Introduction

The members of the Iowa Board of Nursing conduct their business in accordance with 2001 Iowa Code chapters 17A, 21, 22, 147, 147A, 152, 152E and 272C, and the Iowa Administrative Code, Nursing Board [655]. Functions of the Board as provided by regulations include:

Promulgation of rules and regulations to carry out the mandate of the laws.

Approval of nursing education programs preparing registered nurse and licensed practical nurse candidates and approval of all advanced formal academic nursing education programs. Elevation of the standards of the schools of nursing. Promotion of educational and professional standards of nurses in the state.

Definition of nursing practice including minimum standards of practice for the registered nurse and licensed practical nurse. In addition, the Board approves additional acts or nursing specialties including the advanced registered nurse practitioner, in cooperation with the medical and nursing professions.

Oversight of continuing education for nurses for license renewal and re-entry from inactive status.

Oversight of licensure examination administration. Licensure of registered nurses, licensed practical nurses, and registration of advanced registered nurse practitioners. Renewal, reactivation, and reinstatement of licenses. Verification of licensure to and from other jurisdictions.

Enforcement of the laws and rules applicable to the practice of nursing including the use of disciplinary proceedings and disciplinary action.

Maintenance of a record system which allows for the retrieval of data regarding licensees as individuals and as a composite. Maintenance of records of all Board proceedings.

Establishment of fees based on the cost of sustaining the Board and the actual costs of licensing. Collection of fees with remittance to the Treasurer of the State of Iowa. Operation within sound fiscal management principles.

ADMINISTRATIVE RULES

- Chapter 2: New Chapter 2. Ensures that regulation of nursing education addresses essential and current issues related to public safety and welfare; to enhance readability and eliminate regulatory duplication.
- Chapter 3: Requires licensees who regularly examine, attend, counsel or treat adults/children to document on the renewal application, completion of mandatory training on abuse identification and reporting.

 Requires licensees to keep compliance records on file. Exemptions for licensees are set out.
- Chapter 3: Provides for the submission of a request for inactive status via writing or Internet within 60 days of license expiration.
- Chapter 3: Removes the delinquent fee for individuals whose license became delinquent prior to July 4, 1963; requires board approval for licensure of individuals who hold a license under sanction in any U.S. jurisdiction or another country; reduces continuing education requirements to reactivate/reinstate the nursing license.
- Chapter 4: Explains authority to review or investigate complaint information, corrects a code reference, expands provisions for informal settlements, defines nurse licensure compact terms, notes additional grounds for discipline, clarifies the licensure reinstatement application process and identifies requirements for rehearing.
- Chapter 5: Eliminates carrying over continuing education credit earned after submitting renewal materials to apply the credit to the next license period.
- Chapter 5: Updates continuing education rules and more clearly specifies requirements for continuing education.
- Chapter 6: Permits the LPN to be supervised by an RN via teleconferencing when the RN can be onsite within 10 minutes.
- Chapter 7: Eliminates the requirement for ARNPs to purchase the Iowa Pharmacy Law and Information Manual and the recommendation that ARNPs subscribe to the Iowa Board of Pharmacy Examiners Newsletter. It

is replaced with a requirement that ARNPs access this information electronically.

- Chapter 12: List national certifying organizations identified by the board updated and the process streamlined.

 Number of committee members reduced from seven to five; the committee will be appointed ad hoc; the nurse licensure compact is recognized.
- Chapter 17: Supplements Iowa Code chapter 252J, addressing child support noncompliance.
- Chapter 18: Supplements Iowa Code chapter 261, addressing student loan default or noncompliance.

LEGISLATION

A registered nurse recruitment program administered by the College Student Aid Commission and comprised of a forgivable loan program, a tuition scholarship program and a registered nurse loan repayment program was created. The legislation was not funded.

NURSING EDUCATION

Section 1--Nursing Education Programs

The Iowa Code provides that the Iowa Board of Nursing approve nursing education programs preparing registered nurse and practical nurse candidates and all advanced formal academic nursing education programs.

