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SECTION A

WORK INJURIES

WORK INJURIES

Introduction

It is the policy of the State of Iowa that every employer shall furnish and maintain a safe place for employees to work. These places are to be constructed, equipped, arranged, operated and maintained so as to provide reasonable and adequate protection for the lives, health and safety of all persons working there or frequenting the area.

Inherent in the goal of maintaining a safe place to work is the objective of accident prevention. Accident prevention consists of finding and correcting hazards which may lead to accidents. Injury and accident statistics play a large role in accident prevention because the ability to recognize hazards comes from a knowledge of the kinds of hazards or safety violations which have caused injuries in the past. In other words, the more we know about accidents which have already happened, the better able we will be to recognize health and safety hazards when we see them.

Injury and accident statistics indicate the areas in which safety activities need to be intensified. From them we can pinpoint problems which must be solved and identify so-called "target" industries or occupations in which to center our efforts. They also measure the success or failure of these efforts.

According to the Iowa Code, an employer must keep a record of any accident that results in the death of an employee or in an injury that "will or probably may" prevent an employee from returning to work within two days. This record shall at all times be open to inspection by an inspector of the Bureau of Labor. The law further provides that within forty-eight hours after such an accident the employer forward to the Commissioner of Labor a written report of the injury. The "Employers Work Injury Report" is used for this purpose.

The quality and usefulness of any statistics analyzing injuries or accidents, or both, or any safety program based upon such statistics depends upon the quality of the original work injury reports. If these reports are incomplete, biased, or otherwise deficient, the analysis made from them will be equally deficient.

The most effective report form for analysis purposes is that in which an employer or his representative is asked to describe the accident in his own words as completely as possible and then supply certain details which are essential to the analysis. The Bureau of Labor's Form Number L-1, "Employers Work Injury Report," meets these criteria.

Each report is always about a single accident or injury. Accidents that result in multiple injuries require a separate report for each individual injured. Basically, the report tells the whole story of the accident--what happened; where and when it happened; who was hurt and what kind of an injury he received; what materials or equipment were involved; what persons were involved; and what was being done when the accident happened. When properly prepared, a report tells what hazards caused a particular accident and therefore should be corrected in order to avoid similar accidents.

Because it is the employer who is obligated to prepare the work injury reports it is to his benefit to recognize that the information supplied by him contributes to the stated objective of accident prevention--accident prevention not only on his own premises but in all places of employment generally.

Records, however, are no substitute for accident prevention. But, accident records are indispensible aids for accident prevention. It is the goal of the Bureau of Labor to strive to work together with employers to create a safe environment in which to work. The employers' continued cooperation in maintaining and supplying complete and accurate records will insure that we can continue to use the past as a guide to the future in accident prevention.

Reported Disabling Injuries

During the 1969-1970 biennium, 14,176 disabling work injuries were reported to the Bureau of Labor. Of these, 5,812 were reported in 1969 and 8,364 in 1970. What may at first appear as a substantial over-the-year increase in injuries was in reality the result of a lag in coding while converting to the latest revision of the "U. S. A. Standard Method of Recording and Measuring Work Injury Experience" due to a change in the administration of the Bureau of Labor. A comparison of the last seven months of 1969 with the same period of 1970 (see Table 6) reveals that there was little difference in the number of reported injuries reported during comparable periods of each year--4,927 during July through December of 1969 and 4,887 during the same months of 1970.

By far the most common type of injury sustained in both 1969 and 1970 was sprains or strains. This category accounted for about 32 percent of the total reported disabling injuries during the biennium. Cuts, lacerations or punctures were the next most common injuries, representing 16.8 percent of the total in 1969 and 17.2 percent in 1970. Injuries characterized by contusion, crushing or bruise represented 14.8 percent of the total in 1969 and 14.2 percent in 1970. Fractures were sustained in about 12 percent of the reported cases each year.

The part of a person's body most frequently affected by injuries was the trunk. The trunk was directly affected in nearly one-third of the cases reported. Over 21 percent of the injuries sustained, when distributed by the part of the body affected, were to the back. This is a direct result of the large number of strains suffered. The upper extremities, particularly the fingers, were the next most commonly affected body parts. Disabling injuries to the lower extremities were reported in 24.6 percent of the cases in 1969 and in 23 percent of the cases in 1970.

Working surfaces, surfaces in use as supports for people, were the most common agency associated with the reported injuries. These accounted for 18.5 percent of the injuries in 1969 and 19 percent in 1970. Vehicles directly caused about one out of every ten injuries in 1969 and 1970. Metal items; machines; boxes, barrels and other containers; and unpowered hand tools also produced or inflicted a significant number of the reported injuries. The most prevalent kind of accident was one caused by being struck by an object. Overexertion was the next most common type of lost-time accident. Falls, either from an elevation or on the same level, represented 17.5 percent of the accidents in 1969 and 1970.

