost of \$2,819.50.
- b. Contract #DA-13-035-NG-36, executed in the spring of 1954, provided rehabilitation of buildings #923 and 924, for ANG use, at a cost of \$7,187.00.

53. Facilities for the 133d AC&W Flt., located at Ft. Dodge, will be made available in a new armory under construction at that station, and will be ready for occupancy early in July, 1954. Additional warehousing will be constructed at this station for utilization by the AC&W Flt.

CIVILIAN PERSONNEL PROGRAM

National Guard civilian personnel are employees authorized under the provisions of Section 90, National Defense Act, for administrative and accounting duties, maintenance and repair, inspection of materials armament, vehicles, and equipment provided for the National Guard and used solely for military purposes. The secretary of the Army and the Secretary of the Air Force has delegated to the Adjutant General the authority to employ, fix rates of pay, established duties and work hours (a minimum of 40 hours per week), supervise and discharge employees within the purview of appropriate regulations and such instructions as may be issued by the Chief, National Guard Bureau.

National Guard Civilian personnel are considered to be employees of the State although paid from federal funds appropriated for the National Guard, (21 Comp. Gen. Dec. 305). Such employees are, however, covered under the 'United States Employee's Compensation Law' for injuries or death sustained while in the performance of their

prescribed duties.

National Guard Civilian Personnel are dividede into the following

categories:

Administrative Assistants are federally recognized officers, warrant officers or enlisted men employed as civilians to act as civilian administrative assistants to commanders or heads of activities in the performance of such duties, responsibilities and administrative matters for which the commanders or heads of activities are responsible or may be required to perform.

Accounting clerks are male or female civilian employees authorized by law for accounting and property custodial duties in the office of

the United States Property and Fiscal Officer.

Maintenance personnel are federally recognized officers, warrant officers and enlisted men of the National Guard employed as civilian supervisors, mechanics, technicians and general maintenance personnel who work in or from fixed shops, concentration sites or service centers, to include the army aviation maintenance pool, under the supervision of shop or pool supervisors and under the general supervision of the State Maintenance Officer. They are responsible for the concentration, inspection, repair, and reconditioning of equipment pertaining to National Guard organizations.

Administrative, supply and maintenance technicians are warrant officers or enlisted men employed as civilians to assist company or battery commanders in the performance of all administrative, supply organizational matters for which the commander is responsible, or may

be required to perform.

Air National Guard Civilian personnel are federally recognized officers or airmen of the Air National Guard employed to effect maximum efficiency in administration, supply, operations, training and maintenance of the Air National Guard.

The National Guard (Army & Air) Civilian Personnel Program in

Iowa is established on the following pattern:

TRAINING

During Fiscal year 1953 and 1954, Army National Guard training continued to stress individual and small unit (Squad and platoon) tactics and operations. All training was conducted in accordance with National Guard Training Programs published by Army field forces and was evaluated by inspecting officers of the active army. Distribution of a new Army training program was begun in fiscal year 1954, scheduled for completion by Army field forces and is designed to fit the needs of the active army, the Army National Guard and other units of the Army Reserve. Subject schedules to support the new programs are in process of completion and distributions are scheduled over an approximate two year period. A revised and simplified version of National Guard Bureau Form 68 "Record of Individual Training" was distributed during fiscal year 1954 for use with the training program. The number of units rates satisfactory or better, by active Army inspectors, has been consistently increasing, and effectiveness of training is further reflected in continued upward trend in percentage of participation in both armory and field training.

ARMORY TRAINING

Armory training consists of 48 assemblies of a minimum duration of two hours each. During fiscal year 1954, however, a change was made in the normal conduct of armory drills, made necessary because of lack of funds to provide pay for supplementary week-end drills. Since subsistence at the rate of eighty cents per individual for each of eight hour periods, is provided authority was granted to utilize six of the regular armory drill periods for week-end outdoor training. Six additional drills would have been desirable, but good results were achieved through the furnishing of subsistence, to permit utilization of longer training periods.

Participation in armory drills continued at a high level.

FIELD TRAINING

Field Training is the culmination of the training year. Fifteen days, including travel time, authorizes and permits commanders, assembled with their staffs, to conduct training not possible in armory training.

The Army elements of the Iowa National Guard train at two field training sites. The 113th AAA Bn trained at Camp Haven, Wisconsin, where firing at aerial targets is possible at Camp Haven, Wisconsin, NG, the Ordnance Cos, and the 34th Division, less the 113th AAA Bn, trained at Camp McCoy, Wisconsin in 1953, and at Camp Ripley, Minnesota in 1954.

Field training inspections were conducted by teams of officers of the active army, detailed for this purpose by the Commanding General of Fifth Army. These instructors spent the entire fifteen day period with the troops and all units were rated on their performance. An increasingly greater number of units were rated Excellent and Superior.

AIR NATIONAL GUARD

Biennial Training Narrative for Period Ending 30 June 1954. 132d Fighter Bomber Wing, Iowa ANG

This report including all of the Iowa units of this wing originates on 1 January 1953, the date the wing reverted to state status.