Between July 1, 2001, and June 30, 2002, site visits were made to twenty-three programs in seven institutions, including one doctoral, one master's, one post master's, three baccalaureate, nine associate degree and eight practical nursing programs.

For the purposes of this report, nursing programs are listed separately by site and type. In some instances, more than one site may share administration by a single program, a common philosophy, curriculum and faculty.

Section 2--National Recognition as an Accrediting Agency

The Health Manpower Act of 1968 (P.L. 90-040) Title II Nurse Training, provided that the U.S. Commissioner of Education, Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, could appoint state agencies for the purpose of accrediting programs in nurse education.

The Iowa Board of Nursing made application for this recognition by the U.S. Commissioner of Education as the state agency in Iowa for the approval of registered nurse education. On November 21, 1969, the Board received notification that its initial application had been approved.

Since 1969, the Iowa Board of Nursing has resubmitted applications for and maintained continued recognition by the U.S. Department of Education. Reapproval was last granted for a period of four years

with no recommendations by the Secretary, United States Department of Education on January 26, 1999.

The Iowa Board of Nursing submitted a Petition for Continued Recognition in February 2002 and anticipates review by the U.S. Department of Education in fall 2002.

STATEWIDE PLANNING

The progress toward achievement of the goals and the objectives from <u>A Statewide Plan for Nursing</u>, 1988, continues to be monitored. In order to evaluate the progress in meeting these recommendations, an ongoing mechanism to gather additional data regarding each specific recommendation has been established. The following compilation addresses each recommendation and reports the status of that recommendation as well as those staff continue to monitor.

Recommendation #1:

A central repository for health data needs to be established for Iowa with guidelines developed for data collection that ensures sources report data consistently.

Recommendation #2:

Nursing data and other health studies should be added to the standard health database.

Comments:

Recommendations #1 and #2 are related.

Iowa Hospital Association (IHA) has contracted to collect the data for severity of illness. All hospitals are reporting and using the APR (all patient refined) DRGs.

CHMIS accomplished its objective as established in its enabling legislation and was discontinued as of October 1, 1998. Historical data files have been archived at IHA. All hospital and health system inpatient and outpatient data reporting to IHA will continue to assure public data available in Iowa.

Continue to monitor:

Hospital and health system inpatient and outpatient data (IHA) Minimum Data Set (MDS) in LTC

Nursing Management Minimum Data Set (NMMDS) [University of Iowa] JCAHO Clinical Indicators

Iowa Registries:

Agricultural Injuries

Alzheimers

Brain and spinal cord injuries

Cancer

Heart disease and stroke

Recommendation #3:

The Iowa Board of Nursing should create an in-depth, ongoing

study in Iowa addressing the following issues:

a. Funding should be secured for study and support for a staff person in the Board of Nursing office to coordinate the ongoing study.

Comments:

Accomplished.

b. Additional manpower data about nurses should be secured in order to facilitate planning for health care needs of Iowans (i.e. work location of nurses).

Comments:

The data available is what is requested on the renewal form. RN renewal includes the following: where presently employed in nursing; employment status; actively seeking employment as an RN; principal field/place of employment; type of position; major clinical teaching or practice area. LPN renewal includes the following: where presently employed in nursing; employment status; actively seeking employment as an LPN; principal field/place of employment.

The number of active LPN-RN dual licensure is small. LPNs who become licensed as RNs are asked to place LPN license on inactive status at the time of licensure by examination.

The Iowa Board of Nursing data is updated yearly from a monthly printout with compilation by county. Continue to monitor.

c. The need for nurses should be reviewed in detail including assessing the geographic distribution of nurses and taking into consideration the health care needs of the aging population.

