WHEREAS, a day has been annually set aside for a number of years past, in commemoration of the establishment of the American navy and celebrated by all peace-loving citizens, and

WHEREAS, it is highly desirable at this time that the citizens generally have a better understanding of the navy's purposes, activities and needs, and an opportunity to rededicate themselves to the cause of peace,

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Clyde L. Herring, Governor of the State of Iowa, do hereby designate and declare

MONDAY, OCTOBER 28, 1935

as

NAVY DAY

and call upon all citizens to devote a portion of that day to the study of the navy's operations in the past, its position and condition at the present, and its possibilities as a protection against disaster and a preservation of international peace in the future; urging that public and patriotic services be held wherever possible on that day in furtherance of our high national ideals.
