INTRODUCTION

It is the policy of the State of Iowa that every employer shall furnish and maintain a safe place for employees to work. These places are to be constructed, equipped, arranged, operated and maintained so as to provide reasonable and adequate protection for the lives, health and safety of all persons working there.

Inherent in the goal of maintaining a safe place to work is the objective of accident prevention. Accident prevention consists of finding and correcting hazards which may lead to accidents. Injury and accident statistics play a large role in accident prevention because the ability to recognize hazards comes from a knowledge of the kinds of hazards or safety violations which have caused injuries in the past. In other words, the more we know about accidents which have already happened, the better able we will be to recognize health and safety hazards when we see them.

Injury and illness statistics indicate the areas in which safety activities need to be intensified. From them we can pinpoint problems which must be solved and identify so-called "target" industries or occupations in which to center our efforts. They also measure the success or failure of these efforts.

According to the Iowa Code, an employer must maintain record of recordable occupational injuries and illnesses. These records must be available without delay and at reasonable times for examination by representatives of the Bureau of Labor. The law further provides that all occupational injuries or occupational illnesses that result in 2 or more lost workdays must be reported to the Bureau of Labor no later than 6 working days after receiving information that such a case has occurred. The "Employers Work Injury Report", Iowa Form Number L-1/WC-1, is used for this purpose. In addition, employers must report to the Commissioner of Labor within 48 hours each accident or health hazard that results in one or more fatalities or hospitalization of five or more employees.

The quality and usefulness of any statistics analyzing injuries or accidents, or both, or any safety program based upon such statistics depends upon the quality of the original work injury reports. If these reports are incomplete, biased, or otherwise deficient, the analysis made from them will be equally deficient.

The most effective report form for analysis purposes is that in which an employer or his representative is asked to describe the incident in his own words as completely as possible and then supply certain details which are essential to the analysis. Iowa Form Number L-1/WC-1, "Employers Work Injury Report", meets these criteria.

Each report is always about a single injury or illness. Accidents that result in multiple injuries require a separate report for each individual injured. Basically, the report tells the whole story of the incident: what happened; where and when it happened; who was hurt and what kind of an injury he received; what materials or equipment were involved; what persons were involved; and what was being done when the accident happened. When properly prepared, a report tells what hazards caused a particular incident and therefore should be corrected in order to avoid similar incidents.

Because it is the employer who is obligated to prepare the work injury reports, it is to his benefit to recognize that the information supplied by him contributes to the stated objective of accident prevention—accident prevention not only on his own premises but in all places of employment generally.

Records, however, are no substitute for accident prevention. But, accident records are indispensible aids for accident prevention. It is the goal of the Bureau of Labor to strive to work together with employers to create a safe environment in which to work. The employers' continued cooperation in maintaining and supplying complete and accurate records will insure that we can continue to use the past as a guide to the future in accident prevention.

SECTION I

WORK INJURIES

WORK INJURIES

During the 1971-1972 biennium, 21,650 disabling work injuries were reported to the Bureau of Labor. Of these, 8,967 were reported in 1971 and 12,683 in 1972. As a result of the publicity accompanying the passage of the William-Steiger Occupational Safety and Health Act of 1970 and the Iowa Occupational Safety and Health Act of 1972, increased awareness of safety and related regulations was generated among Iowa's employers. What may appear to be a substantial over-the-year increase in injuries is in all probability due to "increased reporting" by employers. The Bureau of Labor initiated an educational program in the summer of 1971 through seminars and the news media to better educate employers as to their reporting responsibilities. Employers, who in the past were unaware of the reporting regulations, learned of their obligation and began filing reports.

By far the most common type of injury sustained in both 1971 and 1972 was sprains and strains. This category accounted for about 32 percent of the total reported disabling injuries during the biennium. Cuts, lacerations or punctures were the next most common injuries, representing 16.8 percent of the total. Injuries characterized by contusion, crushing or bruise accounted for 14 percent of the injuries reported during the two-year period. Fractures were sustained in about 11 percent of all reported cases. For the past 6 years these four types of injuries have ranked as the most prevalent sustained by workers. As a percentage of the total they have remained relatively stable over the 6 year period.

The part of a person's body most frequently affected by injuries was the trunk, 32 percent of the cases reported. Over 20 percent of the injuries sustained, when distributed by the part of the body affected, were to the back. This is a direct result of the large number of strains suffered. The upper extremities, particularly the fingers, were the next most commonly affected body parts. Disabling injuries to the lower extremities were reported in 23.5 percent of the cases in 1971 and 1972.

Working surfaces, surfaces in use as support for people, were the most common agency associated with the reported injuries. These accounted for 19.6 percent of the injuries in 1971 and 19.5 percent in 1972. Metal items directly caused about 15 percent of the injuries reported during the biennium. Vehicles; boxes, barrels and other containers; machines; and unpowered hand tools also produced or inflicted a significant number of the reported injuries.

Overexertion was the most prevalent cause of lost-time injuries reported. The next most common type of injury was one caused by being struck by an object. Falls, either from an elevation or on the same level, accounted for 16 percent of the injuries in 1971 and 1972.

The time of day when most reported injuries occurred was between 10 a.m. and 11 a.m. Nearly one out of ten reported injuries was sustained during this time period. The next most dangerous times of the day, based on frequency of injuries sustained, were from 9 a.m. to 10 a.m. and from 2 p.m. to 3 p.m.

The average number of injuries reported per month in 1971 was 747. The number of reported cases ranged from a high of 928 in September, 1971, to a low of 643 in May, 1971. During 1972, the greatest number of reported injuries, 1,215, occurred in October, and the fewest, 940, in December. The average number of incidents reported per month was 1,057. However, there appears to be little significant variation in the number of cases reported for each month of the year.