Comments:

Data is presently not available to assess from the board office. Until recommendations #1, #2, and #3.b. can be met, this recommendation will not be addressed. Aging distribution by county is kept by the Census Bureau and the library would have this. The board office will keep a copy of the report Statewide Needs Assessment of Iowa's Elderly done by I.S.U., Department of Human Development and Family Studies. The Department of Rural Health keeps track of NPs by county.

d. The need and availability of associate, diploma, baccalaureate, master's, and doctorally prepared nurses should be critically analyzed with a focus on matching education preparation with employment opportunities.

Comments:

The Iowa Board of Nursing has <u>availability</u> of data on education--diploma, baccalaureate, master's, and doctorally prepared nurses are compiled by county.

Education preparation with employment: Iowa Hospital and Health Systems--Iowa Organization of Nurse Leaders: Examined and surveyed hospital nursing--survey did not address education with employment opportunities.

The 1988 Statewide Plan used the IONL survey.

Continue to monitor.

e. The need and availability of licensed practical nurses in Iowa should continue to be assessed to assure an adequate number in settings for which they are educationally prepared to practice.

Comments:

The Iowa Board of Nursing has <u>availability</u>. The Annual IONL Practice Survey continues to include two questions, which address #3.d. & e. The data regarding these two items are on file in the board office and collection is ongoing. Continue to monitor.

- f. A study of nursing competencies from the perspective of level of licensure is needed.
- g. Competencies should be analyzed to determine those needed in the future by nurses in Iowa.

Comments:

Monitor f. and g. The Articulation in Nursing Education Committee addressed this issue. The Validation Committee has established a mechanism for collecting data on curricula, courses, competencies, student demographics, and student outcomes; and recommended the appropriate process for data analysis.

National Council continues to alternate the LPN and RN Job Analysis Studies. Continue to monitor.

h. The appropriation of state dollars for nursing education programs should be analyzed and recommendations made concerning state funding for nursing education.

Comments:

Accomplished by the Appropriation in Nursing Education Committee. The report of the <u>Recommendation for the Appropriation of State Dollars in Nursing Education</u> was submitted to the Iowa Board of Nursing, September 1990.

i. Collaboration among and between educational institutions should be fostered in order to facilitate educational articulation of students.

Comments:

Accomplished by the Articulation in Nursing Education Committee. The report of <u>The Iowa Articulation Plan for Nursing Education: RN to Baccalaureate</u> was submitted to the Iowa Board of Nursing, December 1990.

j. Nursing education programs should provide means to measure competencies in content previously acquired for the registered nurse returning for a baccalaureate degree in nursing in order to minimize repetition in the curriculum.

Comments:

Addressed by the Iowa Articulation Plan. Continue to monitor the Validation Committee's data collection for the evaluation of the plan.

k. Master's degree programs in nursing should be available throughout the state.

Comments:

Accomplished by the Master's Degree in Nursing Committee. The report of the <u>Recommendations for the Accessibility and Availability of Master's Programs in Nursing in Iowa</u>, March 1991.

The Validation Committee continues to review and organize the process for updating the options and components of the Iowa Articulation Plan; establishing a mechanism for collecting data on curricula, courses, student demographic, and recommending the appropriate process for data analysis.

NURSING PRACTICE

Section 1--Declaratory Orders

During FY '02, declaratory order #104 was issued.

Section 2--Committees

The Advanced Practice Committee met three times during FY '02.

Section 3-Scope of Practice

The board voted to find it to be within the scope of practice of the licensed practical nurse in a licensed blood center to draw blood in sufficient quantities for collection of blood or blood products to be used for transfusion and to initiate, monitor and discontinue a peripheral venous access device using automated aphaeresis equipment for the purpose of blood component collection when the tasks have been delegated by the registered nurse.

The board appointed a committee to make recommendations for revision of the course, "Supervising in Health Care Facilities."

CONTINUING EDUCATION

Section 1--Approved Providers

Thirteen provider applications were received during FY '02 and four applicants were awarded Iowa Board of Nursing provider approval. Approval was denied to 18 applicants who did not meet provider criteria within three committee reviews or within the 12-month deadline of filing the initial application. The number of providers approved since continuing education became mandatory for nurses is now 338. The total number of approved providers as of June 30, 2002, was 169 (121 in state and 48 out of state).