By far the greatest number of disabling work injuries suffered during the biennium occurred in the manufacturing industries. Manufacturing workers suffered 9,133 reported injuries--64.4 percent of the total--during the 1969-1970 period. However, manufacturing workers represented only onefourth of the total nonfarm employment in the state. The second largest number of disabling injuries, 1,496 or 10.6 percent of the total, was sustained by state and local government employees. Government employment represents nearly one-fifth of the nonfarm total and includes school employees, employees in state institutions, local fire and police employees as well as general administrative workers. The contract construction industries, representing 4.7 percent of the employment, had 724 injuries--5.1 percent of the total.

The greatest majority of the injuries, over 96 percent, were of a temporary nature. However, 1.3 percent of the reported cases resulted in the death of the employee. (The following section on work related deaths provides a more detailed analysis of the fatalities sustained in Iowa during the 1969-1970 biennium.) In addition, 364 of the injuries, 2.6 percent of the total, resulted in permanent partial disability to the worker. A permanent partial disability is one which results in the loss, or complete loss of use, of any member or part of a member of the body, or in the permanent impairment of functions of the body or any of its parts.

NOTES

Work injuries are classified according to the <u>Standard Method of Recording and</u> <u>Measuring Work Injury Experience</u>, approved by the United States of America Standards Institute, now the American National Standards Institute, in 1967.

The injuries shown in the tables include all classes of disabling work injuries reported to the Bureau of Labor. A work injury is one which arises out of and in the course of a person's employment. A disabling work injury is a work injury which results in death, permanent impairment, or temporary-total disability. The term "injury" includes occupational diseases.

Industry classification conforms to the definitions of the <u>Standard Industrial</u> <u>Classification Manual</u>, 1967 Edition, prepared by the Office of Statistical Standards of the U. S. Bureau of the Budget.

All classes of employees (production, operating, and related workers; construction workers; sales, service, delivery, technical, professional, office, administrative, clerical and all other personnel) are included in the injuries totals. Self-employed persons, however, are not included.

Government totals shown include injuries for state and local government workers only. Federal employees are excluded. SECTION B

WORK RELATED DEATHS

WORK RELATED DEATHS

There were 191 work related deaths reported to the Bureau of Labor as having occurred during the 1969-1970 biennium. Of these, 86 happened in 1969 and 105 in 1970. On the average, 1 out of every 10,000 workers in Iowa was killed while on the job. Most of those killed were men. However, there were 3 fatal injuries sustained by women in 1970: two in manufacturing and 1 in trade.

The average age of the persons suffering fatal work injuries in 1969 was just over 38 years. The youngest worker killed in 1969 was 16 years old and the oldest was 81 years of age. In 1970, the average age of the fatal cases was $39\frac{1}{2}$, with the ages of the deceased ranging from 15 to 84.

One out of every 3 deaths reported during the biennium occurred in the contract construction industries. There were 26 construction deaths in 1969 and 38 in 1970. Manufacturing deaths accounted for 23 percent of the total with 22 fa-talities having been reported each year.

During the biennium, 11.5 percent of the total number of fatalities were sustained by government employees. Twenty-two state and local government workers died while on the job in 1969 and 1970. Of these, 10 were State employees, 6 were employed by cities or towns, 5 were county workers and 1 was a school district employee. These unfortunate statistics indicate that government employment is not as devoid of hazards as it is generally thought to be. Motor vehicle accidents, being struck by an object and heart attacks suffered while on the job were the most prevalent causes of the fatalities suffered by government employees. Highway and road maintenance workers accounted for the greater part of the total number of work related deaths in 1969 and 1970.


Motor-vehicle accidents were the cause of over 18 percent of the deaths in 1969 and 1970. Falls from high places caused a total of 31, or just over 16 percent, of the fatal injuries during the biennium. However, of the 31 fatal falls, 25 occurred in 1970 compared to only 6 in 1969. The next most common cause of on-the-job deaths was crushing of the individual. This was closely followed by electrocutions. Fatal heart attacks while on the job were suffered by 12 persons during the biennium.

All work related deaths were investigated by the Bureau of Labor's Field Safety Technicians. Job-site inspections were conducted and recommendations made, or charges filed, as the circumstances warranted. A review of the reports of the Iowa Highway Patrol, Department of Public Safety, was made whenever accidents occurred on the public highways and an inspector from the Bureau of Labor was unable to reach the site before the area was cleared.

The following tables and descriptions of the work related deaths that occurred in Iowa emphasize a need for greater safety consciousness among Iowa's employers and workers. It is intended that an awareness of the problems be a guide toward preventing needless fatalities in the future.