During the six month period ending 30 June 1953 all efforts were directed toward reorganization, conversion to jet aircraft and transitional training of pilots and ground crew alike.

Strength wise, as of 30 June 1953, there were 72 officers and 547 airmen assigned. Flying was limited to less than 200 hours per month with possessed tactical aircraft of 3 F-51's per squadron.

Formal service school training included 34 airmen attending the basic training course at Lackland AFB, Texas. Our first two Pilot Trainees reported for pilot training in Aug. 1953, which was the beginning of an aggressive pilot training program.

Progress paralleled the times during the next six month period. The wing received ten (10) F-80's per squadron, and, in spite of transitional problems, the wing participated in the Air National Guard aerial Gunnery meet at Boise, Idaho, in October, 1953.

As of 30 June, 1954, this period displayed further advances.

Even though the F-80's were returned to the depot for modification during this period, the wing was flying over 550 hours per month. Assigned strength increased to 97 officers and 751 airmen. By this time there were sixteen aviation cadets actually undergoing pilot training at different Air Force Bases throughout the country.

As an added incentive the wing was given a mobilization assignment with the Air Defense Command.

Plans were being made for the most successful Field Training Exercises in the history of the Iowa Air National Guard.

A total of twenty-one (21) officers and airmen attended Air Force Service School during this period.

From 1 January, 1953, to 30 June, 1954 was a period of reorganization of the wing starting from "scratch," included a period of transitional training of pilots and indoctrination of ground crews from reciprocal type aircraft to jets.

The difficulties involved with the F-80 aircraft included return to the Depot for modification because of materiel failures within their engines. In fact on 30 June, each tactical squadron had only four (4) F-80's in their possession.

HISTORY OF THE 133d AC&W FLIGHT

(1 June, 1952 to 1 July, 1954)

On 1 June, 1952, the 133d Aircraft Control and Warning Flight, composed of 300 personnel, was on Active Duty with the Regular Air Force. The Flight was ordered to Active Duty on 1 November, 1951, for a 24 month period. The unit was stationed at the Fort Dodge, Iowa, Municipal Airport (Eno Airport) on Highway 20, approximately 3 miles east of Fort Dodge, and Detachment "A" of the organization, at Cedar Rapids, Iowa, on 1 November, 1951. The unit was next stationed at Alexandria Air Force Base, Louisiana. The majority of the personnel were at Alexandria AFB by 15 December, 1951. Training of personnel at Alexandria was extremely limited, at the start, due to the shortage of Radar and Communications equipment. The Base was in need of housing, sidewalks, Storage Buildings, and many other items essential to a Military Base. The personnel of the unit were detailed to build the large Butler Buildings, sidewalks, and other units. In approximately 2 months the base was decidedly beginning to form, and military and technical training commenced. Various specialty schools were organized for the personnel of the 157th Tactical Control Group, of which this unit participated. Our Operations personnel worked short shifts of duty (one) CPS-6 site and (one) small TPS-1D located on the outskirts of the base. The time spent in this type of training was very limited due to the great number of operations personnel, not only in this unit, but in the 5 other Aircraft Control and Warning Squadrons which were located at Alexandria Air Force Base. By January 1954 there was only approximately one-tenth of the personnel that originally went on EAD with the unit, still remaining. Most of the men were assigned with Squadrons of the 507th Tactical Control Group, in New Mexico, North and South Carolina, where a great deal of operational training was received, due to organized sites being maintained. This was terminated suddenly as most of the personnel were released from EAD 4to 6 months after this change. Many of our personnel were shipped out to oversea area and to other ZI bases within Tactical Air Command. A great percentage of the unit participated in "Exercise Longhorn," a joint maneuver in Texas, between the various Armed Forces. On 31 October, 1953, the unit was released from Active Duty and returned to the control of the State of Iowa. During the period of active duty many of our personnel were granted early releases, and on 1 July, 1953, the state organized the "8246th Air Base Squadron" which was composed of personnel of the unit who had received early releases from Active Duty. The 8246th AB Sq. was small in number of personnel, however, it was very well utilized as a receiving center for the personnel being released from EAD on and after 1 July, 1953. On 31 October, 1953, the 8246th Air Base Squadron, was discontinued and the 133d Aircraft Conrtol and Warning Flight reorganized the next day. Detachment "A" of our unit, at Cedar Rapids, Iowa, was also reorganized, and individual specialty training began on a large scale. Many of the original personnel were lost from the organization. Some remained on Active Duty with the Air Force, some were lost to the service but remained in the state where last assigned, and only a very small minority teturned to the unit. Recruiting was the main project as we had only 3 Officers and 39 Airmen as of 1 November 1953. Recruiting was hazardous at that time as most of the old personnel who had returned were very reluctant to return to military service be it reserve or other type, due to their last tour of EAD. However by 30 June. 1954, the recruiting seemed better and the organization was up to 9 Officers and 79 Airmen. The unit remained at the Eno Airport in Fort Dodge and was very much handicapped by the poor facilities offered there. However on 1 July, 1954, a new building, for the unit, was being built and the enthusiasm and morale of our personnel was very high.