Five providers voluntarily relinquished provider approval during FY '02. The total number of approved providers who have voluntarily relinquished or withdrawn their approved provider status since continuing education became mandatory is now 164.

During the year, 29 providers were reevaluated and all were reapproved for five years. No reevaluations remain pending.

The Board of Nursing did not review any complaints specific to approved providers in this fiscal year. Permission was granted by the Board of Nursing for one provider to award credit retroactively for a program due to extenuating circumstances.

Section 2--Audits

Routine random audits were only performed during the first quarter of fiscal year '02. Twenty-five licensees were randomly selected by computer each month from July to October 2001. As a result, out of the 100 sent, 68 have been received and approved; 32 remain pending. The Board of Nursing reviewed 7 audit failures and accepted make-up credit for 6 and directed 1 to submit make-up credit by a specific deadline.

The total number of late renewals for FY '02 was 562. During the first quarter of FY '02, 95 late renewal audits were performed. OF the late renewal audits, 71 audits were approved; 24 remain pending. Twenty completed reaudits.

In the first quarter of FY '02, the Board of Nursing reviewed 22 late renewal audits. Of these 22, make-up credit was accepted for 9, 4 were directed to submit make-up credit and 9 were directed to the Enforcement Division.

Section 3--Rulings

In FY '02, several significant rulings were made by the Iowa Board of Nursing:

- 1. Denied 1 rule waiver petition that a late renewal not be audited.
- 2. Approved 2 rule waiver petitions to accept late renewal materials and provider approval was granted.
- 3. Approved 7 requests and denied one request to recognize the clock hours for programs attended outside of Iowa for nursing continuing education credit.

Section 4--Newsletter

The Nursing Newsletter is the official publication of the Iowa Board of Nursing for the dissemination of all information, including board action, rule revision procedural requirements and disciplinary action.

Four issues of the newsletter were published in FY '02, with a total distribution of 190,404.

LICENSURE

Section 1--Examinations

The Iowa Board of Nursing, in cooperation with other state boards of nursing, contracts to use national examinations (NCLEX®) for registered nurse licensure and practical nurse licensure. The licensing examinations are owned by the National Council of State Boards of Nursing, Inc. (NCSBN) and are prepared by item writers and content experts recommended by boards of nursing and the National Council.

The single purpose of the licensure examination is to determine minimal competence to practice nursing as defined by legally constituted authorities. The most recent passing standard was adopted for the licensure examination for registered nurses in October 2000, and for licensed practical nurses in October 2001. Results of the NCLEX® examination are reported to candidates as pass-fail.

There are three types of nursing programs leading to licensure as a registered nurse in the State of Iowa. Graduates of associate degree, baccalaureate and professional master's degree programs are eligible to take the national examination for registered nurse licensure. In Iowa, all 40 nursing programs that prepare registered nurse candidates maintain current approval by the Iowa Board of Nursing.

There are two types of nursing programs leading to licensure as a licensed practical nurse in the State of Iowa. Graduates of community college PN programs and a USAR (91W-M6) Exportable Program, are eligible to take the national examination for practical nurse licensure. In Iowa, all 28 nursing programs that prepare practical nurse candidates maintain current approval by the Iowa Board of Nursing.

The rules and regulations of the Iowa Board of Nursing require nurses educated and licensed in a foreign country to take the national examination for registered nurse licensure or practical nurse licensure (NCLEX®). A prerequisite for taking the registered nurse licensing examination is certification by the Commission on Graduates of Foreign Nursing Schools (CGFNS). A prerequisite for taking the practical nurse licensing examination is credential evaluation by CGFNS.

The NCLEX® examinations are provided using computerized adaptive testing. The Chauncey Group International, a wholly owned subsidiary of Educational Testing Service (ETS), and Thompson Prometric, serve as the vendors to provide testing and administration services for NCLEX®. Computerized adaptive testing is conducted at three sites in Iowa on a year-round basis. Candidates may self-schedule the examination at the time and site of choice when qualifications for licensure and test registration are complete. After October 1, 2002, the national test service will be NCS Pearson and the

examination will be offered at four Pearson Professional Centers in Iowa.