Of the 21,650 injuries reported during the biennium, nearly 85 percent involved male employees. Cases involving female workers numbered only 3,294 compared with 18,356 involving males. Over 31 percent of the injuries involving male employees were suffered by men between the ages of 20 and 29. Women between the ages of 50 and 59 were injured in 23 percent of the cases involving female workers. The age group involving the greatest number of reported incidents for men and women combined was for employees between the ages of 20 and 29.

By far the greatest number of disabling work injuries reported during the biennium occurred in the manufacturing industries. Manufacturing workers suffered 12,691 reported injuries, 58.6 percent of the total, during the 1971-1972 period. However, manufacturing workers represented just under one-fourth of the total nonfarm employment in the state. The second largest number of disabling injuries, 2,386 or 11 percent of the total, was sustained by state and local government employees. Government employment represents nearly one-fifth of the nonfarm employment and includes school employees, employees in state and county institutions, local fire and police employees, highway and maintenance workers as well as general administrative workers. The contract construction industries, representing 4.5 percent of the employment, had 1,517 injuries, 7 percent of the total.

The greatest majority of the injuries, over 96 percent, were of a temporary nature. However, nearly one percent of the reported cases resulted in the death of the employee. (The following section on work related deaths provides a more detailed analysis of the fatalities sustained in Iowa during the 1971-1972 biennium.) In addition, 544 injuries, 3.5 percent of the total, resulted in permanent partial disability to the worker. A permanent partial disability is one which results in the loss, or complete loss of use, of any member or part of a member of the body, or in permanent impairment of function of the body or any of its parts.

SECTION II

WORK RELATED DEATHS

WORK RELATED DEATHS

There were 197 work-related deaths reported to the Bureau of Labor as having occurred during the 1971-1972 biennium. Of these, 90 happened in 1971 and 107 in 1972. On the average, 1 out of every 10,000 workers in Iowa died while on the job. Most of these were men; however, 3 women also died while at work: 1 manufacturing employee in 1971 and 2 government workers in 1972.

The average age of the persons suffering fatal injuries in 1971 was just over 41 years. The youngest worker killed in 1971 was 17 years old and the oldest was 71 years of age. In 1972, the average age of the fatal cases was 44, with the ages of the deceased ranging from 17 to 79.

Over half of all deaths reported during the biennium occurred in the contract construction and manufacturing industry divisions. Contract construction accounted for 29 percent of the total with 22 fatalities reported in 1971 and 35 in 1972. There were 23 manufacturing deaths in 1971 and 25 in 1972, 24 percent of the total for the two-year period.

During the biennium, 13.7 percent of the total number of reported deaths were sustained by government employees. Twenty-six government workers died while on the job in 1971 and 1972. Of these, one was a Federal employee, 6 were state employees, 9 were county workers, 7 were employed by cities or towns and 3 were school district employees. Heart attacks suffered while on the job, being struck by an object, crushing injuries and motor vehicle accidents were the most prevalent causes of death for government employees. Nearly two-thirds of the total number of government work-related deaths involved highway and maintenance workers.

Crushing injuries were the cause of over 23 percent of the reported deaths in 1971 and 1972. Motor vehicle accidents caused a total of 33, or just over 17 percent, of the fatalities during the two-year period. Fatal heart attacks while on the job took 29 lives, 15 percent of the total. Of the 62 fatal heart attacks and motor vehicle accidents reported for the biennium, over 75 percent occurred during 1972: 24 motor vehicle accidents and 23 heart attacks. The next most common cause of on-the-job deaths was falling from high places (22). This was closely followed by electrocutions (18).

Iowa employers are required to report to the Bureau of Labor within 48 hours each accident or health hazard that results in a fatality. A number of the reported work-related fatalities during the biennium, 35 percent, were beyond the control of the Bureau of Labor. These numbered 68 during the two-year period and include heart attacks,

over-the-road motor vehicle accidents and assaults. However, the lives of many Iowans may be saved and countless injuries prevented through the proper enforcement of occupational safety and health standards.

The following tables and descriptions of the work-related deaths that were reported to the Bureau of Labor emphasize that there is still a need for greater safety consciousness among Iowa's employers and workers. An awareness of the problems can and should be a guide toward preventing needless fatalities in the future.

"IOSHA Recordkeeping and Reporting." A 30 minute projector recorder cartridge for use on a 3M brand Sound-Slide System on Iowa's OSHA recordkeeping and reporting system for presentation to employer groups. Produced by the Iowa Bureau of Labor, Education Division and Research and Statistics Division.

Other:

A summary of the recordkeeping, reporting and posting responsibilities of employers under Iowa's Occupational Safety and Health Act has been printed on the back of Iowa Form No. L-1/WC-1, "Employer's Work Injury Report," for convenience. Also, as a part of the Bureau of Labor's continued effort to assist the employers of Iowa and to reduce the burden placed upon them by various reporting requirements, Form No. L-1/WC-1 was revised in the fall of 1971 to incorporate on one form all items required by the Iowa Industrial Commissioner, the Iowa Bureau of Labor and the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics. Copies of this form are made available by the Iowa Bureau of Labor to any employer upon request.

The staff of the Research and Statistics Division and the Education Division have made themselves available for conducting seminars on the recordkeeping and reporting requirements for both employer and employee groups. Requests for such sessions should be made in writing to the Iowa Bureau of Labor, allowing sufficient time for the scheduling of the meetings.