There is no provision for temporary licensure of candidates for licensure by examination in Iowa.

Licensure status information may be accessed through the Iowa Board of Nursing automated telephone or online licensure verification systems.

Section 7-Nurse Licensure Compact

Legislation enacting the Nurse Dicensure compact became effective on July 1, 2001. The compact provides for a state-based nursing license that is mutually recognized among all party states. This facilitates the ability to protect the public health, safety, and welfare of Iowa citizens. The following states have implemented the compact: Arizona, Arkansas, Delaware, Idaho, Maine, Maryland, Mississippi, Nebraska, North Carolina, South Dakota, Texas, Utah and Wisconsin. The following states have enacted but not implemented the compact: Indiana, New Jersey, North Dakota and Tennessee.

ENFORCEMENT

The investigators logged some 30,006 miles on the agency-owned vehicles while traveling the state in the course of conducting 335 investigations.

At the end of FY '02 there were a total of 95 licensees who are being actively monitored.

Sanctions and other discipline related board actions are reported to the National Council of State Boards of Nursing, Inc. Acting as the board's agent, the Council then disseminates the information to the National Practitioner Data Bank and Healthcare Integrity and Protection Data Bank as required by law.

Quarterly reports were prepared after each board meeting that outline disciplinary actions taken by the Board. These statistics are published in the Board's newsletter and were submitted to the licensing authorities of the other states through the Disciplinary Report of the National Council of State Boards of Nursing, Inc.

ADMINISTRATION

Section 1-Staffing

Ella Mae Baird, business manager, resigned effective August 31, 2001. Beverly Sorensen, renewal clerk, retired effective January 30, 2002. The state hiring freeze prevented these positions from being filled.

Section 2-Recognition

R. C. Miller, Janis White and Kathy Clayton were recognized for 25 years of service to the state. Lorinda Inman was recognized by the National Council of State Boards of Nursing, Inc. for service as the Area II <u>Director</u> and Vice President and 15 years of dedicated service to the National Council.

Section 3--Presentations

The professional staff continued its efforts to acquaint nurses with the laws affecting nursing practice, education, and licensee/licensure regulations. During FY '02, the staff spoke to a variety of nursing education programs, continuing education programs, faciliities, and professional groups regarding legal rights and responsibilities, impaired practice of chemically dependent nurses, workforce issues, and licensure. The number of speaking engagements was limited due to fiscal constraints. Additionally, staff presented at National Council of State Boards of Nursing, Inc. Summit of States, Department of Human Services Bureau of Refugee Services and Legislative Oversight Committee.

Section 4--Committee Representation

Office staff continues to serve as facilitator, steering committee member for the Iowa Nursing Workforce Project. Professional staff also represented the board with the Iowa Association of Colleges of Nursing, Iowa Community College Nurse Educator Directors' Association, Iowa Association of Nursing Continuing Education and Iowa Council of Nurses.

Board members and staff participated in the National Council of State Boards of Nursing, Inc. activities. Participation included attendance at the Annual Delegate Assembly. State travel restrictions prohibited the board from attending the Mid-year Meeting. Board staff served as members of the Nursing Practice, Regulation and Education Committee, Foreign Nurse Issues Subcommittee, Education Standards Subcommittee, Licensure Examination Item Review Subcommittee, Nurse Licensure Compact Administrators and the Examination Committee.

Section 5-Web Site

Staff continues updating the board web site, which provides the most current information to licensees and the public. The home page also serves as the primary access site for online licensure.

Section 6--Audit

In accordance with generally accepted accounting principles and Chapter 11 of the Iowa Code, the accounting records of the Iowa Board of Nursing were audited for FY '02, in conjunction with the Department of Public Health and were in order.






